Lorden Commons Residents Make Plea for Public Water

During a Planning Board meeting to review an expansion of the Lorden Commons subdivision, most of the public comment period focused on the water supply for the current residents of the sub-

division. Built between 2015 and 2017, phase one of the subdivision was built with wells providing water to homeowners.

However, the expansion of the subdivision for phase two, three and four includes supplying water from Derry by extending a water line along Old

Derry Road. This approach was dictated by a hydrology study that showed that the aquifer in the area would struggle to handle the 83 additional homes via wells.

About twenty residents attended the Planning Board meeting asking *continued on page 7*

CIP Committee Reviews Pricey School District Potential Projects

The Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) Committee met to review six future capital projects that have been requested by the town and school committee.

Most of the discussion centered on the school district requests which totaled about \$62M in potential projects, although these are worst case numbers and the actual cost could be significantly lower depending on how the school district opts to address looming capacity problems in the lower grades.

The CIP is an advisory committee that prioritizes potential capital projects and tentatively

slots them to appear on the ballot in certain fiscal years. While they make recommendations, the Town Council and School Boards decide what to put on the ballot each year.

On the town side, the CIP committee slotted a \$235K project to improve drainage on the town common into FY2020. This idea originated with the Heritage Committee which hopes to get the drainage issues fixed prior to the Nutfield 300th celebration.

The CIP also slotted \$175K for a new backup generator for the police department to replace the current one which is 16 years old.

Peter Curro, Business

Administrator for the school district, presented the school requests. He began by saying that there was a degree of uncertainty in the requests because the district is waiting for a facilities study committee looking at enrollment and program needs to finish their work in October.

According to Curro, the most pressing need is to expand capacity for kindergarten students with Moose Hill School being at capacity. The school district has already approved two modular classrooms for the coming year, but continued growth is expected.

Curro also stated that the elementary schools

Planning Board Hears Residents Concerns Over Blasting

On Aug. 8, the Planning Board unanimously conditionally approved phases two, three and four of the Lorden Commons conservation subdivision. In total eighty-three lots, most roughly a half acre, will be created. The developer, Chinburg Properties, plans to build 3-bedroom single family homes starting in 2019. Town regulations limit building to 25 houses per year, so it will take several years to fully build out the subdivision.

Chinburg originally sought approval in April 2017 with a plan got pro-

vide water via wells. At the time, the Planning Board expressed strong concern about whether the aquifer could handle that many new wells. They asked the developer to conduct a hydrology study. Based on the study results, Chinburg decided to look at options for piping in water from a local water supplier.

During the Board meeting, Jason Lopez of Keach-Nordstrom Associates described a plan for Derry's Water Division to service the subdivision. The water line that runs along Old Derry Road in Derry would be extended into Londonderry up to

the area of the three new phases of the subdivision.

Public water would not, however, be extended into phase 1 of Lorden Commons which was built in 2016 and 2017. An incidental benefit of the water line is that residents along that part of Old Derry Road could, at their expense, opt to connect to the water line.

Several area residents expressed concern about how blasting required for the new phases would impact their wells and house foundations. Mike Boyle spoke passionately and at length about his concerns. He owns two properties on Old Derry Road. He believes that blasting during phase one caused cracks in his foundation. He shared that he never had water in his basement before but started getting it after the blasting. He fears that additional blasting will make it worse.

Boyle also worries that blasting could damage his well and impact water quality. While he acknowledged that the blasting contract is required to do before and after inspections of foundations and water quality, he asked that the town do an independent evaluation. He also asked that the developer be required to post a bond

to cover any blasting damage.

Town planning officials replied that the town did not have the expertise to monitor the blasting and is not able to require a bond for an issue like this. Lopez shared that the blasting company would have insurance that would cover any damages to abutting properties.

Several other abutters shared concerns about water quality testing to determine what impact, if any, the blasting would have on their wells. Town planning staff shared that state regulation requires before and after water quality testing of wells that fall within two thousand feet of the blasting areas.

The state mandates that testing cover nitrates and nitrites which as elements used in the blasting power. Some residents asked about testing to things like radon and arsenic which could be released from the granite. Eric Chinburg, President of CEO of Chinburg Properties, stated that his company would pay for a more extensive test for any resident within the two-thousand foot radius to cover those concerns.

Several residents said that when blasting for phase one occurred, they

did not get notification despite the efforts of the developer to reach them. Eric Chinburg suggested that e-mail would be a good way to communicate plans to abutters and asked people to e-mail him at echinburg@chinburg.com to be added to the list or to ask any questions.

The subdivision will be built off Old Derry Road in the area of Calla Road. Phase two includes 18 house lots along a new constructed road, Clover Lane. Phase 3 includes 40 lots along Calla Road and Clover Lane with Calla Road being extended to

intersect Clover Lane. Phase 4 calls for the final 25 lots. Lopez stated that phases 2 and 3 are likely to be developed at the same time; however, they were split into two phases to give the developer the flexibility to hold off on phase 3 if economic conditions change.

Per town regulation, as a conservation subdivision, the developer is required to leave 40% of the land, or roughly 92 acres as open space. Plans show that the development will exceed the requirement with 63% open space, or 144 acres.

Editorial

Let the Sun Shine In

Open and transparent government - you could call it the battle cry of community newspapers.

That's what the public deserves from its officials, on the local, state and national level. And providing information about the doings of government at the local level is a job this newspaper continues to take seriously.

A reminder that government business conducted in the open is at the heart of a democracy. If we don't know what our officials are doing, we don't have the information to hold them accountable. And the more information we have, the better.

Knowledge, as the saying goes, is power. And that power is not something to be held close to the chest by politicians; it belongs in the open, available to everyone, especially to those who put politicians in office and depend on them for services, fair budgeting and just plain listening to the will of the people.

The key, of course, is open access to meetings and records. We hear a lot about government transparency on the national level; it's at least as important at the town and school level, where decisions have more immediate impact on our pocket-books and our lives.

Open government means newspapers, if they're doing their job, must act as watchdogs, asking the uncomfortable questions, getting the information, and providing it to their readers. This is very hard to do when

the government does things behind closed door. And if documents are not readily made available, the state's Right to Know process is at the ready for anyone to use.

The "Your Right to Know." That's the heart of what government is all about. As a citizen in a democracy, you have the right to know how your government operates, and your elected officials have the obligation, except in carefully spelled out specific situations, to conduct their business in the open.

Sure, it's a lot easier for officials to discuss public business in private, which they do, where negotiations and off-the-cuff comments and hypothetical situations can be aired in a controlled atmosphere. But that's not the way things are supposed to work.

Discussion is to be done in public. Being in public office isn't supposed to be easy, and it requires following the rules, whether you like them or not, sometime officials make up rules as they go along. Making it hard for the public to find out what's going on is playing loose with open government.

That's why we report the details of what's been discussed. Then it's up to all citizens to get involved and make sure their voices are heard.

So in the midst of it all, we're happy to do our part to let the sun shine in all parts of town government.

Planning Board Gets Annual Update on Elderly Housing

What looked to be a quick update from Town Plan-

ner Colleen Mailloux on whether Londonderry's inventory of 55+ housing had reached a level that would trigger a restriction

on new such housing turned into a wide-ranging discussion on elderly housing in Londonderry. The town has an ordi-

nance that prevents approval of any new 55+ housing if the percentage of such housing in town exceeds the percentage of 55+ residents. Mailloux shared that based on the latest census data available from 2016, the town had a total of 8,218 housing units in 2016, with the total (existing and proposed) age restricted units accounting for 9.2% of the current supply.

In comparison, the population 55 years and older was 6,884 or 27.9% of the total. Thus, the limitation on the number of elderly housing units is not in effect. Interestingly, data shows that the growth of age-restricted housing outpaces the growth in the percentage of 55+ residents. From 2016 to 2017, the number of 55+ units (existing and proposed) increased from 631 to 755, an increase of 20%. At the same time, the number of 55+ residents increased by just 8%.

While the town growth ordinance defines elderly as 55+, the picture is quite different if one considers the percentage of resident

aged 65 or over. As of 2016, Londonderry's 65+ population was 2,987, just over 12% of the total population which is much closer to the current 9.2% cap on elderly housing.

During discussion board Chairman Art Rugg suggested that the town may need to review the housing density allowed in 55+ developments. He added that the biggest complaint he hears from residents is that the 55+ units are too expensive. Member Chris Davies suggested that perhaps developments should only get the allowance for increased housing density if the units are deemed affordable.

Mailloux agreed that maybe simply having age-restricted is not providing the diversity in housing that the town needs. Much of the inventory coming on the market is too expensive for residents who want to downsize and stay in Londonderry. Member Leitha Reilly suggested that the current market seems to fit best with people moving from more expensive

towns and states to live more affordably in Londonderry.

Members highlighted that it is challenging to get developers who want to build affordable elderly housing. They pointed to the age 62+ Sanborn Crossing project as one example of success. Others noted, however, that for this project to be feasible, low-interest federally guaranteed loans were required. Because the site is an EPA brownfield site with hazardous waste that needs to be cleaned up, the town sold the land to the developer for \$10.

Member Mary Wing Soares wondered what will happen to age restricted homes when the large baby boomer generation is replaced by fewer younger residents. If Londonderry has too many age-restricted houses and not enough people to fill them, what happens to them?

Mailloux suggested that it was time to look at the current ordinance which was established over ten years ago, and board members agreed.

are nearing capacity with North School closest to being full and South School not far behind. Matthew Thornton has some additional capacity at this point, but even there he said there is not much space for growth.

CIP member and Town Council Chairman John Farrell pointed out that enrollment in the school district has been declining. As an example, in the late 1980s, Matthew Thornton had 1070 student compared to 550 today.

School district officials and CIP members pointed out that at that point there were much larger class sizes (33 versus 20ish today), hallways and the cafeteria were used for classes and the art and music pro-

grams did not have classrooms. In addition, around 2008, the district revamped the special education programs to keep more students in the district.

Since special education programs take more space than is required for conventional students, the overall student capacity of the school decreased. Curro stressed that school capacity cannot be measured by what a fire marshal might say is the maximum capacity because how the space is used by various programs impact the total number of students that can fit.

In exploring ways handle the growing kindergarten and elementary space needs, the school district looked at a few options. One included an expansion of Moose Hill to add 6 classrooms of capacity for a rough cost of \$3.5. This assumes that

Londonderry sticks with half-day kindergarten. If Londonderry moved to full day kindergarten then a major expansion would be required at an estimated cost of \$10.9M.

Another option was to add a second floor to Moose Hill and move all first graders there, so that the school would host LEEP, kindergarten and first grade. This would alleviate the pressure on the elementary schools for several years, also at rough cost of \$10M.

If the idea to move first graders to Moose Hill did not move forward, then Curro says that a new elementary school will be needed in the next five years to accommodate the growing student population. The cost to build is estimated at \$26M. In addition, the district ball parked the cost to run a new school at \$5M per year.

Also included in the proposed school capital were \$15M for a variety of school renovations across the district, including updates to the non-classroom spaces at the Middle School. This also option also includes expansion of Moose Hill. The Middle School was updated in 1986, but these updates did not include areas such as the cafeteria, gym, library or multi-purpose room. Curro noted that the \$15M could be substantially less depending on the chosen solution to alleviate the anticipated kindergarten and elementary school capacity issues.

Farrell asked if the district would be considering redistricting as an option to alleviate space constraints. Curro said yes, but with North and South Schools near capacity the impact of redistricting would be limited.

Farrell shared that while he was not against any of the asks, he did not want to increase the tax burden on residents, so he would want to see an increase in commercial revenue to pay for the increased spending. With the help of Finance Director Doug Smith, he estimated that if the full \$62 M had to be covered the town would need to develop an additional \$230M in commercial valuation, or roughly what FW Webb provides.

Alternatively, if residential taxpayers footed the entire bill, it would add about \$2.50 per thousand of assessed value to the tax bill. For a \$400K house that would be \$800/year.

Curro pointed out that in 10 years, all the current school district bonds will be paid off. He estimated that the debt coming off

books will pay for most of new bond payment costs for Moose Hill expansion, the district-wide renovation and the auditorium.

The CIP also discussed a request for the long-discussed and debated new auditorium for the high school at a \$10M price tag. CIP member Mary Wing Soares was the lone committee member pushing to up the priority on this item. Other members felt that the space issues and the schools was something that should be tackled first.

In the end, the CIP recommended the town common and police generator spending in FY2020, an expansion of Moose Hill in FY2021, the district-wide school updates in FY2023, the auditorium in FY2024 and the new elementary school in FY2025.

March of 2019 (15 months later than anticipated). There have been multiple complications along the way including cost. With this project coming to a close, Fuss and O'Neil Inc. has come to the conclusion that they will need more money to be able to complete this project

once and for all.

An amendment is looking to be made to the Exit 4A Road Construction Project, so more money can be allocated to finish the highway exit. The asking amount is \$665,735.46 (this \$332,867.73 per community) and brings the total amount for Londonderry to \$1,499,466.27. This is not, however, the total expenditure for the 4A project. The represen-

tative from Fuss and O'Neil Inc. assured the Council that this asking amount will remain under the five million dollar budget.

Councilor Ted Combes questioned why this project took an extra fifteen months for completion. According to the representative from Fuss and O'Neil, it all came down to the traffic model. By putting this model together, it was found that a significant amount of effort was needed to meet the requirements of issues

found by the model. The model was built to predict traffic flow all the way to the year of 2040, so additional preparations needed to be made to accommodate this traffic flow. As of today, the project is set for completion in March of 2019 for the exit to be open and in working condition for public use. Vice-Chairman of the Council Joe Green commented that all parties agreed on a price and it seemed that someone did not do their due diligence when it came to the traffic

study. "I don't know why the agreement can't be honored and why we have to pay for that oversight. I don't think it's fair and I think that people should honor that part of the agreement." Green said. Chairman John Farrell felt that this conversation has been going on for much too long. "I have a great deal of respect for the math involved and everything else to come up with the right calculations to do the right thing, but we're at the end." Farrell said.

The Department of Transportation also had their doubts about making the amendment to this project to ask for more money and raised the question of "Is this justified?" Both representatives assured the Council that they were several elements that came into play that were not known at the time of the original agreement. Farrell remarked how it was not fair to come back to the Council and ask for more money from the community.

Parents and Students Collaborate On Kindness Campaign

Both students and parents alike are speaking out against the issue of bullying in Londonderry schools. This has been an ongoing story which has been brought to the School Board's attention that there is not enough being done about bullying in the district. A fifth grade student named Lily and her mother from Matthew Thornton spoke to the Board about her experiences seeing other students being bullied around her. Despite seeing the bullying, she also saw students stepping up

to help others that have been bullied, by being kind and offering help. Lily is an ambassador for the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender (LGYB) program at Matthew Thornton and she is working hard to make the program better.

"I've Got Your Back" is an anti-bullying and kindness movement that was started back in the summer of 2017 by a ninth grade student from Bedford. Lily has done her part by promoting the LGYB program by making and hanging posters around Matthew Thornton for everyone to see. The goal of LGYB is to

promote random acts of kindness and lift others rather than tearing them down. With the help of parents, teachers, families, and friends alike, students are encouraged to get involved with their school and communities through sports, hobbies or other after-school activities. One recent anti-bullying campaign put on by LGYB was the screening of the documentary "SCREENAGERS" at local schools. It is also important to note that the LGYB program is a primarily student run organization that focuses on students having the greatest impact for making a

change. The program is funded by donations and every child who participates in the program receives a bracelet.

Chairman of the School Board Jenn Ganem praised the fifth grader for coming forward and is very excited for the concept of LGYB to be brought into Londonderry schools. "One of the things that I want is more students involved with School Board and giving us solutions." Ganem said. Board member Steve Young also praised Lily for coming to their meeting and speaking to them. "It is not often that anybody ever wants to come

here or do they get the chance to speak. I am surprised and I appreciate you coming." Young said. Board member Mike Saucier also told Lily that he is a teacher himself at the high school level and it was very nice to have her at the meeting. "I like any idea that is positive and proactive and it seems like this message is all about trying to do the right thing before something bad happens. I think that is a really special thing. I'm excited that you guys brought that here today." Saucier said.

Being a new program to the Londonderry schools; how the program

will be funded is still being worked out whether the program will be sponsored or run primarily on donations. Chairman Ganem said that the next step of implementing this program will be to involve the principal of Matthew Thornton and getting the PTA involved as well. Also on the School Board's agenda for this upcoming year is to take a closer look at the policies that are in place regarding bullying. Superintendent Scott Laliberte said that he will make sure that all of the elementary school principals are a part of the discussion going forward.

ing that the water line be extended to include the existing homes built in phase one. Several phase one residents testified that they have had water quality and pressure issues.

Eric Chinburg, President and CEO, of Chinburg Properties acknowledged that there had been some problems with wells in the past but claimed that his company worked with homeowners to get filtration systems in place.

During public comment Donald Armstrong of 4 Iris Lane spoke saying, "I remember the [Planning] Board here making a strong recommendation [last year] to Chinburg that they address phase one. I'm very disappointed that he didn't. They didn't address us. The line is stopping eventually at the cul-de-sac. Its not

going the additional two, three, four hundred feet down to supply the [phase one] houses. They chose to go the Derry route versus the Auburn route and run it up our road so that we could get water, so there were options here and I guess the ones that would help us were ignored for financial reasons or other reasons." Armstrong's commentary was met with hearty applause.

Jerry Leblanc of 7 Calla Road said, "When Chinburg built the development I assume that they knew they were going to do a phase 2, 3 and 4 when they built my [phase 1] house. I guess, where were the thoughts in the beginning, so that one, two, three and four would have the [public] water?"

Planning Board Chairman Art Rugg replied, "I know the very first conceptual discussion we had which goes back 4-5

years, they were going to run water and that was what the board's recommendation was. It changed after that. Within the context of state statute and regulation and what we have for our [local] subdivision regulations. So, our hands were tied. We wanted one thing. They did something else and they had that right to go do something else."

Chinburg was asked what it would cost to

extend water to phase 1. He shared that it would cost \$1.3M and that it was not economically feasible for Chinburg to bear that cost. Celeste Burke of 14 Iris Lane countered, "I hear you say the cost would be \$1.3M. What would have been an acceptable cost to you? And could I be given the option to pay the difference?"

Chinburg replied, "I don't know the answer to that." Burke continued, "I

think a lot of my fellow neighbors were really just very upset that we have not been given an option." Chinburg said, "I can tell you that if we do not bring the water to [phase] two, three and four the cost to bring it to your homes would be multiple times more than that, so at least this brings it within the realm of possibility with some sort of warrant article."

Several times during the meeting, Planning

Board members urged Chinburg to work with the phase one homeowners on solutions.

A resident asked the Board if the town could pay to extend the line. They were told that this would be up to the town since the Planning Board does not have the ability to expend funds. Board members suggested that residents reach out to the Town Manager to understand their options.

Irish Film Crew Visits Area To Film A Documentary On Nutfield

Nutfield is the original name for group of towns we now call Derry, Londonderry, and Windham. This area is rich with history stemming from its almost 300 year life span. Ever since 1719 when Reverend James MacGregor brought a group of Scottish-Irish settlers to this portion of NH; the area has been witness to not only plenty of amazing moments within its vicinity; but also the birth and growth of the United States. It is not just Americans who find value in this history. Plenty of Irish citizens also find value in Nutfield's, and New England's, connection to this section of Europe. A producer and videographer from Mac-Millan Media recently visited Derry and Londonderry as part of a week-long stay to delve into Nutfield's relation to Ireland and Scotland.

Film Producer Jane Veitch and videographer Matthew Gold were accompanied throughout their stay by local historical expert Paul Lindemann. They explored the numerous historically significant locations in town. Starting at 8:30 a.m. on Aug. 9 the three visited the First Parish Church Meetinghouse, met with Derry History Museum Curator Mark Mastromarino, and visited a room

dedicated to Nutfield's Irish roots in the Derry Public Library. After some lunch at Maryann's Diner, they went on to visit Forest Hill Cemetery before finishing off at Beaver Lake; which was the site of MacGregor's very first sermon in Nutfield. According to Veitch, the footage they obtained is being developed into a documentary for the Ulster-Scotts Agency that will expand upon major Presbyterian migrations. Their journey also took them Londonderry and Belfast, Maine. "We're really hoping to lift the profile on this part of the world," Veitch noted.

On Friday, Aug. 10, the crew headed over to Londonderry, where they interviewed Londonderry Historical Society member and Museum Curator, Ann Chiampa. Chiampa gave the crew a tour of the historic buildings on the Morrison House Museum grounds and discussed much of the Nutfield history through the perspective of Londonderry.

That afternoon, the group headed back to First Parish Church where they interviewed members of the church, historical society and descendants of some of the original settlers.

They also traveled to Sandown, where they met by Arlene Basset, who opened the Sandown Meetinghouse

for them to film.

The crew was amazed at the original condition of much of the structure, and Basset filled them in on some of the history surrounding the building.

With Nutfield's 300th birthday just around the corner, the significance of this region has become of worldwide importance. Veitch noted that the history of these settlers is not well known back in her home country. Through her visit, she hopes to change that and educate more people about the shared connections between these two portions of the world.

This being her first trip to Derry, Veitch not only enjoyed her time in the town, but was also surprised to see how many ways it could be connected back to Ireland. She also took quite a liking to the history observed in the Forest Hill Cemetery and Beaver Lake. "We're discovering lots of interesting things along the way", Veitch stated.

Not surprisingly, this

is not the first time a European film crew visited Derry to explore its long and colorful history. Earlier this year, a crew from BBC Northern Ireland and Waddell Media filmed part of a mini-series titled 'Family Footsteps' which revolved around Alan and Ainsley Laughlin. They both had ancestral links with MacGregor. Their trip to Derry

was to observe the town in a similar fashion to Veitch and Gold. The highlight of their visit was the Derry Public Library, where they met with a dozen other descendants of MacGregor living in or around Derry. This provided opportunities for both sides to share stories and experiences with one another.

Londonderry High Produces Fine Coaches, Some at Pinkerton

The Londonderry High School Class of 1983 produced no less than three coaches who later went on to lead New Hampshire Division I high school sports teams to multiple state championships. And two of the three did so as coaches at rival Pinkerton Academy.

LHS '83 graduates Kerry Boles and Rob Daziel have coached Pinkerton boys' soccer and girls' lacrosse contingents respectively for lengthy spans and led both to multiple state crowns. The other member of their graduating class - Tim Dudley - led the Dover High girls' softball squad to back-to-back state titles several years ago.

Back when Boles became the head guy for the PA boys' soccer program during the 1990's it was of passing interest to folks on both sides of the great rivalry. A former Londonderry Lancer athlete and graduate making the move into both coaching and teaching at the rival

school was of some interest to some folks. But since then, well, the Derry school has had quite a few former Lancers step into teaching and high coaching roles and enjoy considerable success.

With the recent addition of former Londonderry High student-athlete and varsity football coach Jon Rich to the Pinkerton varsity football coaching staff and a physical education and health teaching job, there are now six former LHS student-athletes serving as head or assistant coaches at Londonderry's rival school.

Along with Boles, Daziel, and LHS Class of 1998 grad Rich, there are Pinkerton varsity baseball coach Steve Campo (Class of 2003), varsity softball coach Kristen Abbott (Class of 2005), and most recent grad and assistant volleyball and softball coach Megan Hersey-Evans.

Hersey is a bit more than a handful of years out of LHS and a new history and psychology teacher at the academy. Campo is a middle school teacher in Derry,

and Abbott teaches English at PA. Boles is a special education case manager and teacher at PA, while Daziel works in administration for Stonyfield Farm Yogurt in Londonderry outside his coaching duties.

For whatever reason, the cases of folks going from being a student at Pinkerton to Londonderry on their coaching roads is far more scant, with former Londonderry High varsity field hockey coach and longtime physical education and health teacher Ann MacLean - a PA graduate who last coached a varsity sport at LHS in the early 1990's - being one, and sub-varsity softball coach and English teacher Corrine Mur-

phy being the other.

When asked about the transition and feelings about having gone from being athletic stalwarts in Lancer Nation to major positions at Pinkerton, coaches Daziel, Boles, and Abbott felt that the development and education they

received from quality coaches and teachers at LHS were pivotal in getting them ready for their future roles at PA.

Daziel, the first All-American lacrosse selection in Londonderry High history back in the early 1980's, said, "We had good, invested

coaches back then. They were truly invested in the program, and I think you model yourself after the coaches you had."

Daziel, who played his entire LHS lacrosse career for New Hampshire high school legend Tom Sawyer before moving on to a fine lacrosse career for coach Don Emerson at New England College in Henniker, became the Pinkerton varsity girls' lacrosse coach in 2012 and has led that program to no less than three state titles in seven years. And he has had at least one of his four daughters playing for him in PA garb in each of those

Bernard Excels, GDTC Team First at Latest Grand Prix Event

The Greater Derry Track Club's 2018 New Hampshire Grand Prix Race Series most recent race - The Epsom Old Home Days 4-Miler this past Sunday, Aug. 12 - trailing the tough Gate City Striders' crew of Nashua for first place by a pretty significant margin.

But the proud and determined GDTC runners - who won the 2017 Grand Prix title - approached that race like they were neck and

neck with the Gate City bunch and wound up winning the Epsom event, placing some seven runners among the top 14 finishers with Hampstead resident and Pinkerton Academy teacher and coach Amy Bernard finishing first among the women.

GDTC had 31 runners take part in the Epsom event, and that crew tallied 180 points to outdistance Gate City (161) and the much smaller Upper Valley Running Club contingent (57). The Nashua team consisted of 27 runners while Upper Valley only

had 11 runners participate that damp day.

Stepping into the Epsom race the Gate City squad sat in first place with 924 points, with Greater Derry second with 641 and Upper Valley a very close third with 624. So adding in the Epsom race results, the Gate City Striders remained solidly in first with 1,085 points, Greater Derry was second with 821, and Upper Valley had fallen deeper into third with 681.

The series' remaining events are The Half-Way to Saint Patrick's Day 5K in Manchester on Sept. 9

and the Children's Hospital at Dartmouth (CHaD) Hero Half Marathon over in Hanover on Oct. 14.

Bernard was the first woman across the finish line of the 154-participant Epsom event - and 14th overall - with her finishing time of 26 minutes and 12 seconds. Ladies' runner-up Karen Long was nearly two minutes behind Bernard in 27:52.

Finishing a bit faster than ladies' champion Bernard and also scoring significant points for the victorious GDTC crew were Derry teenag-

er Luke Brennan of Derry in fourth place overall (23:43), Ethan Desmarais of Chester in fifth place, Charlie Bemis of Derry in seventh, Nick Gregory of Derry in eighth place, Rick Bernard from Hampstead in ninth, and Mike Dufour of Londonderry in 11th place.

Also notching key points for Greater Derry were Carolyn Morgenstern, Matt Persell, Genevieve Martin, Carmen Wenzel, and Stephanie Collins of Derry, and Londonderry residents Breanne Piazik and Rob Barrett.

The local running club has a great many members from local towns like Derry and Londonderry as well as from as far away as Northern Massachusetts. Other area folks who have contributed to the GDTC's strong 2018 Grand Prix efforts are Derry residents Jim Peters, Maria Checket, Caryn Pepin, Rich DiSalvo, Andrew Fongemie, Jon Schmitz, Matt Lynch, Charles Morgan, Priscilla Camarda, and Pat Crothers, and Londonderry's Colum Creed and Mike Jean.

seven seasons.

From the coaching standpoint, Daziel feels that Pinkerton is truly a special place to coach.

"I think Pinkerton is the only school I would have considered coaching at. The school is run a little different, with coaches aloud to coach," he said.

Boles, who graduated from LHS with Daziel after starring in soccer and baseball - playing on the Lancers' 1983 Class I title-winning hardball squad - has been coaching boys' varsity soccer at PA for more than 20 years and won some five state titles. The Astros' varsity boys' soccer

coach is also the only LHS grad who has been inducted into the Pinkerton Hall of Fame.

"We were prepared incredibly well by Londonderry High, we love teaching and coaching, and we know the amazing rivalry very well," he said. "It's by far the best rivalry in New Hampshire and maybe New England. And Pinkerton took a chance on all of us. I believe the Pinkerton brass knows solid coaches and teachers regardless of their secondary education and welcomes them. I have been so happy and grateful at PA for 26 years, but will never forget the foundation of my roots. Trust me though, we take a lot of grief being Lancers. But we

love it."

The head-to-head matches, whether they be normal regular season games or within Mack Plaque, Ball Family, or Beeman Trophy competitions, are always special for the former Lancer athletes and present PA coaches.

Softball coach Abbott, who played her high school softball for longtime LHS mentor Wayne MacDougall, says she and MacDougall have both looked forward to and had anxieties about their LHS/PA varsity softball contests since Abbott became the leader of the Pinkerton softball program four years ago after she'd been the Derry school's JV coach for the previous five years.

"Wayne and I always say that playing each other is both our best game and or worst game of the season," she said. "We want to beat each other so badly, but we don't want to beat each other."

The LHS grad and Pinkerton softball coach said, "I think honestly what happens is you have people who want to teach and coach at the best schools in the area, and Pinkerton and Londonderry are the best schools in the area. I think Pinkerton is such a great place to work because they look for people who are going to be invested in the school and the programs. It comes down to a ques-

tion of integrity."

Former LHS head football coach Rich assumes Pinkerton assistant coaching duties - working largely with defensive linemen and running backs - under longtime PA head man Brian O'Reilly this summer after serving as an assistant grid coach at Salem High School for the last few years.

His removal from the head coaching post at LHS after six years in that position was controversial, and then-Pinkerton athletic director Tim Powers and coach O'Reilly attended one of the final hearings on Rich's fate at a Londonderry school board meeting as a show of

support but elected not to speak.

Now, several years on - respected for his qualities as a coach, teacher, and person - Jon Rich becomes the most recent Londonderry High grad to move into a Pinkerton Academy coaching post. O'Reilly stated to members of the press after his PA boys' lacrosse team won the Division I state title this past spring that the end of his coaching days are not yet here, but they're coming. So who, one wonders, might step into O'Reilly's huge football coaching shoes once he hangs up his whistle? Another ex-Lancer perhaps?

Former Lancer Gridders Testing Mettle on the College Level

Folks who have been involved in the Londonderry High School football program since its inception have quite understandably taken considerable pride in the graduates who have gone on to play that intense sport in college. And this summer there are a bunch of LHS grads who are testing their mettle on collegiate gridirons throughout the New England region.

Among the most noteworthy is former LHS and Granite State grid star **Eric Fairweather**, who begins his senior season on a Saint Anselm College squad which is looking to overcome a pretty awful 2017 campaign.

Alas, Mr. Fairweather knows all about rebounding from lost seasons after suffering a serious ankle injury in the Hawks' season-opening game during his sophomore campaign of 2016 and spending the rest of that season, quite frustratingly, on the sidelines.

In his rebound junior campaign last year, in which the Saint Anselm squad went a poor 1-9, quarterback Fairweather played in all 10 Hawks' games and passed for 771

yards and six scores on 103-for-222 attempts with eight interceptions.

The Saint A's senior - who was an incredibly dangerous runner while serving as the signal-caller for coach Jimmy Lauzon's LHS Lancers - also frightened college opponents with his abilities to scamper and sprint while leading his 2017 Hawks in rushing with some 761 yards and nine touchdowns. Those nine scores placed him fourth in program history for touchdowns in one season.

Fairweather carried the ball 163 times, the eighth-most carries in a single season in team history. The ever-versatile former Lancer - who won the New Hampshire Gatorade Player of the Year Award in his senior high school season of 2014 - also caught one pass and punted three times during the tough 2017 campaign for his Hawks.

Fairweather generated 153.2 total yards of offense per game, ranking eighth in the New England-10 Conference. And

the Londonderry High grad is his college team's all-time leader in average yards per rush (5.48), averaging 78.5 yards per game through the end of the 2017 season. That yards per game average is the second most all-time in Hawks' history.

Fairweather created a considerable amount of excitement in the Saint A's program in his freshman campaign of 2015 - fresh off of his exceptional senior high school season - when he stepped in for several injured Hawks' veteran quarterbacks and showed plenty.

The ex-LHS stalwart appeared in eight games, starting the final seven of the season.

He was 112-of-187 for 1,058 yards passing, posting a 59.9% completion percentage and tossing seven touchdowns. He ran the ball 107 times for 716 yards and eight touchdowns, running for 100 yards or more three times that season. His career-best college rushing numbers in a single game came against Stonehill that fall, with Fairweather rushing for 177 yards on 18 carries.

One of Fairweather's former Londonderry High teammates who also played for a struggling college grid squad in 2017 was **Chris Komst**, who battled on the offensive line for the 2-8 Saint Vincent College contingent in Latrobe, Pa.

Komst appeared in seven of his squad's 10 games as a college freshman last year after serving as a two-year starter

and then a senior captain for coach Lauzon's Lancers. He is majoring in history at the Pennsylvania school.

Former LHS defensive standout **Zac Garside** begins his second season on the Plymouth State University football squad after showing quite a bit as a freshman during the 2017 season.

Garside stood out as a defensive lineman for the PSU crew, notching 19 tackles and 2.5 sacks and gobbling up two fumbles for a Panther contingent which went 9-2 overall and 7-1 in its conference. Garside is a business major.

One of the PSU coaches during the fine 2017 campaign and several previous seasons was Londonderry High grad and former standout lineman **Tom Manley**, who has now moved on to Western Connecticut State in Danbury to be that squad's new offensive line coach.

Meanwhile, out in Biddeford, Maine, former Londonderry High grid stalwart **Nick Scarfo** and his University of New England Nor'Easters' football teammates are making history for a second straight year this summer. The linebacking Scarfo played on the very first UNE grid squad during its inaugural, pre-varsity season last year. And this summer and fall he and his Nor'Easters will play their first, full-fledged varsity campaign.

As was often the case during his high school career, Scarfo came up with some big defensive

plays during the UNE team's first, 2-6 season. Among his top performances was an eight-tackle effort in a win over the Bates College junior varsity squad.

The former Lancer is working toward a communications degree at the Maine school.

Also in Maine, recent LHS graduates and former football stalwarts **Connor Dubois** and **Ben Johnson** are working toward playing time as freshmen on a Husson University Eagles' squad in Bangor which went 10-2 last year and a perfect 7-0 in the Eastern Collegiate Football Conference.

The 2017 Husson contingent graduated some 15 players, so there may be jobs for Dubois and Johnson to work their way into.

Also in Maine, just-graduated former Lancer versatile gridder **Pat Zepf** steps into a Bowdoin College (Brunswick) Bulldogs' program which suffered through a weak, 0-9 campaign last year and is 0-17 over the last two years.

Other 2018 Londonderry High and Lancer football grads who are battling for jobs on college squads right now include **Mike McAlister** at Franklin Pierce University in Rindge and **Alex Boucher** at Western New England University in Springfield, Mass. Both of those young men played for the Granite State squad in the 2018 Shrine Maple Sugar Bowl Game in Vermont earlier this month.
