Londonderry Destination Imagination Team Advances

Nine teams from Londonderry and one from Derry competed on Saturday, Mar. 9, at the Southern Regional preliminary round of the Destination Imagination Tournament. One of the Londonderry

teams, Duct Tape Dudes, as well as the team from Derry Village Elementary School, named The Imaginators, advanced to the New Hampshire Destination Imagination State Finals that are scheduled to take place at Nashua High School South on Saturday, March 30.

Nine more Derry teams will be competing for tickets to the State Finals at the Eastern Regionals, this upcoming Saturday, Mar. 16, at Manchester Memorial High School. Eventually, the teams that will win the

New Carwash Conditionally Approved Near Manchester Line

Representatives of RCHD 603, LLC presented a proposal to the Planning Board for a fully automated car wash on Roundstone Drive in Londonderry. The 2.6-acre property abuts Manchester and is near the intersection of Old Pettingill Road and Raymond Wieczorek Drive.

The property is currently a vacant lot next to an Irving Gas Station. It would have two automated lanes, four vacuum islands and a small office space. It would be

open from 6 a.m. - 11 p.m. daily.

The property is located within a Gateway Business District zone. According to the town zoning ordinances, this type of district "is intended to allow for the development of gateways to the Town of Londonderry, centers of commerce, and employment centers for the Southern NH region."

As a requirement of this district, a project would have to adhere to Londonderry's Sustainable Site & Building Design guidelines. More

specifically, the ordinance says, "The proposed development of the property shall be determined to meet the "Certified" level of LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Certification or higher (Silver, Gold, or Platinum). The project need not actually receive LEED certification, but must be able to demonstrate that the project would meet the "certified" level of certification criteria."

The applicant requested a waiver from this requirement. The

Conservation Discusses Musquash, Reviews Tree Farm Parking Plan

Kit Plummer who owns a Christmas tree farm on Pillsbury Road on property that has a conservation easement came to the Commission to update them on plans to revise the parking lot at the tree farm. He said that a combination of high growth in the business and a request from the town to improve the parking situation are driving the proposed change.

He shared that when he first started the business, he hoped to sell a couple hundred trees a year. This year he sold 225 trees, but sold out on the third day in business,

and there were people that he had to turn away.

He told the Commission that the last two years he has planted 1000 trees to try and meet future demand and hopes that he can sell about 600 trees a year.

He also told the Commission that the town public works and engineering department had spoken to him about avoiding having people back out onto Pillsbury Road. As a result, he would like to move the parking lot behind the current sales shed. He said he plans on stripping the top soil and putting down 1-1/2 inch crushed gravel to prevent people from getting stuck in the

mud.

He explained that his easement allows him to do this, but it required notifying the Conservation Commission before he does so. Member Gene Harrington stated that this is an approved use and was glad to see it was being done with minimal environmental impact and to improve safety. The full Commission agreed giving their unani-

 State Finals will qualify to the Destination Imagination Global Finals, where they will have the opportunity to compete with teams from other 46 states across the US, as well as 15 countries from around the world. New Hampshire has more than 260 teams this year, in four regions. Each team can have up to seven members and has a Team Manager, an adult that help the students stay on track, but is not allowed to help the team develop their solution.

Over 1,800 Students from New Hampshire take part every year in the Destination Imagination Tournament, where they compete in a variety of challenges based on the STEAM principals: Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Math, as well as social entrepreneurship. Teams

typically spend two to five months developing and practicing their Challenge solutions.

Each team is faces a different challenge and competes in its age group: Elementary Level, Middle Level or Secondary Level. There is also a non-competitive Early Learning Challenge, that allows participants to develop social and problem-solving skills. Londonderry had a Rising Stars team in the non-competitive category. This team has been together since kindergarten and this was the kids' third year in the Rising Stars team.

The longest running Londonderry team is Duct Tape Dudes. The team, coached by Bill O'Connor, qualified for the State Finals after winning first place in the Secondary Level of the On Target Challenge, a technical challenge. The team is comprised of five grad-

uating seniors and one freshman.

The Imaginators, from Derry Village Elementary (DVS), qualified after winning the Medical Mystery Challenge, a scientific challenge, on Elementary Level. The team, coached by Jacques Ludman, has one fifth grader, two fourth graders and one third grader. The kids performed a musical about a young girl who has had an ischemic stroke.

Three Londonderry teams were part of the Game On Challenge, the fine arts challenge. Two of those teams (The Loot Llamas and an unnamed team) participated on Elementary Level and one more unnamed team was part of the Middle Level competition with two teams from Bedford.

In the Head's Up Challenge, an improvisational challenge, four teams represented Londonder-

 mous informal approval of the project.

Commission Chair Marge Badois said that the forestry work to expand habitat for rabbits in the Musquash Conservation Area had started at Hickory Hill including the clearing of an equipment staging area where logs would be deposited, processed and trucked out. The project is expected to take a few weeks with the exact timing depending on the weather and how quickly the work progresses.

In the past, the Commission had discussed turning the cleared stag-

ing area into a parking lot. After discussion, members agreed that as a next step they would reach out to the town public works department for guidance on how to proceed with getting approval for and planning the project.

Member Gene Harrington said that he there is a dredge and fill application required, a ledge crossing, elevation changes and that the access road would need to cross Ever-source's power line right of way.

Continuing on the topic of the Musquash, the Commission talked about Musquash Field

Day. It was noted that the attendance this year was far bigger than any time in recent memory, likely due to good weather and a big effort to publicize the event. Next year will be the thirtieth anniversary of Musquash Field Day, so the Commission is hoping to do something special to celebrate that.

Member Deb Lievens said the application for state grants to upgrade or replace culverts to make them wetland and wildlife friendly will be opening soon. She plans to contact the town planning department to see if someone from the town can look into applying for grant money for Londonderry.

March is marked in many local schools as Read Across America month, and celebrates children's author Dr. Theodor Geisel, better known to the world as Dr. Seuss.

Dr. Seuss's birthday is March 2, but month long celebrations are taking place all over. True to the famed children's author, school activities focus on reading.

While Read Across America was created by the National Education Association, no matter what people think of unions, we hope everyone can agree on the importance of reading, and of reading to children early and often. Reflections Program Presents Top Arts Awards to Local Students

This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the National PTA Reflections Program for the Arts. The theme for this year's student artists was "Heroes Around Me". On March 6, the New Hampshire State PTA presented the Reflections exhibit and awards for many of the arts projects that were entered into the N.H. State PTA contest.

The N.H. State Awards ceremony took place at the Gilbert H. Hood Middle School in Derry, New Hampshire and began with open time for attendees to browse the art exhibit awards before student awards were handed out. Award presentations were conducted by N.H. PTA Reflection Chair, Sally Bertrand and by Michelle McKinnon, New Hampshire PTA president.

Bertrand has been involved with the Reflections program for many years and has seen the program grow each year, as more PTA units and students were added to the program. This will be Bertrand's last year as Chair and she was visibly excited, as she called out the award winners and the young artists presented their works, projects and movements to the audience.

Bertrand said, "Reflections is a wonderful way to encourage young artists and this year was

special, as it was the 50th anniversary of this national PTA program. The children in New Hampshire have many talents and the Reflections program is a wonderful way for the children to express themselves. One of the things I like the most about the program is that it gives an opportunity for recognition to students, who may not excel in academics or sports."

Bertrand also pointed out that the New Hampshire PTA is especially proud to be a part of the national PTA reflections program. The PTA believes that all children

deserve a quality arts education and encourages students to pursue artistic expression through participation in the annual reflections program. In its 50-year history, the program has encouraged millions of students across the nation who attend American schools to explore their artistic talents.

This year in New Hampshire, 30 local PTA units participated, and 247 pieces of artwork were judged at the N.H. State level. The twenty-one 1st place winners in the various arts programs will go on to the national PTA judging and national

winners will be announced in May.

The categories in the national and N.H. Reflection program include literature, music composition, visual arts, photography, film production and dance choreography.

Several local students won First-In-State honors. Oliver Forbes, a second grader from East Derry, won first place for his literature story titled "Hero". In the photography category, Isabella Smith, a second grader from South Londonderry, won first for her photograph titled "Desmond the Therapy Horse". Also, in the photography category Victoria Paradise, a sixth grader from West Running Brook School in Derry, won first prize for her photography titled "The Power of Produce". In the film production category, Riley Pear-

son, an eighth grader from West Running Brook School in Derry, won first prize for her film titled the "Heroes Inside Us".

Other local students won merit awards including Charlotte Rolfe, a third grader from South Londonderry for literature, Sarah King, an eighth grader from West Running Brook for music composition, Caitlyn Batts, a fifth grader from South Londonderry for dance choreography, Gabriella Freccero, kindergarten from Moose Hill for visual arts, Leah Kembell-Cook, a fifth grader for visual arts, Katelynn Ortiz, an eighth grader from Gilbert Hood middle school for visual arts, and Riley Pearson, an eighth grader from West running Brook for visual arts,

National Nutrition Week Becomes a Month-Long Event

As the snow comes to a stop and slowly melts away, each day the Granite State gets closer and closer to Spring. Many people will soon be thinking about how to lose their winter weight to uncover their "Summer bodies" as they begin to plan their beach trips.

But there is more to getting fit than fitting into a swimsuit. There's a saying which goes, "Summer bodies are made in the kitchen," and the Month of March has an observance that aligns with that perfectly.

In March of 1973, a group of members from the American Dietetic Association (now known as the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics) embraced a newly initiated "National Nutrition Week" as a way to help educate the public on proper nutrition, while promoting the importance of dietetics as a profession. Seven years later, the week-long observance would be

expanded to the entire month of March in response to a growing public interest in nutrition.

National Nutrition Month works to promote the importance of making informed food choices and developing sound eating and physical activity habits for overall health and well-being.

While individual nutrient requirements may vary, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services lists the following eight healthy eating goals for general wellness.

First, the USDHHS recommends that mealtime plates be half filled with fruits and/or vegetables, stating that the more colorful the portions, the more likely the plate will contain more of the vitamins, minerals, and fiber the body requires to be healthy.

Next, it is advised to make half of the grains one consumes whole grains, for example, replace white bread with whole grain bread. While refined white flours may be enriched with nutri-

ents to make up for the ones lost in processing, not all are adequately replaced, and whole grains naturally contain lots of vitamins, minerals, and healthy fats that the body needs.

The USDHHS also suggests switching from full fat milk to skim or 1 percent, as the alternative contains the same amount of calcium and other essential nutrients as its whole counterpart, but with fewer calories and less saturated fat.

Choosing a variety of lean protein foods is also highly recommended by the USDHHS. Red meats such as beef, pork and lamb tend to contain more saturated fat than poultry and fish, and saturated and trans fats can lead to high cholesterol and heart disease, says the American Heart Association.

Using the Nutrition Facts label to choose lower sodium versions of

foods such as soup, bread, etc, is encouraged. The public is urged to look for labels reading, "low sodium," "reduced sodium," or "no salt added." Excessive consumption of sodium can lead to high blood pressure as it causes the body to retain extra fluid, causing an added burden on the heart. Too much sodium also increases risk of stroke, heart failure, osteoporosis, and kidney disease.

Replacing sugary drinks with water is also encouraged. Sweetened beverages such as soda, juice, etc, contain extra calories and in excess can lead to health problems. The USDHHS suggests adding a slice of lemon, lime, or watermelon to water for those who would be missing the flavor.

Drinking more water in general is also important for overall health, as the body uses water in all

its cells, organs, and tissues to help regulate temperature and maintain all bodily functions. Four to six cups of water is the rule of thumb for generally healthy people, although it is possible to take in too much water if a person has certain health conditions, such as thyroid disease or heart problems, or if a person is taking medications that cause water retention, such as non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) or certain antidepressants.

Incorporating eight ounces of seafood into the weekly meal plan will offer protein, minerals, and omega-3 fatty acids (a heart-healthy fat), says the USDHHS. Salmon, haddock, and Pollock are great examples of healthy seafood.

Avoiding and/or cutting back on foods that contain "hard fats" is a crucial step in ensuring

proper nutrition, according to the USDHHS. These foods include cakes, cookies, pizza, processed and fatty meats (hot dogs, ribs, bacon, sausages) and ice cream. Excessive consumption of these "hard fats" can lead to obesity and related issues such as high blood pressure and diabetes.

As previously mentioned, individual nutrient needs may vary. A consultation with a physician or dietician can help determine what meal plan is right for each person.

So those who are embarking on a weight loss or fitness journey, keep in mind that the body is a machine, and it requires the right fuel to keep firing on all cylinders.

town planning department supported granting of the waiver because the car wash would not have the high traffic volume that was envisioned when the Gateway District requirements were created.

In addition, they highlighted that the project had a lot of aspects that got is close to LEED certification. The Planning Board agreed, unanimously granting the waiver.

The developer said

that they already have state and Manchester approval to extend utilities from Brown Avenue to the Manchester-Londonderry line. As part of the site development, the utilities would be extended to the parcel in Londonderry.

The developer described how water and soap drainage would be handled at the site. Sediment drains and an oil/water separator for treatment would be within the car wash. Town planning staff said that the plan for water treatment met current stan-

dards.

Resident Ray Breslin expressed concern that, like PFOA, there could be chemicals that are deemed safe today, but found in the future to be problematic. The developer added that the car wash would use less water and soap compared to other car washes since it had the newest technology.

The developer shared the results of their traffic study. Based on looking at actual volume from a similar car wash in Goffstown, they estimated

that during the peak hour in the morning there would be 40-46 cars entering and exiting the car wash.

In other business, the Board was notified of a lot merger done by Coca Cola. This type of adjustment does not require Board approval. A representative of Coca Cola said that the company has the right of first refusal to buy several abutting residential properties. This adjustment followed the purchase and demolition of one such house.



LHS Late Basket Sends Boys Hoops Team to Semis

In a season that saw them win one wild game after another, there seemed to be no other way for the Londonderry High School's Boys' Varsity Basketball team's final home game of the season to end but the same.

On Friday night, Mar. 8, the fourth seeded Lancers had to use a big comeback and a late, final seconds basket to beat the fifth seed Winnacunnet 42-40. The win punched the teams ticket to the Division I tournament's semifinals happening on Wednesday, March 12, at UNH, after the Londonderry Times went to press. Londonderry will face the undefeated Exeter Blue Hawks, with the winner playing on Saturday, Mar. 15, 3 p.m., also at UNH for the title against either Salem or Portsmouth.

Londonderry's way into the tournament began last Tuesday, March 5, with a 49-40 home win over the 12th seed, Nashua South. The Lancers showed strong defense early in the game and led 12-7 after eight minutes and 21-16 at the half. They were able to double their lead in the next quarter and enter the final eight minutes with a ten-point lead, 36-26, before putting the final touches on their vic-

tory.

Ethan May had 15-points and Jackson Cox scored 12. Cole Keegan and James Buttafuoco finished with seven points each, Dean Haggett and Max DesRosiers scored three points each and Will Reyes finished with two.

Three evenings later, the Lancers' offense was fairly absent from the game for the first two and a half quarters in their quarter-final game against Winnacunnet. Londonderry led 9-6 after a physical first quarter, but Winnacunnet, who lost a close home game to

LHS last month, slowly found their rhythm. In the second quarter, Londonderry needed six and a half minutes to score their first points and the half ended with an 18-13 Warriors lead.

Things did not improve for Nate Stanton's players after the break, and Winnacunnet jumped into their largest lead of the game, 30-18. That was also where the home team's comeback started. An 8-1 run helped Londonderry finish the third quarter down by only seven points (33-26), but with three minutes to play, Winnacunnet looked on its way to the next round, thanks to a 39-31 lead.

One of the visitors' best players in the game, Jack Schakke, fouled out with on an odd call and Londonderry used that as momentum to complete the comeback with field goals from Keegan and Buttafuoco. With the score tied at 40, Londonderry stole the ball and took a timeout and got a chance to win the game.

May took a tough midrange shot and missed and Buttafuoco could not make the first offensive rebound, but the ball fell into Cox's hands and his floater went in, giving Londonderry the lead. The Warriors had the ball with 3.9 seconds left and Ben Allen almost sent the

game into overtime, but his lay-up missed and the home team celebrated.

Cox finished with 13 points (seven in the fourth quarter), Keegan had 12, DesRosiers scored seven, May six and Buttafuoco four. Allen led Winnacunnet with 15, Schakke had 11.

"I am loving every second of it. It does not get any better than this", said Stanton after the game, "Kudos to the kids. They are so resilient. I just love their fight, they are a young team and they just get it. Our defense is winning us games and we hit some key shots at the end. I just had to light the fire and remind the kids what we are all about. We took care of the ball in the final minutes. We are going to enjoy this one".

Cox said about his game winning shot: "It was really just position and everybody boxed out and I had a perfect shot. The crowd was excellent, we needed them. They



the home Memorial team. The top ranked team Bishop Guertin won the three-day event with a 69-56 victory over Exeter in the finals.


Londonderry's two wins of the regular season came on a home game





Lancer Cole Keegan Excels as Rare Three Sport Athlete

Londonderry High School's Varsity Football team had the second best Division I record in the 2018 fall season. Londonderry High School's Boys' Varsity Basketball team was one of the top Division I teams during the entire 2018-19 winter season. Londonderry High School's Boys' Varsity Lacrosse team will go soon into the 2019 spring season with high expectations, after reaching last year's final four. Those three strong teams have one player linking them: Junior Cole Keegan, a rare three-sport athlete who is enjoying success everywhere he goes these days.

Keegan has been playing basketball since he was a little kid: "In fourth grade I got cut from the Londonderry Basketball Club team", he tells the Londonderry Times. By the time he was a sophomore, he already played varsity basketball for the Lancers. His dad, who played college rugby ("I have an older brother who played football and a sister in basketball. We are a family of athletes"), used to play lacrosse with him in the back yard and Keegan says that being a lefty in writing and a righty in other things helped him a lot on the lacrosse field, where he is able to go both ways. He picked up football in fifth grade and started as a quarterback, before

breaking his arm playing lacrosse. He returned to football a few years later: "I was a tall and skinny kid, not very good or coordinated", he remembers, "During the summer after my freshman year I got really good at football and was starting for the team as a sophomore".

In the past, three-sport athletes were in just about every grade, but you can barely find them these days: "When I went to high school, everybody did it", says LHS long-time trainer, Michelle Hart-Miller, a strong advocate of multi-sport athletes, "Read the research and statistics. 90 percent of the Patriots who just won the Super Bowl were multi-sport athletes. The difference in athleticism and there are less uncommon injuries, because in one sport you are doing the same motor movement pattern over and over again. You have bet-

ter movement if you do different sports and you adapt different coaching styles and become a better and a well-rounded athlete".

LHS' football coach, Jimmy Lauzon, agrees: "three-sport athletes are a rarity recently and it is unfortunate. College coaches want athletes, not the guys who can do only one thing. And you get one shot at the high school experience, so why wouldn't you want to be involved in other programs? Cole is a perfect example of how being a three-sport athlete is beneficial for you. What he does well on the court helps him on the field, with his ability to jume and box out for the ball. His footwork is better in

football thanks to basketball and his tough defense, the dives on the floor and fights for the ball all come from football".

"When I am trying to get open in lacrosse or even basketball, those cuts I do, the short routes, that comes from football", testifies Keegan, "The aggressiveness for tackles too. And jumping from basketball helps me in football. All my coaches tell us to do other sports and I think it is a great idea".

In that case, how come we don't see three-sport athletes anymore? "It disappeared because getting into college is a bigger deal today", believes Keegan's lacrosse coach, Roger Sampson, "There are a lot of new require-

ments that did not exist 20 years ago, so you need time for that and sometimes, must take a season off. Also, most kids are not passionate for three sports and have so many choices now that we did not have growing up. They are pulled away. It is sad, but that is the way it is. Cole is a great athlete, a natural talent and as a passion about all three sports, which is the difference maker in his case. I love the three-sport athletes, because they come into my spring season in great shape. Cole will enter his lacrosse season after playing three good seasons in a row".

Keegan admits that sometimes fatigue can be another problem: "I am always tired after practice. I am always doing something, no breaks. But I want to keep doing it next year, as a senior, and play one of my sports in college and hopefully, also as a pro". Hart-Miller understands the fatigue issue and says: "The kids listen to me talk about recovery all the time. You do need days off. Sleep is crucial too. And you don't want to do two sports in the same season".

"If there is any downside, is that sometimes I have to tell him to take it easier", adds Sampson, "You have to fight

through bumps and bruises, especially if you play contact sports. But he never uses those injuries to take a step back and that makes Cole great. He leads by example".

Speaking to Keegan's three coaches, the same term kept coming: "He's very coachable", they all said. "Cole is an amazing kid", says his current coach, Nate Stanton, "I love coaching him. He is way more confident this year, an offensive threat and a captain. Being a captain when you are a three-sport athlete shows how mature you are. He is a huge asset for all three teams. It is rare when a kid can pick up a basketball in November and say 'let's go'".

"Cole has been one of my favorite kids to coach in the last few years", declares Lauzon, "He is always willing to work on things and I know he is not afraid to get extra work on his own. He always has a smile on his face. He has a bright future in football, if that is the sport he chooses. Playing three sports has given him an advantage".

So what is his favorite sport out of the three? "Everyone asks me that, but it depends on the season I am in. And in the summer? I just do all three."
