Editorial **Be Prepared to Vote**

is likely to be Labor Day and the approaching end of summer, as well as the start of a new school vear; there's something else looming large in the days ahead the Primary Election on Sept. 11. The national conventions are upon us, but just as importantly, the state elections are almost here.

Locally, the focus of the primary is the Republican side, with plenty of candidates seeking a seat in the State House, as well as a contested race for Governor. The gubernatorial race has attracted more than one candidate on the Democratic ticket as well. While the big decisions are made at the November election, don't downplay the primary, especially in local races. Take advantage of the opportunity to get to know your candidates in this small state. Call them up, send them emails, ask them questions that matter to you. If you don't get an answer, that's answer enough.

The time is now to learn about the candidates, get behind the rhetoric, and decide which hopefuls merit your vote. And remember, a promise to cut taxes or to support seniors or to take care of children is not a realistic roadmap for action. Every candidate is going to smile broadly, shake as

The focus of activity this week many hands as possible, and promise wonderful things. Don't get sidetracked by the packaging.

> Be specific in your queries, and with luck, you just might receive specific responses. Then you can base your vote on substance. But if what you get are platitudes, you may want to look elsewhere.

> The candidates' responses offer a glimpse at whether they answered the question or chose to offer pat generalities or personal agendas. That, too, says something. It's become a cliché that voting is a right and a privilege, that people in other countries fight and die for a right that we often ignore. Our chance is coming up to show that we've changed our lackadaisical ways, and we've committed to getting off the couch and into the voting booth.

> Your vote counts, but it means so much more if you cast it after making a studied, educated decision, not one based on inflammatory rhetoric. You all say you want to make a difference and you want change this is your time to shine. We're in the center of political campaigns that can change the face of our state and our nation. And there's no excuse good enough to justify sitting this one out, go vote.

McCain and the other pilots were able to escape from their planes as jet fuel spilled across the flight deck, ignited and triggered a chainreaction of bomb explosions that killed 134 sailors and injured 161.

It was one of the worst Naval accidents since WWII.

Conservation Matters: Dealing with Oriental Bittersweet

MARGE BADOIS CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Te've all seen the fall decorations using these striking berries with a burst of yellow surrounding a bright orange center. This colorful vine has become a traditional symbol of fall, but did you know that this beautiful berry is really a destructive invasive plant?

Oriental bittersweet originates from Japan, Korea and China. First introduced into the U.S. around 1860, it is a serious threat to native vegetation due to its rapid growth and ease of spreading. As bittersweet grows, it spirals around the trunk of trees and can completely engulf a tree in only a few years. The stem of the vine is woody and can reach 4 inches in diameter. It wraps so tightly around the tree that it eventually strangles and kills the tree.

Oftentimes bittersweet will first appear on a property at the edge of a

The leaves become a brilliant vellow.

Colleges get a certain and expect to accept a percentage of those. This is their acceptance rate and they control that. What they don't control is their yield rate, or the percentage of accepted students that choose to enroll. This creates problems because they do not know if they will have too few or too many students. Early application options help them lock in some of their freshman class earlier bringing more certainty.

Starting with the simplest option, Regular Decision, an applicant applies by the school's deadline, often in December or January. In turn, the college gives them an answer (acceptance, waitlist or rejection) usually sometime in March. At around this time, the college also tells you what financial aid or scholarships, if any, they will offer. Accepted students have until May 1 to decide which college to attend.

Regular Decision is offered by just about all colleges, except a relatively small number that offer Rolling Admissions instead. Rolling Admission is like Regular Decision except there are not specific application deadlines. College with Rolling Admissions accept applications at any point and give yes/no decisions as applications come in. have until May 1 to decide Decision, then they are ry High School.

If a college on your list uses this methodology, it is often a good idea to apply early so that, hopefully, you can get an acceptance early in your senior year to reduce stress. Having an early admission can also help determine how many other colleges to apply to if you are happy with first admit.

Examples of some New England colleges that offer Rolling Admissions are Quinnipiac, University of Maine, Keene State, Franklin Pierce, Plymouth Southern New State. Hampshire and any community college.

Roughly 20% of fouryear colleges, about 450, offer some sort of early application option, be it Early Decision or Early Action or both. These colleges also offer Regular Decision or Rolling Admissions as options.

Under Early Action, the student applies a couple of months earlier than under Regular Decision and gets their answer a couple of months earlier. While it varies, most colleges offering Early Action have application deadlines in early November with notification of decisions in December. Accepted students still

> Examples of colleges that offer Early Decision include Dartmouth. Boston University, Tufts, Holy Cross, Northeastern and most of the NESCAC liberal arts colleges. A benefit of Early Decision rate is often higher than that of Regular Decision and sometimes higher than Early Action.




