

## **Everybody Read**

The first week of March is marked in many local schools as Read Across America Week. This week celebrates children's author Dr. Theodor Geisel, better known to the world as Dr. Seuss. Dr. Seuss's birthday was March 2, the Saturday of winter vacation, so this is the week when most celebrations are taking place.

True to the famed children's author, school activities focus on reading. Read Across America Week was created by the National Education Association and no matter what people think of unions, we hope everyone can agree on the importance of reading, and of reading to children - early and often.

Whether dressing up as the Cat in the Hat, creating green eggs and ham, serving as a "celebrity reader" in a local elementary school, or just cuddling up to your child to read a bedtime story, Read Across America reminds us of the importance of what could easily become a lost art in the rush of life today. #### **Escalating School District Budgets**

To the editor,

As a Londonderry taxpayer for over 40 years I Londonderry School Dis-Commission) want to turn trict budget increases. These budgets account for

Our Londonderry School District budgets keep escalating year after year, but our school enrollment keeps declining. Herein are some statistics.

The NH Department of The reasons why Deb Education lists enrollment statistics from 2007 to 2018. As examples Londonderry High School of Londonderry and not (LHS) enrollment in 2007 was 1828, the seventh grade was 418, the fourth grade in three schools was 126-147, and kindergarten was 308. In 2018 LHS enrollment was 1444, a decline of 21%; seventh grade was 306, a decline of 27%: fourth was 84-96, a decline of 34%; and kindergarten was 226, a decline of 27%.

> During the same period of 2007 to 2018 our total school district budget went from a little over \$55 million to over \$72 million, an increase of 31%.

I know the class size went from 27 to 22, but maybe we should be looking at something between 22 and 27.

In summary, during the study period of 2007 to 2018 our school budget increased 31% while our enrollments decreased on the order of 21% to 34%, depending on grade levels.

Going forward, the Londonderry School Disknow she will do what is trict (LSD) contracted with the New Hampshire School Administrators Association (NHSAA) to provide updated forecasts of student enrollment for each year during the period 2019 to 2029. The NHSAA consultants determined the best guideline of three models to forecast future student enrollments was the Oneam concerned with the year cohort method. ## **Londonderry School District Renewing Technology, STEM Focus**

recent Town delib-**L**erative meeting, the Londonderry School District is updating support for technology and is putting emphasis on STEM curriculum integration across schools. The conhas been around since 2001. STEM curriculum, as put forward by the U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF), is designed to support educators and students. The STEM acronym is derived from across today's global workforce culture - Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM).

Over the past 5 years, as lead by MIT educators and other prominent U.S. educational system leadinto "STEAM" to include added integration of the student arts - humanities, language arts, dance, drama, and new media - video, force roles.








Senior Lancer forward Alex Tsetsilas goes up for a three-pointer during the team's home game against Mancheaster Memorial last week.


