Growing Businesses Obtain Approvals By Planning Board

Two local businesses looking to expand sites due to increased business came to the Planning Board seeking approval to expand their operations.

After sharing conceptual plans with the Planning Board in June, representatives of Reeds Ferry

returned on Sept. 5 seeking formal approval of their site plan. Reeds Ferry has been operating out of 3 Tracy Lane. With the expansion they will be using the buildings at 5 and 7 Tracy Lane after recently purchasing those properties.

Jason Hill, Project Manager from TF Morin and Laurie Blanchette,

Director of Operations at Reeds Ferry, appeared before the Board. Overall, their plans call for additional outdoor storage space to display sheds and moving parts of manufacturing into 5 Tracy Lane to free up space at 3 Tracy Lane. The plan also calls for parking and traffic flow improvements.

Town Council Gets Update on Communications Center

The Londonderry Town Council received some good news about the Communications System Upgrade during its meeting on Monday night, Sept. 10.

Londonderry's Finance Director, Doug Smith, shared what he felt was some pretty good news in regard to the Communications System Upgrade that voters had passed on the March Town Warrant.

Accompanying Smith for the presentation were Londonderry Fire Battalion Chief Jeremy Mague and Battalion Chief of

Operations Michael McQuillen.

Smith started out by reminding the council that the cost of the upgrade was going to be about \$3 million dollars.

That amount would be drawn from the town's unassigned fund balance account, \$2.3 million, as well as \$200,000 from the Police Special Detail Fund. The remainder would be funded by the proceeds received from the sale of the existing cell tower. The sale of that cell tower was estimated to be about \$500,000, but when the actual sale took place, it wound up being \$520,000, giving the town

a surplus in revenue.

To achieve the new upgrade, that one tower will now be replaced with three towers within the town boundaries.

As a way to save additional expenses, Smith explained, the project team thought about soliciting a third party to build the towers for the town.

That being, a cellular communications provider, the group began putting information together to approach some of these companies.

But before they had a chance to pitch the companies, the town was approached by Viridi

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Water Management Plan Presented to Town Council

The Londonderry Conservation Commission Chairperson, Marge Badois, addressed the Town Council during public comment section of the Town Council meeting, Sept. 10, on the need for a Water Management Plan for the town.

Badois told members that the only prior plan, and what is deemed to be the current plan was done in 1991 along with the town's Master Plan. At the time, the town's population was only about 17,000 residents, now there are an additional 10,000 residents which

draw from the same water sources.

The plan from the Conservation Commission is to fund the plan update through current conservation funds. She told the council that the group would like to send out a Request for Proposal (RFP) later this month.

The would like the plan to identify sources of water in town, understand threats, project future demand, analyze the adequacy of water supply now and for the future, and recommend ways to keep the town's water clean and plentiful.

She also clarified that the Water Quality Study that was approved earlier in the year on the Town

Warrant is completely separate from this plan. The difference being, the new plan will be looking at water quantity, not so much quality. She did however mention that the two are very related, if water quality is bad it will effect the overall quantity in town. "The two plans will create a comprehensive approach to managing water resources."

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Governor Picks First Apple in the State at Sunnycreast Farm



In an effort to raise awareness of New Hampshire apple growers as the state gets ready for another bumper crop, Governor Chris Sununu and Commissioner of Agriculture, Shawn Jasper traveled to Londonderry on Thursday, Sept. 6, to pick the first apple of the season in a ceremony at Sunnycreast Farm. Sununu and the Hicks family, who own the farm, made their way around the orchard and found the perfect Macintosh tree to pick from. Sununu commented on how it was extremely important for the state to maintain its rural character, and that Londonderry is doing a great job to that end. All the local farmers were invited to the event, which ended with Dan Hicks show the governor his kiwi and grape crops.

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SAFER Grant Brings New Fire Fighters to Londonderry

During the Public Comment section of the Town Council meeting on Monday night, Sept. 10, Londonderry Fire Chief Darren O'Brien shared some good news with the council.

O'Brien told members the Fire Department applied for and has now received word that they will be getting over \$750,000 through the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant.

O'Brien wanted to take the opportunity to thank those members of the department that worked on acquiring the funds. He thanked the Author of the grant, Lt. Don Wal-

dron, Battalion Chief James Roger, Lt. Bruce Hallowell and Battalion Chief of Operations, Michael McQuillen.

"These folks spent a lot of time during the research and putting this together, so I'd just like to recognize them," O'Brien said.

He also mentioned that this is the first time Londonderry has ever received a SAFER Grant.

He explained the way the grant worked by saying "We were awarded that money, and for the first three years it's 25 percent that is the towns portion on the first year, 25 percent on the second year, 65 percent on the third year and on the fourth year we take over

100 percent of the salaries."

O'Brien will return on Sept. 17 to look for the acceptance of the grant by the Town Council.

On Friday, Sept. 7, the Fire Department was visited by new Hampshire's U.S. Senator Jeanne Shaheen where she shared the good news about the SAFER grant with members of the department.

Shaheen noted that this was the largest amount given this year.

Shaheen wrote a letter to FEMA officials in June in support of Londonderry's bid for the SAFER grant.

With the funds re-

ceived from the grant the department will be able to hire four new full-time firefighters.

The department currently has two 10-man shifts and two 11-man shifts. The additional firefighters will see the department having continuous 12-man shifts, according to Fire Chief Darren O'Brien.

Other grants that were recently awarded to the Londonderry Fire Department were the Emergency Management Performance Grant for \$12,601. They will be upgrading the Emergency Management Trailer with additional equipment for storm



related events.

In July they got an EMS Warm Zone Grant for \$6,000 for active shooter responses, and to re-equip the department's apparatus with ballistic equipment.

Additionally: there are two grants pending, an Assistants to Fire Fighter grant for \$60,671 for two new gear extractors and dryers and a Fire Prevention Safety Grant for \$21,000. The hope is that that grant will be used for

an electronic fire simulator, for use in educating the public.

Another future Emergency Management Performance Grant being sought will be for \$200,000 once the new station is underway for the Emergency Operations Center.

During the end of his presentation to the Town Council, O'Brien thanked the staff and the Town Council for their support in acquiring these grants.

Never Forget

Do you remember what you were doing 17 years ago Tuesday, when the images and words of the Sept. 11 attacks came across the television screens? We're sure most of you will never forget that day. But Sept. 11 is more than the date of a horrific event. It also marks the day when most everything we took for granted about life in America disappeared. It's the date when we ever so briefly put aside our political and philosophical differences and came together as a nation.

That's particularly relevant this year, when Sept. 11 is also the date of the state's Primary Election. Patriotism comes in many forms, and voting is near the top of that list. It's central to the American government and way of life, central to the democracy that the attackers on Sept. 11 tried to destroy.

On that day in 2001, we understood the importance of coming together as one nation. We must remember that today.

Human beings rushed into the unknown to help out other human beings. They were emblematic of the humanity we all share and the opposite of the inhumanity exhibited by the terrorists.

In spite of our busy lives, we hope each one of us paused on Sept. 11 to recall what we lost that day, and to reflect on what is important to remember. Keeping with the survival of our democracy, we hope each one of us voted this Sept. 11.

We show our love for our country in myriad ways. We understood that after the attacks. We must remember that today, to make sure it does not happen again.

Reeds Ferry plans to expand the 10,000 sq. ft. building that housed NEGTC. In the early 2000s, the town approved a 2000 sq. ft. expansion, but NEGTC never executed the expansion., Reeds Ferry intends to do so as part of their plan.

The applicant plans to install driveways that would connect all three buildings to improve the traffic flow and keep more truck traffic off Tracy Lane. Part of the site resides in Hudson. Hill shared that the planning board in Hudson had granted conditional approval for that portion.

Town Councilor Jim Butler asked which town would respond if emergency services were required. Board member Al Sypek, a former fire chief in Londonderry, responded that both towns would respond.

The applicant requested three waivers to the site plan regulations, two related to parking and one related to lighting. Given that large trucks would be using one of the parking areas, they requested to not have interior landscaping in the lot and to have fewer trees per parking spot than normal. The lighting request was to have a different intensity than the town standard.

All three waivers were supported by town planning staff and the Board also voted 8-0 to approve both the waivers and the site plan.

Everything Essential Salon, a business looking

to move from their location at 18 Orchard View Drive to a proposed new retail and office space on Mohawk Drive made their pitch to the Board. Matt Routhier of Bedford Design Consultants led the presentation and was joined by Laura Maillet, owner of Everything Essential.

The proposed building on a 1.015-acre lot would have a two-story 2,920 square foot footprint with a salon on the first floor and a spa on part of the second floor. The remainder of the second floor would be leasable office space. The project would use an existing driveway and detention pond on the property.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment previously approved a variance allowing the project to have a smaller landscaping buffer than would normally be required. With that approval in hand, the applicant presented their plan.

They sought three additional waivers from the Board, two related to drainage and one a request to use wooden guardrails in place of the metal ones required by the town ordinance. Town planning staff supported the drainage waiver, but not the guardrail exception.

Following advice of the planning staff, the Board granted the drainage waivers and denied the proposed guardrail variance. The overall site plan was conditionally approved on a unanimous vote.

In the last case before the Board, Don Charette, owner of Wicked Good

Scoops, a planned new ice cream and café establishment on Buttrick Road came before the Board to feel out the likelihood that they would support his desire to have a crushed stone parking lot instead the asphalt one required by the town.

Earlier this summer, the Board approved the plan for Wicked Good Scoops with an asphalt parking area and driveway. Charette was hoping to amend his plan. Charette made the case that a pervious surface would be better environmentally and would be more attractive in the planned location of the business. He also pointed out that one of the parking lots at the high school, a lot at Mack's ice cream stand and several roads in town are still dirt and crushed rock.

He also shared results of an engineering study he commissioned that said for his planned use, a stone driveway and parking area would be as effective as pavement. Public Works Director, Janusz Czyzowski, spoke forcefully against the proposal, saying that pavement adds to the structural integrity of the lot and driveway and will be easier to maintain.

Board Member Peter Commerford expressed concern that in the winter it would harder to clear ice and snow, creating a dangerous situation, especially for anyone with mobility issues. In the end, all eight Board members told Charette that they would not support his request.

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LHS Offers Programs to Earn College Credit During High School

Earning college credit while still in high school can be a great way to save money on college tuition by potentially putting a student in a position to graduate early from college. Aside from cost savings, earning credit during high school can help a college student satisfy general education requirements that they would otherwise need to take.

It is important to note that while college credits earned in high school will transfer in most cases, it is not guaranteed in all cases. Each college has their own policies on transfer credits.

Londonderry High School (LHS) offers a variety of ways that students can simultaneously get college credit while meeting their high school graduation requirements. Two of the programs, Project Running Start and SNHU in the High School, are collaborations between LHS and New Hampshire colleges. While the programs are through New

Hampshire colleges, the credits earned can be used throughout the U.S. Over 190 colleges have accepted credits earned through this program.

Project Running Start is the dual enrollment/dual credit enrollment program offered by the Community College System of NH (CCSNH). Running Start is a way that students can take college courses at their high school at a reduced tuition cost.

In this program, students take courses at LHS that are part of the Running Start program and taught by teacher that meets or exceeds the hiring qualifications for CCSNH faculty. The course work and materials must meet the college level content standards.

There is an extra fee of \$150 per course. However, this is a small fraction of the cost of a typical college course. At the successful completion of the class the student will have both a high school credit and a college transcript with credit.

LHS currently offers twenty-two Running Start

courses in the areas of sciences, math, technology, business and teaching including a mix of standard college prep courses and honors/AP courses.

Within Running Start, funding is available for students to take up to two STEM courses (science, technology, engineering and math) per year. Students in designated STEM and STEM related courses can be reimbursed for these Running Start courses after successful completion of the course by obtaining a C or better for a final grade. Reimbursements will occur after final grades are verified.

SNHU in the High School is very similar to Running Start except students take dual enrollment courses that show up on a Southern New Hampshire University transcript. While the credits appear on a SNHU transcript, credits are generally transferable to other colleges and universities (policies vary by school). Courses are taken at LHS.

SNHU in the High School courses require a

\$100 fee for a three-credit course and an additional \$25 if a lab is part of the course. Fourteen eligible courses at LHS aligned with this program cover areas including art, language, math, science, English, music, geography and public speaking.

Advanced Placement (AP) courses are another possible way to earn college credit. Students taking these accelerated courses at LHS take an AP exam near the end of the course. Students scoring a 3 or higher on any AP examination may receive college credits or advance into the second semester of required freshman course(s).

AP tests are scored on a 1-5 scale. While some colleges give credit for a score of 3, many require a 4 or 5 to get credit. Generally, the more competitive colleges require higher scores. For example, UNH gives credit for a 3 in some cases, but in other cases they require a 4 or 5. Some colleges may limit the amount of AP credit they will give, so that even if the student gets high scores on several AP exams, the college may limit credit to fewer courses.

At LHS, there are fourteen AP courses offered in math, English, language, history, political science, psychology, computer science and art.

There is also the Early College Program where students attend Nashua Community College or Manchester Community College and pay \$300 for each course, earning col-

lege credit. This can be a pathway to UNH or other public NH colleges through the New Hampshire Transfer Connections Program.

In this program students spend two years at a community college and then transfer to UNH. LHS

students can begin this program after their sophomore year. Students can physically take courses at the college or take online courses. LHS currently has 15 students in this program.

ing out water resources here in on."

She reiterated that the Conservation Commission will fund and direct the effort with the help of town staff, planning and public works, she also thought that local business owners should be part of the committee looking at the study.

Once the company doing the study is hired, they will be required to supply feedback to town boards and committees.

The hope is for the study to begin by December of this year, to allow the work to be completed

Wireless LLC, a partner of AT&T. AT&T was recently awarded the nationwide FIRSTNET Project, which is upgrading the national infrastructure of emergency communications nationwide.

Viridi expressed interest in installing not only the three that are planned, but an additional fourth tower, one of them would be near the Londonderry Town office.

Smith went on to explain that if Viridi Wireless would be constructing the towers, the town would avoid that cost, which is a significant portion of the total for the

upgrade.

In addition, Smith explained, once these towers are constructed, there would be space to lease space to other cellular providers, thus bringing additional revenue to the town of Londonderry. "There would be the potential of providing space for a total of five other providers, with AT&T being one of those," he said.

Smith went on to say that the representative from Viridi thought there would be a high likelihood of multiple carriers to have interest in this space, which would create a revenue stream.

When asked about the amount on the potential savings, Smith recalled the amount to be about \$300,000.

Residential use will also be helpful toward eliminating dead zones in town.

As a result of this potential construction, the town would still own the property and would be leasing the tower.

Viridi will be doing a site visit next week to see how feasible the project is.

The communications project was scheduled to be completed by August or September of next year.

The council was excited in the opportunity, but cautioned Smith to

engage the Town Counsel, and make sure there are no potential problems.

In other business:

- During the Public Hearing portion of the meeting, the town council approved receiving a grant for Londonderry to participate in a three-day training exercise of the Southern New Hampshire Special Operations Unit. The total cost for the town to participate in the exercise is \$14,927. The grant that was requested was for \$12,546 and the Southern New Hampshire Operations Unit itself is funding the remainder of the amount, thus there will be no cost to the town.

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Eversource To Launch Power Line Inspections Via Drones

At the turn of the twentieth century, the use of drones was limited to the military, mainly in areas too dangerous for human navigation. Fast forward to the early years of this decade, and these flying devices have been used more and more for commercial civilian use, from making long distance deliveries to recreational flying over the yard. Now, they will be used to improve electrical service for residents of New Hampshire.

After having been using them for trial inspections since 2016, New England electrical company Eversource will be launching their drone inspection project to more efficiently inspect power lines throughout

New Hampshire.

Eversource conducted its first trial drone inspection in New Hampshire in 2016 in Nashua. Prior to that, the company had done similar inspections in Massachusetts and Connecticut, the other states they service.

The aerial devices will provide Eversource with a close look at high-voltage energy infrastructure spanning remote, hard-to-reach areas, providing higher quality images that will allow Eversource agents to see aging and damage that might not have been caught as well in the past.

"Drone technology offers a safe, cost-effective and environmentally-friendly way to perform required inspections of electrical lines, structures, and equipment," said Eversource NH Vice

President of Electric Operations, Joe Purington. "This high-tech solution provides a critical, bird's-eye view, enabling use to identify any potential issues in an effort to ensure our customers have the energy they need for every moment of their lives."

By using these drones, the energy company will be able to minimize the need for periodic inspections by low-flying helicopters, reducing the use of fossil fuels and lowering the costs associated with annual inspections, which are paid for by Eversource customers. Drone inspections will also minimize the need for vehicle access to inspect equipment in environmentally sensitive areas.

"When you combine the cost of the helicopters doing a comprehensive

inspection, along with foot patrols, the drone inspection is more economical." Said Carol Burke, manager of transmission line operations in Eversource New Hampshire.

The drones will be manned by certified operators and the use of the devices will be limited to inspections of Eversource equipment and will not compromise the privacy of nearby property owners.

The operators manning the drones will be from Mesa Associates Inc, a full service engineering, procurement, and construction management firm. According to Burke, the work for Eversource will only be done by licensed pilots and will solely focus on the infrastructure in question.

Burke commented on the professionalism of

these pilots, stating that they are willing to speak with customers about concerns and are happy to show them what they are working on.

Allen Tweed, Pilot for Mesa Associates, assured Eversource that a big part of their training was focused on customer privacy and the infrastructure at hand, said Kaitlyn Woods, Media Specialist for Eversource.

Tweed further spoke to Mesa's experience with drone inspections, having worked with four other companies around the country conducting similar inspections, and that Eversource will be their biggest project to date. Tweed explained that Mesa has been doing these sorts of inspections for over two years, with its pilots having been operating drones for sev-

eral years before that.

Mesa has over 120 registered engineers who can support the project, Tweed said, so if customers need additional services they will be able to assist.

Customers need not worry about being caught off guard by the flying objects' inspections. Burke stated that residents will be sent a letter a week or two ahead of time with information including when and where the drones will be scheduled to do inspections. These letters will include a phone number for customers to call with any questions or concerns ahead of time.

Leach Library Lets People Know Who John Winant Was

You would be surprised how many significant historical figures can be lost to modern times. Despite being the Governor of N.H. and an Ambassador to the United Kingdom for the United States, John Gilbert Winant is a seldom mentioned figure in this day and age. One self-taught historian hopes to bring Winant's accomplishments

to light, as Richard Heese will be holding a presentation on Winant on Sept. 13 at the Leach Library to delve into his life and accomplishments.

Although Heese has a fascination with history; he is actually a retired lawyer. He has been doing other historical figures, free speech, and the constitution. His attention was eventually diverted towards Winant in 2010, when the latter's presence

peaked again with the release of Lynne Olson's biography *Citizens of London: The Americans Who Stood with Britain in Its Darkest, Finest Hour*. The book expands on three people who tried to win American's over to the side of Britain while they were under attack from Nazi Germany. These were: CBS Broadcast Journalist Edward Murrow, American Businessman and politician Averell Harriman and,

Winant. Coupled with the fact that both Heese and Winant have ties to Concord, Heese felt that Winant deserved a more in-depth analysis. "I decided to look into his life a little bit", Heese stated.

Born in New York City, Winant attended St. Paul's School in Concord and Princeton before working at St. Paul's for 4 years. He then served as a State House Representative and in the United States Army Air Service. He then became a State Senator in 1920. He was elected to be NH State Governor from 1925 to 1927 and from 1931 to 1935. During his terms: he established a minimum wage act for women and children, and an emergency credit act. He was the first

governor whose state filled the quota in the Civilian Conservation Corps. President Roosevelt went on to appoint him as the first head of the Social Security Board in 1935. He then became the head of the International Labor Office in Geneva, Switzerland in 1939.

Arguably his most prominent role came in 1941 when President Roosevelt appointed Winant to be the United States Ambassador to Britain. His predecessor, Joseph P. Kennedy, Sr., was in support of appeasing the Axis Powers. But upon succeeding Kennedy, Winant firmly sided with the United Kingdom, encouraging the British public at a time when they needed it the

most, even though the United States would not declare war against the Axis Powers until late that year. He managed to develop close contacts with King George VI and Winston Churchill. Upon returning home in 1946, President Truman would appoint him the United States Representative to UNESCO that year. Regrettably, the war compiled with trouble in his marriage, and mountains of debt led him to commit suicide via gunshot to the head in 1947. Heese will be going into far greater detail about Winant's life and legacy, and will be starting the free presentation at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 13 at the Leach Library.

Lancer Football Squad Overcomes Miscues to Best Blue Devils

Turnovers be damned, the Londonderry High School football squad showed enough mental toughness and clutch play on both sides of the ball to be able to best the visiting Salem High Blue Devils 28-21 at LHS Friday evening, Sept. 7.

Trailing 21-14 early in the third quarter, the Lancers scored late in that quarter to knot the score and then bagged the winning points with less than three minutes to go in the fourth period on a short run by junior star Jeff Wiedenfeld.

The hosts, who were looking forward to playing the Salem High troop after starting their 2018 campaign with a romp over the Portsmouth High Clippers on the seacoast the previous Friday night, fumbled the football away no less than four times but still managed to vanquish the Blue Devils.

"When our schedule came out and we saw Salem week two, we said 'We can jump into the driver's seat or we can play from behind.' This doesn't mean we're going to stay on top the rest of the way, but it feels good not to have to chase anybody," said coach Jimmy Lauzon right after the contest as his players celebrated

like they'd just won a playoff game.

The hosts put the game's first points up on the board after Salem went three plays and out on the opening series.

Starting from its own 41-yard-line, the LHS offense took 11 plays to reach pay-dirt on a 3-yard scoring toss from senior quarterback Evan Cormier to junior wide-out Alex Tsetsilas. Senior kicker Zack Chau added the first of his four point-after boots and the score sat at 7-0. And Cormier would go on to have a productive night for his crew along with touchdown machine Wiedenfeld.

However, the Lancer lead would only last 1:24 as Salem responded with a three-play series concluding with a 72-yard scoring run by Riley Mulvey and the PAT to knot the score at 7-7.

However, the hosts went back up 14-7 before period one concluded as a seven-play drive culminated with a 2-yard scoring push by Wiedenfeld with 2:44 to go in the quarter.

But the Devils knotted the score back up at 14-14 with just two ticks of the clock left in the first when they ran a five-play series which culminated in a 47-yard scoring sprint by fullback Domenic Paci.

But the second quarter wound up being rather nightmarish for the locals who coughed up the pigskin no less than three times in those 12 minutes, with two of the fumbles ending drives and the third coming on an attempted punt-return. The first of those turnovers came, quite frustratingly, inside the Salem 10 as the Lancers were within sniffing distance of the go-ahead score.

But Salem wasn't able to do any scoring in the quarter either as they fumbled the ball away once and then had an 18-yard field goal try blocked. So the teams adjourned for halftime with the score deadlocked at 14-14.

Londonderry got the ball first to start the second half but went three plays and out, and the Devils responded with an economical and productive series which produced a 60-yard run followed by a 2-yard scoring sprint to pay-dirt.

Londonderry would not trail for long, however, as it knotted the game tally up at 21-21 on a four-play series which culminated with a 10-yard scoring sprint by Wiedenfeld.

The Lancers' pivotal defensive stand came late in the third period and into the fourth, with

Salem concluding the third with a first down situation on the LHS 18.

The Lancer defense clamped down and shut down several consecutive plays, leaving the visitors in a fourth down situation on which they failed and handed the ball over on downs with 10:14 to go in regulation time.

The Lancers then dove into an offensive series which covered 79 yards on 14 plays, chewed up nearly eight big minutes, and ended with a 6-yard scoring jaunt by who else but Wiedenfeld.

Now leading 28-21 with 2:57 remaining, the Lancers squashed a comeback-minded Salem series which withered at the LHS 34.

Stowell then went on to net her second goal

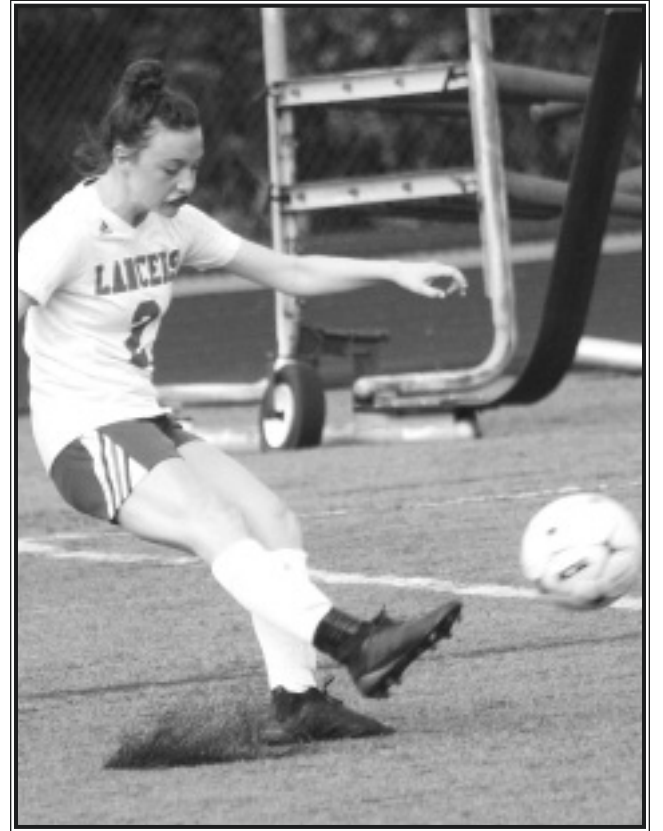
and her third point of the period in the 20th minute of the first half - with an assist from Abbie Ellis - and the Lady Lancers were up 4-0 rolling into the break.
