Just about all the members in attendance and town planning staff felt that the configuration of the parking lot would be challenging for the fire department if they have to bring in large trucks. With the landscape islands and the overall design of the lot, they felt that it would create a serpentine route that would be hard to navigate.

Kevan responded that the view from the surrounding roads would not change because buildings would surround the parking lot.











Council meeting, Kelley-Jaye Cleland, Director of Sales and Product Development for KENO 603, promoted the merits of Keno, saying it was good for local businesses and would raise money for schools.

The Director pointed out that KENO 603 sales of \$43.7 million are anticipated in the state, with \$8.5 million net revenue earmarked for full-day kindergarten. Current thinking is that Keno 603 will need about 250 businesses with Keno to make this projection though the Lottery Commission is a little behind their goal. The money would be available to the communities for the schools beginning with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018.

John Ferrell, Town Chairman pointed out that last year the NH State Legislature, with a sign off from the Governor, enabled the game of Keno to be rolled out across the state. And that the Lottery Commission would like to invite Londonderry to now participate. cipal, Richard Zacchilli who had a discussion with the teacher, with the incident then being escalated to the Londonderry Police.

Dwyer has since been charged with criminal threatening, which is a Class A misdemeanor and he was released on personal recognizance.

In an arrest Warrant, it was alleged the incident started when Dwyer velled at the student for not being attentive in his class saying, "I don't believe in guns or have a gun, but if I did, I would shoot you because you have your head down and you're not paying attention."

The comments allegedly arose during a class discussion about the use of idioms like "don't shoot the messenger" so the discussion got out of hand in context to the expression being discussed.

This is not likely a suitable manner for a teacher to get a student's attention, as fears of school violence are running high across the student population. 2018 was a record year for violent school incidents. Over 94 incidents have occurred so far this year versus a preaccording to U.S. Naval of a school shooting.

Postgraduate School.

Police, Principal Zacchilli met with Dwyer and his union representative and during the meeting Dwyer expressed frustration that students don't take matters seriously and "everything is a joke to them,"

During this meeting with Dwyer, the principal asked Dwyer if he said, "If I had a gun, I would shoot you?" and Dwyer responded, "Yes." This resulted in the Principal suspended Mr. Dwyer.

Police reported that the teacher, Steven Dwyer, 51, of Manchester, reported on his own to Londonderry Police, who made out an arrest warrant on Nov. 27, based on allegations that had come forward by a student and witnesses about the incident.

Londonderry Police Detective, Timothy Moran stated in the warrant that Dwyer had been previously investigated for making veiled threats about gun violence to students on Feb. 14.

A police document of that older incident reported a student said that Dwyer became upset during a video games discussion that students don't take anything seriously and then asked them what vious high set in 2006 they would do in the event

One student witness According to the told police Dwyer had said, "It'll take something tragic, you guys don't take anything serious. I'm wishing for a school shooting in New Hampshire."

> "I felt like he was going to shoot up the school,' that student told police.

Police reported Dwyer denying saying he wished for a school shooting, but did say he thought students would only take violence seriously if a school shooting did happen.

Dwyer admitted to police that the comments were probably "a little over the top" but that "some of the kids in the class needed to hear it to stop the snickering.

Superintendent Scott Laliberte said that the teacher had been placed on administrative leave in early November pending police and school district investigations.

"These allegations are currently being investigated. Meanwhile, it is important to remember that all persons must be presumed innocent until they are proven guilty. As always, the safety, security and well-being of our students is our top priority," Laliberte said.

Dwyer is scheduled for a Derry District Court hearing on Thursady, Dec.



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

Kevan said that work on a subdivision of 28 single family homes along Gilcreast Road would begin in the spring. He also discussed a proposed plan for an elderly housing facility hopes to break ground next summer. The com-

plex would include independent and assisted living options. It would start with 200 beds with the option to expand to 300 beds in the future.

In response to a question from the Board. Kevan said that he hoped planned improvements to Route 102 related to Woodmont would begin next summer or fall. The start date depends on when the contractor working on the I-93 expansion frees up to work on the Route 102 project.

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Public Hearing Plans for I-93 Exit 4A Project to Move Forward

The clock is ticking for public feedback about the Exit 4A Exit Project road plans that will impact nearly 200 local residents.

During last week's public hearing at the West Running Brook Middle School in Derry, the principal plan for a future I-93 Exit 4A was presented with a time sensitive last call for public feedback. Alternative plan options were also viewed with the project team on maps posted on the school's gymnasium walls. Nonetheless, the primary plan was the focus of the hearing and looks to be the plan tracking for construction in late 2019 or in 2020.

The hearing started informally, where project team members were available to discuss the alternatives and impacts with the public attendees. Next a formal presentation was made that overviewed how approximately 200 residents of Derry and Londonderry will be affected by the project. Some local residents will have their properties acquired by the State of New Hampshire under Department of Transportation guidelines for the project.

It is important to know

that, with the Dec. 5 public hearing now completed, there will be 30 days left for inclusion of comments or questions within the official project record. The Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement (SDEIS) is available online for public review, and the review period to submit comments on that statement is open until Jan. 4, 2019.

After the public comment period on the SDEIS closes, a combined Final Impact Environmental Statement and Record of Decision (FEIS/ROD) is anticipated in the March 2019 time frame, with a final Design and Permitting process to occur during the 2019, so the project can be launched by the end of 2019.

At the hearing, the project's special committee, as designated by the NH Governor and Executive Council, introduced themselves and overviewed their individual responsibilities. This committee consists of Russell E. Prescott, Executive Councilor and Chair, Andru Volinsky, Executive Councilor and David K. Wheeler, Executive Councilor.

Key project leaders including Christopher Bean, Consultant Project Manager and Keith Cota, NH DOT Project Manager highlighted maps that illustrated the updated plan.

The public hearing moved from a detailed presentation to open-mic, public comments, with a chorus of local residents questioning how the project will affect them and the various property areas of the two primarily impacted communities, Derry and Londonderry.

One Londonderry resident stated, "the project ...is affecting many people ...and maybe not in a positive manner.... they have not decided on the route yet, or have they? Have they decided on the route?

Special Committee Chair, Russell Prescott answered "I think the answer will be coming to you after this evening.'

Local residents and business people expressed both encouragement and concerns about the project, including comments about traffic problems that will occur during the construction, property impact timelines, as well as concerns about project impact on a large area of wetlands.

Beaver Deceivers After decades of trying to address longstanding flooding issues along Route 28, the NHDOT is trying a new "non-lethal" strategy to deal with the beavers causing the high water. The Department's contractor, Skip Lisle has constructed two new flow control devices called "beaver deceivers," which will manage beaver behavior. This approach, previously proven elsewhere, combines fencing and pipe systems that deceive beaver into keeping their dams outside of the Department's undersized and vulnerable stone box culverts that convey stream flows beneath the Manchester and Lawrence railroad embankment. Beavers had previously lodged their dams inside the culverts, which caused chronic flooding of nearby property and highways, including NH 28 near Mammoth Road.



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Groundbreaking Takes Place for Sanborn Crossing Senior Apartments

n Friday, Dec. 7, ground was official broken for the Sanborn Crossing Apartments at 30 Sanborn Road in Londonderry. Although work to excavate the ground on the site has been going on for nearly a month now, New Hampshire Governor Chris Sununu, local senators, town staff and HUD officials gathered for a construction kick-off.

A new Londonderry affordable

housing apartment complex for seniors will be comprised of two buildings with a total of 102 units (62 onebedroom and 40 two-bedroom), and will be affordable to senior households under 60% of the area median income.

The Sanborn Crossing units will utilize green building technology and low-impact development methods, as well as cutting-edge stormwater management. Landscaping will include native plants, walking trail system, rain gardens, and bio-retention basins for groundwater recharging.

The town of Londonderry approached local developer Steven Lewis a number of years ago about building the much-needed senior housing on the property that was classified as a "brown field" site and has since been remediated by the

Financing for the project is through New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority, using tax-exempt bonds to provide primary loan financing, the Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program, and a development subsidy through the Federal HOME Program. The LIHTC program leverages private investment capital directed at affordable rental housing.
