Londonderry Police To Hold Opioid Addiction Forum

The Londonderry Police Department will be holding an important community forum on Thursday, May 16, at 6:30pm in the Londonderry High School cafeteria. ?

One in seven Ameri-

cans will face substance addiction in their lifetime, says Jerome Adams, United States Surgeon General in his report titled, "Facing Addiction in America: The Surgeon General's Report on Alcohol, Drugs and Health." Furthermore, approximately every 19 minutes, one

American will die from opioid or heroin overdose.

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, New Hampshire is among the top five states with the highest rate of opioid-involved deaths. In 2017 there were 424 drug

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Town Asked to Add 300K More to Intersection Improvement Funding

Back in 2017, when the Executive Council of the New Hampshire Department of Transportation (DOT) was building its 10-year planning process, officials from Londonderry asked that council to consider adding to the highway plan improvement to the intersection of Stonehenge Road and Route 28.

This improvement project was not in the original 10-year plan, but was accepted in by the Executive Council. The fact that at the same time Londonderry received a highway grant from the New Hampshire Governor

Office and offered to put that money into the intersection project and funding a portion of it, helped to make it part of the 10 year plan and that decision was supposed to accelerate the project.

Now, the town finds itself short on funds to being the project, and is being asked by the State Department of Transportation to add over \$300,000 in order to keep this project going.

This subject was discussed during the last Town Council, held at the Londonderry Town Hall on Monday, May 6.

Town Manager Kevin Smith explained that the grant that the town

received in 2017 was for \$519,000. This amount was almost 50 percent of the original estimated cost of the project, which was made by the Southern New Hampshire Planning Board, based on their rough estimate.

The Department of Transportation's estimate was much different and put the total cost of the project at \$1,695,188 and in a letter that was recently received by Mr. Smith, the Department of Transportation said it had not received any input from the town as to how Londonderry wants to proceed after the costs jumped. 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Officials Get More Updates on Exit 4A at Chamber Event

At the regional transportation meeting, held on Tuesday morning, May 7, at Brookstone Park in Derry, local officials provided an update regarding the Exit 4A project in Londonderry and Derry. The Exit 4A was incorporated into the state's 10-year Transportation Improvement Plan of New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT).

The new exit would be located approximately a mile north of the existing Exit 4 on Interstate 93. The planning for this project began over three decades ago, back in 1985. The goal is to

reduce traffic congestion on Route 102, which crosses the towns of Derry and Londonderry on the south side. Route 102 connects Nashua to the south-west and Route 101 to the north-east.

At the meeting, Nicole Fox represented Fuss & O'Neill, the engineering company in charge of the project. Fox said that the anticipated design-build schedule is a possible award in June 2020, followed by construction beginning late in the summer of that year and completing by the end of 2023. Phase 1 of the constructions will be new roadways (Interchange and connector road) and Phase 2 will include the

upgrade of existing roadways (Folsom Road, Tsienneto Road, Route 28, Route 28 Bypass, Route 102 and other local roads).

The NHDOT believes that the addition of Exit 4A to I-93 would not only reduce congestion, but also improve safety and promote economic vitality for the two towns.

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Concord to Host Drinking Water Protection Event on May 16

The 2019 New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) Drinking Water Source Protection Conference will be held on Thursday, May 16 (8:30 a.m. – 4 p.m.), at the Grapone Conference Center in Concord. The event is the largest drinking water source protection conference in New England.

This year's conference will feature scientists, state and federal officials and water supply managers. These professionals will present their work and views on a range of

topics, including the statewide private well sampling initiative, the New Hampshire Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund, the drinking water source protection priorities (at the national, regional and state level), projects related to lake management, land conservation, public health and updates regarding New Hampshire's overall drinking water source protection strategy.

Over 200 participants usually attend the annual event, which provides an information exchange opportunity for water supply professionals,

town officials, boards and committees, with responsibility for planning and delivery of safe drinking water. The event's website states that it is a "forum for presenting innovative water resources research, sharing information on local protection projects, and training municipal and water professionals."

The event, which is organized by the NHDES in partnership with American Ground Water Trust, begins with a morning plenary session, which is then followed by small group afternoon sessions. At 10 a.m., Rick Ellsmore,

USDA/NRCS NH State Conservationist will give his lecture, entitled "Understanding the Farm Bill's Focus on Protecting Drinking Water".

The New Hampshire Drinking Water and Groundwater Advisory Commission also announced last week that it is targeting up to \$2 million from the Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund for grants to protect public water supply sources in 2019. The grant process, which is administered by the commission through the NHDES, will begin on Jun. 28 with the submissions

of brief eligibility applications, followed by submission of more extensive funding application by September 13th.

Paul Susca, from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services Drinking Water Source Protection Program says that last year, 22 applications were submitted and 15 of them were approved. The commission provided \$2.4 million for those 15 projects, to protect 4,744 acres of water supply land. It also provided \$24 million in loans and grants to 19 New Hampshire communities for water quality

projects, mainly water supply infrastructure.

Projects eligible for funding under the program involve permanent protection of land from which water flows to public water supply sources, specifically wellhead protection areas and land designated as "hydrologic areas of concern" within water supply watersheds. The commission announced that projects that involve the protection of land for future water supply sources shall be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

overdose deaths involving opioids in the state, which according to the NIDA adjusts to about 34 deaths per 100,000 people.

In that same year, while speaking to a group of business leaders, current New Hampshire Governor Chris Sununu reportedly had this to say regarding the opioid and substance abuse epidemic in the Granite State:

"Our prevention programs for substance abuse in this state? They

stink. You can quote me on that."

The May 16th forum will work to change this, and to address and prevent the tragic aforementioned statistics from repeating, or worse.?

The forum, titled, "Living With An Addiction Or Substance Abuse Disorder—Problems And Possibilities," will be open to all town residents to attend, as well as residents of surrounding towns.

The purpose and mission of this assembly is to provide prospective and offer subject matter expertise on the preven-

tion, treatment, and recovery of substance abuse disorders, as well as providing resources to those struggling or those with loved ones who are struggling, and to provide the public with the opportunity to meet with relevant partners from the region.

Speakers will include Chief William Hart of the Londonderry Police Department, Chief Daniel Goonan of the Manchester Fire Department, Licensed Mental Health Clinician Jim Gamache, Representative of NH Healthy Families Andrea Rancatore, Peter Burke of

The Farnum Center, and Kim Haney of Granite Pathways.

The Farnum Center is a private, non-profit organization located in Manchester, NH committed to providing effective care and support for adults seeking recovery from alcohol and other drugs. It seeks to help those battling addiction by helping these individuals and their families find their own way to a life free of the effects of substance abuse through comprehensive treatment and recovery services.

Granite Pathways is another self-help based

Manchester organization providing an array of services for those dealing with mental illness or substance abuse disorders. It also incorporates a peer supported recovery model, with people who have also, "Traveled the pathway to recovery," and who thereby understand the challenges of the journey leading the recovery process.

Invited panel participants will also include the parent of an individual lost to substance abuse disorder, as well as an individual currently living with addiction.

The widespread trou-

ble with opioid and substance abuse has plagued the Granite State for the better part of a decade. It will be a big undertaking, but this forum will work to be a step forward in helping to solve the issue and save hundreds, if not thousands, of lives.

A Tale of Two Newspapers

To the editor,
"It was the best of times, it was the worst of

times, ..."

We've all at least heard of the story even if we have not read it.

On the one hand we have a newspaper that provided twenty pages of Londonderry news last week. It started on the front page with two detailed reports from a meeting of the Conservation Commission, one of which concerned very significant recommendations regarding a development. On page three was a detailed report from the Budget Committee meeting that discussed School Board projects that impacted the Town budget. Page sixteen saw the start of thirty-five announcements of upcoming activities. The full Police log was reported. Throughout the paper were news stories either from the Town or about people from the Town, including five pages of local sports news. All this was generously funded by the many local businesses that advertised in the paper and that we should all try to support whenever the need for their services arises.

On the other hand we have a newspaper that provided only four pages on which some Londonderry news could be found. A front-page news story was about the 603 Brewery. The single Londonderry page provided reports about the Kent Allen Forest and about substance abuse. Only eight announcements of upcoming activities were made (contrast to thirty five in the other newspaper). On later pages events from the Police log that resulted in arrests were reported but other events were omitted. There was no report from any of the various Town Boards or Commissions.

We do not know ALL the reasons why the pub-

lication of official Town Notices has been moved to that second paper and we probably will never know. As the foregoing shows, readership by local residents, drawn to the newspaper by local news, was apparently outweighed by other considerations. Perhaps the public notices are not considered sufficiently important that the local residents should see them. Perhaps they had inside information that the second paper might be going to send reporters in future to cover those Town Boards and Commissions whose decisions affect our daily lives. That would draw readership and might justify the change.

Appraisals are \$10 per item, or 3 items for \$25. Any type of item can be evaluated; however, the public must be able to carry in their own items or provide photographs of very large items. A dolly and hand truck will be available for use on site. All proceeds from the event will go toward the Londonderry Historical Society.

The event will be held in the c.1859 Parmenter Barn on the grounds of the Londonderry Historical Society's Morrison House Museum, located at 140 Pillsbury Road in Londonderry.

claimed that the town should still pay for roughly 50 percent of the costs (same as before), which would be \$837,000 or \$318,000 more than the original amount the town committed to pay.

Mr. Smith said that he contacted some of the DOT officials and they all agreed that the town committed for \$519,000, not for 50 percent no matter the cost, but the letter that was received, more than a month ago, by Smith on March 29 asked for the larger sum.

"We are kind of in a

crossroad here", told Mr. Smith to the Town Council members on Monday night, before offering three options moving forward and asking for the council advice.

The first option, which was later accepted by Chairman John Farrell, was to send back the Project Agreement that was received, but cross out the increased amount and wait for the DOT's response, once they see that the town is not willing to add more money. The other options were to agree, pending an appropriation for an additional \$300,000 on the warrant in March of 2020 or to

hold off the entire project, study again the intersection and meanwhile, put the \$519,000 grant towards the improvement of a different intersection in the 10-year plan and go back to the Stonehenge Road / Route 28 intersection in the future.

Mr. Farrell suggested that if the DOT would not agree to the crossed out letter, Londonderry would have its town attorney contact the DOT.

After the agenda item was addressed, resident Reed Clark, who lives quite close to the intersection, was allowed to

speak on the subject, "This doesn't seem right, I think at any minute there could be an accident of some sort. It seems to me that you all should take careful note, and do something, other than what the three options discussed."

Farrell emphasized to Clark that they'll be doing all that they can, without going back to voters for more money. He agreed with Clark asking that the project the town really push the state to come up with the difference in cost.

"It's a Priority One Project," Farrell said to finish

the discussion.

Prior to that discussion, the Town Council approved unanimously two resolutions. The first was to use \$5,804.36 from the Maintenance Trust Funds for Various Projects for the Fire Station. The station needs to repair three doors and door locks that were installed in 2006 and upgrade its radio box, also installed in 2006, from the existing King Fisher to the King Fisher STAR Radio Box, the

newest technology in the market.

The Town Council also approved the spending of \$6,275.00 from the Distribution of Cemetery Acquisitions, Maintenance & Repairs Capital Reserve Fund to repair 28 headstones in the Valley, Sunnyside, Pleasantview and Glenwood cemeteries. Some of those headstones date back to the late 1700s and the town wished to fix them before the 300th anniversary this summer.

The planned design for the new Exit 4A is a diamond interchange that would provide access to the east side of I-93. The current design has a one-mile long connector roadway that would be built on new roadway from the exit interchange to Folsom Road, near the intersection of North High Street and Madden Road in Derry. The new plan would also upgrade the intersection of Folsom and Tsienneto Roads. The total length of the project, from the new Exit 4A from

I-93 to Tsienneto Road and Route 102/Chester Road would be 3.2 miles of new road.

The planning for this project took 22 years, beginning with a Draft Environmental Statement in 1985, which was completed in 2007, when a public hearing on this Environmental Statement was held. Eight years later, in 2015, the Governor's Office directed the NHDOT to accelerate the project. Derry and Londonderry entered into an agreement which states that the NHDOT will provide administrative oversight of the environmen-

tal review process and the project will transition fully to the NHDOT's control for the final design and construction stages. Per the NHDOT's website, construction is anticipated to begin this year and be completed by 2022. The projected cost of the project is nearly \$57 million, including preliminary engineering, right-of-way and construction costs.

Londonderry Woman Charged With Overdosing While Child in Car

Amy James, 38, of Londonderry, was arrested on Saturday, May 4, by the Barnstead Police Department and is facing charges of endangering the welfare of a child and operating a vehicle with a suspended license.

According to the Barnstead Police Department, an officer named Patrick

Ryan stopped James' car on Province Road in Barnstead at 2:10 a.m. on Saturday for a motor vehicle violation and while conducting his roadside investigation, he immediately realized that James, who was operating the vehicle, was unconscious.

Officer Ryan quickly determined that James is suffering from a drug overdose and aided her, while also calling the

Barnstead Fire and Rescue Department and asking them to arrive at the scene for assistance. As assistance arrived, James was transported to the Concord Hospital, about 20 miles away from the spot her car was stopped, for further medical assistance.

In the back seat of the vehicle which was operated by James, officers found a four-year-old

child, who was later identified as belonging to James. She was placed, at the hospital, under arrest for endangering the welfare of a child and operating with a suspended license and police contacted the Division of Children, Youth and Families (DCYF) of New Hampshire.

Eventually, the four-year-old was released to a responsible relative and

James' car was seized and towed by the Barnstead Police Department. The officers investigating the case applied for a search warrant for the seized vehicle and during its execution, found, inside the vehicle, evidence of both drug possession and drug distribution.

The evidence found included a quantity of methamphetamine's packaging materials,

hypodermic needles, ledgers of transactions, pipes, spoons and other related items.

Police announced the James will appear before the Laconia District Court in a date which was not published yet. The Barnstead Police Department will continue the investigation of this case and more arrests and charges are expected.
