Big Election Turnout for General Election In Town

Harsh weather did not deter a big voter turnout in Londonderry at the 2018 midterm elections on Tuesday Nov. 6. Locals residents came to the Londonderry High School gymnasium to vote in large numbers, despite a cold day with hard rain falling in the afternoon and evening. Election voting went mostly smoothly, though with a few rough edges and a historic midterm turnout from over 10,000 voting constituents.

Traffic backed up during the peak morning and

evening voting periods with some gridlock at times required patience. Londonderry Police orchestrated traffic control efforts in an effort to move people efficiently to the voting poll. Some people parked their vehicles a walking distance away from the polling location, as it was sometimes quicker to walk than driving the last 1/2 mile or so to the polling area to vote.

Another bump in the road for the Londonderry election was that the already printed ballot had to be reprinted shortly before the election due to a candidate ballot change.

The ballot reprint happened because Alex Rego, a Democrat running for State Representative moved out of town in mid October making him ineligible for office and the Secretary of State's office was not notified of his ineligibility until Oct. 22. Martha Smith was selected by the Democratic Party as a replacement candidate on Oct. 30, the last possible day for a ballot change. The 16,000 new ballots were available, distributed and counted on election day.

Also of note, democratic candidate Luisa Piette, running for State

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Planning Concerned About Cross Farm Traffic Safety

Representatives of Cross Farm started the review process for proposed phases 2 and 3 of their 55+ community on Route 102. They presented at the Nov. 7 Planning Board meeting, focusing on traffic considerations related to the project.

Phases 2 and 3 would include 86 new single-family homes, a clubhouse and roads within the development including one connecting to Adams Rd. Most of the 21 houses in phase 1 have been constructed and some are now occupied.

A traffic engineering

shared preliminary results of traffic estimates for Route 102 and Adams Road. The engineer said that they estimated traffic levels for 2019 and 2029 with an assumption for 2029 that Woodmont Commons is fully built out.

With all 200 Cross Farm houses occupied according to future phases, the engineer estimated that in the morning, 69 cars would exit or enter the development during the peak hour. During the evening peak, 82 cars would enter or exit. He pointed out that given the expected age distribution of the residents, the traffic entering and exiting would be much lower

than a regular subdivision.


Member Mary Wing Soares questioned the assumption that not many people 55 years or older still work and asked what the traffic would be if the subdivision was not 55+ housing. The engineer replied that the peak traffic hour would have 200 cars in the morning and

Everest Paul Smith, Jr.



Everest Paul Smith, Jr., 85, of Londonderry, NH, passed away Sunday, Nov. 11, surrounded by his loving family in Community Hospice House, Merrimack, NH. He was born in Springfield, MA on May 4, 1933, a son of Everest Smith and Jessie Virginia Walsh Barnes. He proudly served his country in the US Marine Corps. While serving in the military, Everest began a lifelong career of athletic coaching. He began as a basketball coach in the Marine Corps and led the team to victory. Everest coached football at Michigan State College while earning his Master's Degree in Kinesiology. He also coached varsity football and varsity ice hockey at Burlington High School, Burlington, VT, where he led both teams to two state championships each during the 1970s, and coached hockey at St. Michael's College, Winooski, VT. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from St. Michael's College, represented the College as a Vermont Champion Golden Gloves boxer in 1954 and 1955, and was inducted into the St. Michael's Hall of Fame in 2005. With his wife Lorraine, Everest created the Everest P. Smith, Jr. Endowed Scholarship at St. Michael's College to benefit engaged and involved students. Everest taught physical education at Edmunds Middle School for 31 years. Everest was an umpire for both high school and college baseball and held the position of VT State Rules Interpreter for many years. He especially enjoyed being the Official Scorekeeper for the Vermont Lake Monsters Minor League Baseball team during the summers for over fifteen years. Everest was an active member of St. Jude Parish in Londonderry (and had been an active member of St. Marks Church in Burlington, VT). He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, the St. Jude book study group and assisted at the Vacation Bible School. He held many titles in his life but the ones he was most fond of were "Coach" and "Papa".

He is survived by his two daughters, Karen Boccia and Kristin Smith and husband Nicholas Baer; two sons, Murray Smith and wife Debby and Brian Smith and wife Susan Cohen; son-in-law, James Boccia, nine grandchildren, Nicholas, James and Alyssa Boccia, Marliese, Lili and Elias Baer, William MacKinnon, Rebeccah Edison, and Tim Cohen; four siblings, Carole Goodrich, John Barnes, Thomas Barnes and Kevin Barnes, as well as many nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by his beloved wife Lorraine (Murray) Smith in 2013.

Funeral services will be held on Friday, Nov. 16, at St. Jude Parish, 435 Mammoth Rd., Londonderry. Adoration and Divine Mercy will be from 9 - 10 a.m. concluding with reciting of the Rosary. An hour of visitation will be held from 10 - 11 a.m. followed by a Mass of Christian Burial to begin at 11 a.m. Cremation to follow. The burial will be at a later date in Resurrection Park, S. Season for Giving and Giving Thanks

The season is rapidly ramping up to its frantic pace for overindulging on Thanksgiving and buying too much for Christmas. But one of the nice things about living here is the generosity that comes out in full force as well at the holidays. Whether it's a free, church-sponsored Thanksgiving dinner hosted and prepared for anyone and everyone who, regardless of their financial status, seem ready to dig into their pockets to help those less fortunate. As an aside, recent national news stories report that wealthier people donate less of their income proportionately to charity than people whose incomes are lower.

Our pages are filled with announcements of coat, hat and scarf collection drives; boot collections; food pantry requests; and wished for gifts for the needy. It starts young, with school children collecting pennies and clothing to help others, older students hosting more extensive collection drives, and adults contributing time, money or gifts to help "adopted" families not in a position to buy gifts for the holidays otherwise.

Local drives make it feasible for most people to help out. Children grow out of their clothes, and clothing drives, particularly for winter items, are a great place to

recycle those items and know that they are going to someone in need. Living in a state without a sales tax, we often don't carry around the pennies we get back from purchases, and a penny drive to aid the less fortunate is a great use for those coins.

Then there are food and gift needs for local families, usually collected under the auspices of food pantries and churches and "giving trees." Buying a few extra cans of soup or packages of macaroni and cheese may make the difference to a local family experiencing hard times, but have little impact on the giver's household budget.

We live in an affluent area, and we don't often see visible indications of need. But organizations like Family Promise, which provides shelter for local homeless families, or the busy food pantries in each of our towns, are strong indicators that while we are surrounded by the trappings of comfort, they don't include everyone. So when you plan your gift giving this year, think of your neighbors as well. And if you have some spare time on your hands, consider helping out at free meals, soup kitchens, or fundraisers for the holidays. It's a rewarding way to express the spirit of the coming season.

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Conservation Officially Open Mathes Trail In Musquash

Late in 2017 a collaboration between New Hampshire Fish and Game and the Southeast Land Trust led to the conservation and additional of the former Mathes property to the Musquash Conservation Area. The parcel, designated the Musquash Swamp Wildlife Management Area by Fish and Game, protects wildlife that call the Musquash home including deer, rabbits, bear, reptiles, amphibians, and turkey.

On Nov. 4, members of the Conservation Commission together with community volunteers held a trail work morning to clear and open the Mathes Trail. They continued work started by Justin Jolicoeur who has been working on improvements to the Musquash as part of his Eagle Scout project.

The roughly half mile trail starts at the cul-de-sac on Preserve Drive and connects to the Heron Trail, providing easy access to the more than 20-mile network of trails in the over 1,000 acre Musquash.

The trail runs along a

former logging road that was littered with logs and brush before the volunteers cleared a four-foot wide path. In several places, the trail was wet and muddy, so the group set the trail in dry areas, clearing small trees as needed to make way around the low areas.

In addition, the group dug through dirt and rocks to set posts to hold Mathes trail signs including one at the start. Near the junction with the Heron Trail, the group noticed a small beaver dam that was causing water to back up and flood the Heron Trail. Using a pick axe, shovel and bare hands, the group cleared the dam beginning the process of lowering the water level.

With Fish and Game owning and managing the property, the Conservation Commission had to get their permission to create the Mathes Trail. Normally, Fish and Game does not allow trails on their properties because the presence of the public can impact wildlife on the property. They do, however, allow hunting.

As part of the project, Fish and Game required that any other existing trails on the parcel be

removed. One such unofficial trail, informally called the Piper Trail was blocked off during the work day. That trail connects off the Porcupine Ridge Trail running down to the Mathes Trail. The Commission hopes that the public will stop using the Piper Trail, so that Fish and Game will continue to allow public use of the parcel via the Mathes Trail.

The new trailhead on Preserve Drive becomes the fifth Musquash access point in Londonderry, joining the trailheads on Hickory Hill Drive, Sara Beth Lane, Tanager Way and Faucher Road.

Rep. said she received a death threat, and was accompanied to the polls under police protection. Piette took out a temporary restraining order against a suspect named Mark Bowlen of Dover N.H. At the time of the court filing, there appeared to be no fixed address for the suspect and police were still looking for the suspect the week after the election. A court date to move the restraining order forward is set for December, subject to the suspect's whereabouts and further police/legal investigation. No malicious physical event related to this threat occurred during or immediately after the election.

Statewide, Democrats won overall control of the New Hampshire House, the State Senate, and the Executive Council.

Locally, Londonderry

voters cast a majority of votes for many of the Republican candidates including Chris Sununu for Governor, Eddie Edwards for U.S. Congress, Ted Gatsas for Executive Council, Chuck Massahos as Sheriff, and Sharon Carson as State Senator. Londonderry Republicans David Lungren, Betsy McKinney, Sherman Packard, Doug Thomas, Al Baldasaro, and Tom Dolan were elected as State Reps with Democrat Anne Warner becoming the lone Democrat of the Londonderry Fifth District.

Londonderry Native Serving as Member of Elite Navy Honor Guard

As the nation pauses to remember those who serve our country, a 2000 Londonderry Senior High School graduate and Londonderry, New Hampshire, native has special responsibilities serving with the U.S. Navy Ceremonial Guard in Washington D.C.

Chief Petty Officer Kathryn McCarthy was selected to serve in the highly respected group

operating out of Washington, D.C.

"I have been humbled in more ways than I can express," said McCarthy. "Participating in high-visibility ceremonies and events, but most importantly, the humbling experience of leading funerals out at Arlington National Cemetery and handing off the flag of our nation to their loved ones while not being able to show any emotion is very moving."

Established in 1931, the United States Navy

Ceremonial Guard is the official Ceremonial Unit of the U.S. Navy.

McCarthy credits success in the Navy to many of the lessons learned in their hometown of Londonderry.

"It's been over 18 years since I have resided in my hometown, but I often reflect and remember all those who watched me grow up and be there when I joined the Navy," said McCarthy. "No matter how tough or challenging something is, I try hard remember those who were and still are here for me today and know that they are extremely proud of what I have accomplished in my Navy career. A special thanks to my Dad, John McCarthy (Navy veteran) and the American Legion Post 27 veterans."

The Ceremonial Guard's primary mission is to represent the Navy in the Nation's Capital under the scrutiny of the highest-ranking officials of the United States and foreign nations, including royalty.

Sailors of the Ceremonial Guard are hand selected while they are attending boot camp at Recruit Training Com-

mand in Great Lakes, Illinois. Strict military order and discipline, combined with teamwork, allow the Ceremonial Guard to fulfill their responsibilities with pride and determination. They are experts in the art of close order drill, coordination, and timing.

Casket bearers carry the Navy's former service members to their resting ground in Arlington National Cemetery and other veteran cemeteries.

The firing party renders honors, such as a


gun salute, the signature honor of military funerals, during every Navy Funeral at Arlington National Cemetery.

McCarthy and other sailors know they are part of a legacy honoring service and sacrifice of men and women on this historic occasion, while representing the Navy the nation needs.

Serving in the Navy, McCarthy is learning about leadership and responsibility, among many other skills required of

military service.

"I have had the distinct opportunity to be a part of the one percent who serve in the military," said McCarthy. "To have already served 18 years and close to eligible for retirement, serving in the Navy now means that I have to work on my legacy and prepare the junior sailors who will lead our nation and Navy into the future. 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Math Team Hosts Meet at Londonderry High School

The future is bright for many of New Hampshire's talented high school Math students who competed at the Tri-State Math League meet this week at Londonderry High School (LHS). Londonderry hosted High School area math teams on Nov. 7 in a battle of exceptional math students and LHS placed fourth in the Division I competition.

Mathematics students who compete in the league can also be selected for N.H. State teams where the competition is fierce as scholarship money is rewarded.

Pinkerton Academy was the DI winner, beating out place Portsmouth, who took second; Timber-

lane Reg. High was third. The Tri-State Math League consists of these 10 schools that compete in 6 meets a year in two divisions that are based on the size of the school. Londonderry and Pinkerton compete in Division I. Each student at the meet competes individually in three of five math categories and also in a team round. The combined individual + team scores determine the competition winner. The recent meet used math problems derived from five math categories: Arithmetic (Evaluations), Exponents and Radicals, Linear Functions, Polygons and Rational Expressions & Equations. You don't have to be a math genius to know this contest requires much mental skill and

puts a focus on truly talented mathematicians.

Teams are typically comprised of the top student math wizards - as recognized from school math classes. Pinkerton and LHS have Varsity math teams that send ten students to each meet with no more than 5 seniors and no more than 8 juniors and seniors as part of that team. There is also a Junior Varsity team open to Freshmen, Sophomores, Juniors or Seniors interested in becoming members of the Varsity math team. Teams have regular math practices derived from math problems used at previous meets and then utilized to sharpen their skills.

Londonderry's Math Team program is lead by

Advisor and Team Coordinator, Mike Wenger who teaches mathematics at LHS and is also a leader for the NH State math teams. Wenger uses a variety of math resources to promote and enable the team members to optimize their math team capabilities.

Individuals involved in the math team program have an opportunity to be selected to compete at national levels through N.H. State meets held at various locations across the country during the year. Selected students first compete at regional levels as a part of the NH State Math Team. A NH State event has been held at the Harvard MIT Math Tournament this month and future meets will be held - with Harvard/MIT

Continued from page 1 evening entering and exiting Cross Farm.

The engineer shared that based on the expected traffic New Hampshire DOT (NHDOT) has agreed to the addition of a right turn only lane westbound and a left turn only lane

eastbound. However, the installation of a stop light was not planned. He said that cars exiting Cross Farm on to Route 102 would be expected to wait up to minutes based on the volume and speed of traffic.

Exiting onto Adams Road would typically not require a wait because of

the lesser traffic on that road. He said that the site distances along Adams Road would meet town standards.

Ann Chiampa asked if passing on a dotted yellow was allowed on Route 102 near the development. The engineer confirmed that it is, but that as part of the development, the road striping would be changed to double yellow lined to prevent passing.

Giovanni Verani questioned why a traffic light was not planned. The engineer said that the volume of traffic did not warrant a traffic light according to accepted industry standards. Wing Soares asked that with a speed limit of 55 MPH, why not put a light that triggered on a sensor when cars needed to exit onto Route 102. The engineer felt that adding a light there was

more likely to cause rear end crashes on Route 102.

A representative from Stantec who was hired by the town to review the traffic analysis, agreed that NHDOT would be unlikely to support placement of a traffic light on Route 102.

Member Roger Filio asked the engineer if the town could ask to have the speed limit lowered by the state. The engineer said that the state would be unlikely to lower the speed limit. He suggested the town put up electronic "This Is Your Speed" signs along the road to remind people to slow down. The Stantec representative was more optimistic that the state might be willing to entertain a change given the addition of significant residential housing.

Planning Board liaison from the Town Council,

Jim Butler reminded the board that Londonderry purchased a parcel along Route 102 and then sold it to Cross Farm to allow them to create the entrance on Route 102. The original plan was to have the only entrance on Adams Road which the town objected to since it is not built to handle that level of traffic.

Several board members expressed concern that if the Route 102 exit appeared dangerous, more residents of the development would use the Adams Road exit adding traffic on that road. They also speculated that while drivers might start on Adams Road they would most likely end up at another Route 102 intersection that would be just as dangerous as the one at Cross Farm.

The review of the project was continued until

December 12 to continue the traffic discussion as well as review other aspects of the project.

In other business, the Planning Board unanimously approved a request by the developer of Wallace Fram to convert the current and future buildings at Wallace Farm to a condominium form of ownership. Previous approvals for the workforce housing development would continue to be enforced.

Fifty-percent of the units would still be rented at workforce housing rates with the other half at regular market rates. The developer requested the change to condominiums to make it possible to finance the project through the Hew Hampshire Housing Finance Authority because they have had trouble getting traditional financing.

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

Ex-Lancer Cody Ball Makes Big Impact on St. A's Squad

In about four months, Cody Ball is going to play his last basketball game for Saint Anselm. The ex-Londonderry Lancer star, who had aspirations to become a professional basketball player overseas, changed his mind, and will be going to grad school next year to study Physical Therapy. But before that, he wants to leave Saint Anselm the way he left the Lancers - as someone you will not forget anytime soon. And judging the way his senior season for the Hawks started, it looks like this is exactly what is going to happen.

Last weekend, Saint Anselm participated in the Bentley Tip-Off Classic in Waltham, Mass. Ball had a tremendous 29 point game, 10-for-13 from the field, 5-for-7 for three, that led the Hawks to an easy 101-69 win against Bloomfield.

Ball, who graduated from Londonderry High School in 2015, entered his senior season with the Hawks last week, and will continue to play NCAA's Division II basketball. The Hawks reached last year's bracket after finishing the season with a 22-8 record, but lost to Saint Rose 83-71 in the first round. Their expectations remain high entering the new season and Ball is a big part of it.

"I would love to win another NE10 tournament championship", Ball said, "And I would love to get a regional championship, because that is the one

highlight of my career I haven't achieved yet".

The six-foot-three guard played for the Londonderry Lancers for four years and also served as team captain. He was named a New Hampshire Scholar and was a New Hampshire Interscholastic Athletic Association (NHIAA) Student-Athlete Award recipient. He led the Lancers to an undefeated season, in which the team eventually won the Division 1 State Championship and he was chosen as the NHIAA Division 1 Player of the Year after leading all of Division 1 in point scoring.

"Londonderry High School developed me to the player I am today", he says, "Coach Stanton helped me tremendously in my last two years there, when I started to get on the map as a top player in the state. He helped me develop my skill set and the mental part of the game. I owe a lot to him and all the coaches I had there. I am still in touch with them and I try to make it to one or two games every year".

Ball was also named Mr. New Hampshire Basketball and King of New Hampshire Basketball. It is easy to see why expectations were high when he went on to play for Saint Anselm. And after his first three years there, it is also easy to say that he was able to live up to those expectations.

In his freshman season for the Hawks, Ball appeared in all the Hawks'

31 games, including three times in the starting line-ups. He averaged 5.5 points per game for the season, in 18.5 minutes and was part of the Saint Anselm Fall Dean's List, the Saint Anselm Spring Dean's List, the Northeast-10 Fall Commissioner's Honor Roll and the Northeast-10 Spring Commissioner's Honor Roll.

Ball's sophomore season saw him becoming a starter for the Hawks and he was part of the lineup for all the team's 29 games that season. This season (2016-17), he jumped into 13.2 points per game average and his playing time increased

significantly, all the way to 33.1 minutes per game. His best performance for the college came on March 4; a 26 points game (including 6-for-10 from

beyond the arc) that helped Saint Anselm beat Southern New Hampshire 73-68. He finished that season as the NE10 Tournament MVP and of course, part of the All-Tournament Team.


Ball kept his spot in the starting five for the Hawks during all of last season, playing every game out of the team's 31. He improved to 14.7 points per game, ranking second in the team in that category. He scored more three pointers at home than any other team member - 91 threes, the eighth highest number in Hawks history. He also led the team in blocks with 23 and was ranked third in steals with 28. He finished his junior season with the 18th best three point percentage in Division 2, second best in the NE10 (.448) and enjoyed a new career high after scoring 28 points against Franklin Pierce on Nov. 15, including shooting 11-for-13 from the field. He was selected for the Northeast-10 Conference Third Team All-Conference.

"The biggest difference in my game today, if you compare it to my freshman season, is how my confidence has built over this past years. I always had the ability and talent to play in this level, just needed to work on my confidence".

After spending some time with his teammates in Italy and Vatican City over the summer, where they also faced the European Basketball Academy (Ball scored 26 points in the first game), the Hawks kicked off their season successfully on Nov. 2 with a 95-63 knockout win over Bishop University in an exhibition contest in Manchester. The game was over by halftime, when Saint Anselm was leading 57-29 and Ball contributed 14 points in 23 minutes, shooting 5-for-8 from the field, including 4-for-6 for three.

The Hawks will have their final exhibition game this Saturday, before playing their first conference game of the season, home against Stonehill on Nov. 20.

Soccer at Keene State:

Colum Creed (freshman, midfielder), **Luca Amerena** (freshman, forward) and **Zachary DeLeo** (freshman, midfielder) Three LHS alumni were part of the Keene State Owl's team that reached the Little East Conference Championship Game, where they suffered a 2-1 overtime loss to Western Connecticut State University. The team won 13 games during the season, while losing only six times. They ranked number two in the LEC, winning the semifinals 1-0 against UMass Boston before falling in the title match.

Amerena enjoyed much success, getting 14 appearances and being selected three times for the starting 11. He finished the season with one assist in a 2-1 win against Colby-Sawyer on Sept. 2. Creed took the field once during the season and DeLeo didn't see any playing time, but both can change that next season, as sophomores.

Saint Anselm College:

Eric Fairweather (senior, QB) - Football at Saint

Anselm: The Hawks' season wasn't a pretty one and their 33-10 home loss to Pace last Saturday brought their record to 1-8. Fairweather played in each of Saint Anselm's nine games this year, completing 201 passes from 410 attempts for 1,937 yards, the sixth best season ever for the college (215.2 yards per game, 4.7 yards per attempt). He had 13 touchdowns and threw 15 interceptions.

Fairweather's best game this season was the first one, a crazy 57-54 loss to Stonehill, where he had 313 yards and five touchdowns. He also had a 359 yards, three touchdowns game in a 31-28 loss to Merrimack on Oct. 20th, and threw for 319 yards and a couple of touchdowns in Saint

Anselm's single victory, 29-21 over American International.

Josh Rutina (freshman, midfielder) - Soccer at Saint Anselm: after playing soccer and baseball at LHS, the former Division 1 All-State player was part of a rough season in Saint Anselm, where the Hawks were able to win just one game, the last of the season, while losing 11 times and drawing three. Rutina saw action in the last three games of the season.

Plymouth State

Zac Garside (sophomore, DL) - Football at Plymouth State: The Panthers football team lost her Senior Day game last Saturday against Husson, ending her season with a 6-4 record. The 6-2 defensive lineman participated in each one of the team's

ten games this season, just like in his rookie season. He finished his sophomore year with 14 tackles and 12 assists, upgrading his average from last year from 1.9 to 2.6 tackles per game. He also led the Panthers' defense for the season with 2.5 sacks.

Derek Davies (sophomore, pole vault and sprints) - Indoor Track & Field at Plymouth State: The Panthers will begin their 2018-19 season on Dec. 1st, with a meeting at UMass Boston and exactly one week after that, will be competing in the PSU Winter Classic. Their season will conclude with the Division III Championship meetings in late February and early March.

Davies is entering his second season. As a freshman, he recorded the top pole vault performance for the Panthers last season, going over the 4.40m (14-5.25 feet) bar at Wesleyan, in a February 3rd meeting. He was also part of the top performances of the 4X200 meter relay (1:35.74) and the 4X400 meter relay (3:30.54).

Brittany Roche (junior, guard) - Basketball at Plymouth State: The 5-11 junior and her team tipped off a new season last Friday with a home game against New England College and will travel to Castleton for their first conference game on Nov. 28th. In the LEC 2018 Preseason Coaches' Poll, the Lady Panthers were ranked 9 and they sure hope the new season will

be better than the previous one, where they went 7-19, including a six game losing streak.

As for Roche, she will try to improve some impressive numbers from last season, when she scored 11.0 points per game, second best in the team, while playing 27.7 minutes on average.

Halle Hamilton (freshman, back) - Soccer at UNH: Hamilton, captain of the LHS girls' soccer team in 2016 and 2017, received 12 minutes in one appearance in her freshman year - a 2-0 home loss to Hartford on Oct. 21st, the last game of the regular season. The Wildcats lost to Albany Great Danes 1-0 in the quarterfinals of the America East Tournament.

Kristen Bourque (senior, sprinter), Natalie Howes (junior, pole vault) - Track & Field at UNH: Senior Bourque will run for the first time in her final college season on Dec. 1st, in a meeting that will be held at the University of Maine, in Orono. Howes will try to improve her personal best in Indoor pole vault, a 3.35m jump from last January.

Franklin Pierce

Trevor Guay (junior, sprinter) - Track & Field at Franklin Pierce: Guay and the Ravens will begin their new indoor season at UMass Boston on Dec. 1st. The runner, a three-time All-State Team member while at Londonderry
