Rockingham Road Bank and Gas Station Plan Hits Some Resistance

Although the Planning Board will, again, hear from a commercial developer on Sept. 9, a public hearing last week proved that traffic concerns weigh heavy on the travelers of Symmes Road and Rockingham Road.

The developers of 174 and 178 Rockingham Road, 2V Londonderry, is proposing a gas station/bank for the lot at the corner of Rockingham Road and Symmes Drive. The initial plan was presented back in April, and the Aug. 5 Planning Board meeting was a continuation of a July 1 meeting. The latest meeting was once again continued in order

for the town to review several minor changes to the site plan.

Generally, the town requires about a three-week sitting period in order to go over plans relating to the overall development of projects. Although there are no outstanding items on the developments to-do list, the board accepted the staff recommendation to hold off on approving its waiver request as the town is still reviewing recently submitted changes to the plan, which has continued the meeting to September. The project requests four waivers, two of the Zoning Ordinance, and two of the town's site plan regulations. These are still

under review as the project consideration continues.

The west side of the site is the proposed location for the bank with drive-through and on the east side is the proposed convenience store/gas station. There will be two driveways, one per lot. However, there is a full-service entrance with a right turn lane exit along Route 28 and a full-service entrance and exit on Symmes Drive. The traffic analysis is still under review.

This project has been bouncing around on the agenda for a little over a year and still continues, however, the applicant thought it best

Following the recent passing of Tom Freda, who was serving as the Town Moderator, the Supervisors of the Checklist recently appointed Jonathan Kipp will carryout the current term of town moderator until the next election.

Freda, a more than 20-year resident of Londonderry and longtime elected official in town, was honored by having the Sept. 8 Primary

Election date named as Tom Freda Day. In the resolution, the town council couldn't say enough regarding the positive impact Freda left on the town. It called on him as a "valued and devoted Londonderry resident, friend and public servant" and that "he will be greatly missed."

"We will be thinking of him in the primary," Kipp said, "I know he wishes he was there, as we all do. He was taken from us too soon."

Kipp will carry out the duties of Town Moderator for the next seven months. Freda was just re-elected to the position in March to serve another two-year

The follow information was supplied by the republican candidates for Sheriff, they are listed in alphabetical order.

Kevin Coyle

My name is Kevin Coyle. I've been in full-time law enforcement for the past 25 years, both in a prosecutorial capacity and an administrative one. As a lawyer, I teach continuing education courses to officers each year to make sure they are up to date in their training. I am a true believer that those in law enforcement must be held to a higher stan-

dard, in both training and integrity.


I am running to restore integrity to the Rockingham County Sheriff's Office, after it has been stripped away over the past two years by Chuck Massahos.

Extensions Approved for Akira Way, Litchfield Road

The Planning Board, once again, approved an extension for the Insight Technology development at 9 Akira Way.

The Londonderry-based company originally proposed the construction, which extends access to sellable plots within the zone in 2012. The 2012 subdivision approval includes the

extension of a roadway to account for future construction. No utilities have been approved for the site yet, as the applicant holds off for possible users.

In 2014, and every two-year period since the applicant has requested to extend its two-year extension for substantial construction.

John Misano, representing the applicant at Akira Way, said that the

applicant had intended on starting development sometime in 2019, but the company “has assembled or has purchased other property in the area and intends to develop it is moving forward with those plans,” he said.

There is still strong support from the applicant, and seemingly the board, that this development is worth the wait as once fully developed, there will be substantial growth in the area.

“We will post the same bond and apply,

you know, appropriately and provide all the same information that the town has asked for in the past,” Misano said, “and the idea is to just give us a bit more time an additional two years to complete this rather significant development and provide commercial opportunities out there for the town which we believe will benefit the town.”

Londonderry Town Planner Colleen Mailloux says that the development has to return to the commission each time

as a precaution in the event that the town’s regulations have changed. There have been no ordinance changes, as the developers have been keeping tabs on the town’s regulations since the beginning of the project.

“So at this point staff,” Mailloux said, “we don’t have a concern with the granting of the extension because there’s their foot still fully in compliance with what the current regulations are on the books.”

The Planning Com-

mission also approved an extension for splitting a subdivision at 7 Litchfield Road. The original request was set to expire on Aug. 10, however, the applicant’s rep. Brown Engineering requires a 90-day extension for additional time to meet the final conditions of approval.

The remaining outstanding items are related to needed easements and utility extensions. The board approved the extension to Nov. 8 in order to meet these conditions.

Continued from page 2 to get in front of the public before September.

Several attendees expressed concern about the traffic already building at that intersection. Coca Cola, a long-time business on Symmes Drive, is also considering the project and providing comments for its new neighbors. One of Coke’s consultants has reviewed the project and doesn’t believe the site plan was created with daily life in mind. The access to Symmes Drive, according to the consultant and Coca Cola’s Director of Facilities Mark Smith, “If you live this on a daily

basis, it’s just not compatible.” The company is not comfortable supporting the project of Rockingham Road without any traffic mitigation.

However, though the town will take into consideration on how the applicant may mitigate those issues, 2V Londonderry is not responsible for that problem. Mailloux explained that existing concerns may not weigh on an applicant, so long as the site plans include ways to mitigate its traffic back-up directly related to the project.

Smith said that the Symmes Road facility moves an average of 670 loads a week, in addition

to the commercial and residential travel that already takes place on that road. He hopes that 2V Londonderry will work with its neighbors for a more cohesive plan.

The board doesn’t agree that the weight of fixing the traffic issues at this corner, and he also doesn’t find it fair that other companies in the area were allowed to expand.

There was no action

made on the project as it is forwarded to Sept. 9.

Board member Deb Paul, Town Council Liaison, asked her fellow board members to consider what can be done to fix future issues “so we’re not putting Band-Aids” on the traffic problems throughout the town.”

She said, “There needs to be a proactive response to these issues, and not just in the commercial space.”

Bancroft and Gilcreast Roads Will Have Periodic Closures

There will be a few roads being periodically closed to traffic over the next few weeks, and residents are being warned to seek alternative routes during construction periods.

Beginning earlier this week, on Monday, Aug. 10, and continuing until construction is completed, which will be approximately three weeks, weather permitting, the north side of Gilcreast Road will have daily closures.

The project will be running sewer lines up to the new construction site along Gilcreast Road. Following that, there will also be gas lines run to the same area. That project will happen at a later time.

The town asks that drivers please follow the posted detours for an alternate route.

Back on Monday, Aug. 3, Bancroft Road began having daily closures due to drainage construction and road

reconstruction. Crews are widening a section of Bancroft for new home construction that will take place after that. Detours will be through Stonehenge and Pillsbury roads. This construction was also scheduled to take approximately three weeks, depending on the weather.

Community Caregivers Need Publics Help With Location Change

On May 31, the Community Caregivers of Greater Derry/Londonderry lost their lease and had to relocate by Sept. 30.

This was an unsettling time for the organization, partly due to the pandemic. Those who rely on their services made it very much vital to continue without interruption. The “stay at home order” made it difficult to search for a new space, but the groups realtor, Scott Reiff, came through with a dream property.

Their new space is located in the historic Depot Square Office Building in downtown Derry and the Caregivers have leased the whole basement level.

This space was the former home of the Children’s Metamorphosis Museum a number of years back.

The new space is much larger than their current location, at 4,100-square-feet, it almost triples where they are now. Staff members will have their own offices, the Loaners Closet with have 900-square-feet of dedicated space. They will also have room for a HUB-SCRUB and for equipment tune-ups.

There is also a 400-square-foot multipurpose room that can accommodate support groups, clinics, meetings, and senior friendly education.

Unfortunately, the

Caregivers explained that they did not budget for this move, nor did they expect to supply capital to improve and furnish it.

As this point, the organization is looking for help with everything from new toilets, to a refrigerator, and dry wall to doorknobs. “We need to hire a moving company. We need to convert a playground to an ADA compliant parking lot and install a handicapped accessible mechanical entry door.”

The non-profit group says “Any amount will help. Donors will be recognized in several public ways, including personalized fence posts in the parking lot and a tribute wall unveiled at the

grand opening.”

Though the long-time Londonderry resident doesn’t exactly have experience in this role, his previous employment has educated him on the inner workings of local government - he also has a master’s of public administration and teaches at Granite State College. Having served as the vice chair for the Budget Committee, Kipp is confident that his “strong background” will continue to prove beneficial for the town in his new position.

Kipp is also a “proud graduate” of the Leadership Londonderry pro-

gram.

As town moderator, i.e. chief election official for the town, Kipp’s duties fall into three main categories: To make sure voting places are set up for residents; to count all the cast ballots and provide results; and, in March, to facilitate the town’s deliberative session - among other things.

Kipp isn’t exactly stepping in at the best time. There will be some growing pains at the Sept. 8 primary, and not just for Kipp. The coronavirus will impact voting around the nation and Londonderry is not an exception.

“It’s a terrible year to have to find somebody to fill in [as moderator],” Kipp said, “but I was more than willing to step up to help the community because of the strong team we already have in place.”

Kipp says he’s lucky to have the team, naming Sherry Farrell and Cindi Conley behind him as they move closer to Election Day.

“It doesn’t all fall to me,” Kipp said of the team.

Due to the threat of spreading COVID-19, residents are encouraged to cast absentee ballots (i.e. mail-ins). The voter turnout may be difficult to predict as Londonderry treks over

unprecedented times, but town election officials believe there may be an increase. Regardless, though, Kipp just wants “every resident to vote. To me, it’s a civic responsibility.”

The Town of Londonderry is seeking ballot clerks to help on the night of the primary. Those interested may go to the Londonderry website for more information or contact sfarrell@londonderrynh.org or cconley@londonderrynh.org.

“We really need more election workers to work on Election Day,” Kipp said, “My goal is that everybody that is eligible to vote is able to cast their vote. We want out election to be very safe and very fair with the highest integrity.”

pany, Millennium Mile Running, and also features a Beer Garden drinking event after the race.

Boot Scotin' Boogie

The race will start on Saturday at the Londonderry Athletic Field Complex, on Sargent Road, with staggered race starting times beginning at 2 p.m.

According to the Millennium Mile website, in regard to the health and safety of race participants, volunteers, and staff, it states that it is the most important aspect of the event. "Our team at Millennium Running helped spearhead the implementation of guidelines published by Governor Sununu, Task Force for road races in the State of New Hamp-

shire. Millennium Running will continue to ensure all safety procedures at our events are followed to protect our running community."

This event will utilize a time trial start format that will facilitate social distancing for the entirety of the event. Participants will be seeded based off their self-submitted paces. Athletes will start one-by-one in a time-trial format, 10 seconds after one another. Participants will be assigned a dedicated start time along with specific times for parking, check-in time and report to corral time.

The estimated Start Times (based on pace/seed times) are:

- 2 to 2:30 p.m.: 9:21 pace/mile or faster (29::00 finisher time or faster)
- 2:30 to 3 p.m.: 9:22 pace/mile - 10:50

pace/mile (29:00-33:38 finisher time)

• 3 to 3:30 p.m.: 10:51 pace/mile - 12:42 pace/mile (33:38-39:24 finisher time)

• 3:30 to 4 p.m.: 12:42 pace/mile+ - (39:24+ finisher time)

The exact start times will be assigned through email with bib number assignment two days prior to the event.

All spectators are being asked to abide by social distancing guidelines and avoid congregating at the start/finish

line areas.

Bib Pick-up can be done before race day at the Millennium Running Retail Store in Bedford. On Race Day, they can be picked up from 12:30 to 4 p.m. at the Londonderry Athletic Field Complex on Sargent Road.

Parking will be available at the Londonderry High School, Matthew Thornton Elementary School, Londonderry Middle School and the Londonderry Town Offices.

After the race, there will be a Beer Garden event where people can redeem beer tickets in the beer garden. Additional beer tickets are available for purchase. There will also be food trucks and vendors selling food inside the beer garden.

All race results will be displayed live at the Millennium Running timing trailer adjacent to the finish line. Live online results will be published on MillenniumRunning.com.

Digital awards will be emailed to the Top Three Overall Men & Women, as well as the top three male and female in each five-year age group. The groups are (19 and under, 20-24, 25-29, 30-34, 35-80+).

There will also be a virtual race option and participants will receive a Boot Scotin' Boogie 5K bib and tank top. (Tank tops are limited to the first 750 overall registrants.) Participants for this option must submit their virtual results toward an individual mileage completion of the Elliot Millennium Running Series. Registrants will be sent an email the week of the event with a unique link to submit their results.

Fireworks Celebration

For those who aren't attending the race but still want to get out for the event, the annual fireworks celebration will occur Saturday, Aug. 15 evening.

According to the town website, a likely start time will be between 8:30 and 9 p.m. (dependent upon darkness).

The fireworks will originate from a field behind the LHS gym; accordingly, viewing will be available from the following five parking areas: The LHS gym lot; the "Upper" Matthew Thornton parking lot; the "Lower" Matthew Thornton parking lot; the LHS "Plateau" parking lot (which is the dirt lot adjacent to the school's north side; and the Moose Hill Kindergarten parking lot.

The town is asking that in order to maintain appropriate social distancing, spectators either remain in their cars to view the fireworks, or if space is available, allow proper social distance from other spectators, and set up chairs in front of or next to your vehicle for fireworks viewing.

In the event of rain, the fireworks display will be held the following day at the same time.

Aviation Museum's 'Around the World' Flight Arrive Home on Aug. 15

After departing Manchester-Boston Regional Airport on May 1, New Hampshire students have traveled to more than 20 nations around the globe.

Through a flight simulator and streaming video, they've flown over the Eiffel Tower in Paris, traversed the Sahara Desert, visited the Taj Mahal in India, and skirted Mount Everest. But on Saturday, Aug. 15, the Aviation Museum's 'Around the World Flight Adventure' will return home to Manchester, where it all began 3 months ago.

The arrival will be made in via a vintage DC-3 airliner flying into Manchester-Boston Regional Airport. The aircraft will carry volunteers and guests who played a part in creating the museum's program.

The ceremony will take place on the grounds of the Aviation Museum, located at 27 Navigator Rd., Londonderry. The event is free and open to the public; all attendees will be required to wear face coverings and observe social distancing.

Live music will begin at mid-day. Attendees are encouraged to arrive no later than noon to find parking and get into position for the ceremony.

Those who want a closer look at the iconic DC-3 may access the airport ramp following the ceremony for \$5 per person, with proceeds supporting the non-profit Aviation Museum of New Hampshire. Tours of the DC-3's interior, including a glimpse of the cockpit, will be available. Other aircraft will be on display

on the airport's East Ramp as part of the museum's annual 'PlaneFest' celebration.

The Aviation Museum will be open on Saturday, Aug. 15 from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. Regular admission charges apply: \$10 adults; \$5 for age 6-12; age 5 and under, free; discounts for seniors and active military.

The museum's 'Around the World Flight Adventure' was launched this spring as a virtual learning program to help teachers and students engaged in remote learning due to the coronavirus pandemic.

To create the program, volunteers used the museum's Elite Flight Simulator to fly virtual segments around the globe, which were then posted online at the Museum's Web site, www.nhahs.org. Each segment included recorded

video of the takeoff and landing, narration along the way, a pilot's log with extensive notes, and links to more information. The program remains available online at www.nhahs.org.

Flight segments introduced students to the basic science of flight and the craft of piloting, but also explored topics of geography, history, and culture.

The project also included two livestream events: a Memorial Day flight over the D-Day landing beaches in Normandy, France, which was highlighted by Newsweek Magazine and which attracted about 1,000 viewers from around the world; and another on the 4th of July over Italy exploring the connections between Ancient Rome and the founding of the United States.

Volunteers creating the program chose to make the journey in a virtual DC-3, as rendered by the simulator, for the aircraft's historic significance and aesthetic appeal.

"We decided a great way to bring the program to a conclusion was to bring in a real DC-3 carrying in the people who created the program, and to invite everyone to celebrate the arrival," Rapsis said.

Sponsors of the 'Around the World Flight Adventure' include Wire Belt Co. of Londonderry, Brady-Sullivan Properties, Terrafugia, Signature Flight Service, Manchester-Boston Regional Airport, and Queen City Rotary. In-kind support is provided by Jay D. Carter IT Services and So Many Aircraft; the program was also funded by a

NH Humanities Grant.

The DC-3 arrival and ceremony is subject to weather conditions.

The Aviation Museum of N.H., located at 27 Navigator Rd., Londonderry, is a non-profit 501(c)3 tax-exempt organization.

Housed in the original 1937 passenger terminal at Manchester-Boston Regional Airport, the museum is dedicated to celebrating New Hampshire's role in aviation history. The museum's education outreach program aims to inspire today's young people to become tomorrow's aviation professionals and aerospace innovators.

Safety a Concern in Upcoming Elections During Pandemic

This year 2020 is a big election year and includes the Presidential Election. There is a primary coming up on Sept. 8, 2020. The New Hampshire General Election will be held on Nov. 3, 2020.

For the Primary election in September please note that if you are registered as an undeclared (independent) voter you can either vote with a republican ballot or a democratic ballot. However if you are registered in either party you may only take the ballot of the party in which you are registered. Many people get very upset when they think they are registered undeclared and find out at the polls on primary day that they are actually registered into a particular party – either democrat or republican. If you voted in the last election for either a democrat or a republican you automatically become registered into the party you voted for, unless you changed your status back to Undeclared after you cast your ballot. If you do not make sure you took the action after you voted to change back to

being registered as Undeclared you are only entitled to vote on the same ballot you voted last time. For example: if you are registered undeclared and you vote on a republican ballot and you do not change your status on the voter registration list back to being undeclared after you vote you will only be able to get a republican ballot at the upcoming primary, even if you want to vote for a democrat. It is very important that you make sure at Town Hall with the Supervisor of the Checklist that you are registered as an undeclared voter before you go to vote in any primary if you want to have the choice of voting for either a republican or democratic candidate. It is a good idea to check out your status on the voter checklist as soon as possible as you are not able to make the change on the date of the primary.

This year we are still in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic. Governor Sununu, the New Hampshire Legislature, and the NH Secretary of State's Office are taking every precaution to keep every voter safe in the upcoming Primary and General Election.

Anyone who has the virus or been exposed to someone who has the virus or is concerned about exposure to the virus will be allowed to vote in both the Primary and the General Election by way of an absentee ballot. In most elections only voters who fall into very specific categories are allowed to vote by absentee ballot. However, this year (only) as a result of the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic anyone who desires to vote may apply for an absentee ballot and check the special Covid-19 exception on the application form. Alternatively, voters may also check the "disability" exception on the application form. Governor Sununu vetoed the bill that would allow for voting by mail in all future elections in NH. The exception for absentee votes is only allowed for the 2020 elections. An application for an absentee ballot may be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office at the Town Hall where you currently reside. You can find the contact information for your Town Clerk at the end of this article. You may also get an application for an absentee ballot on the website for the NH Secretary of State at:

<http://sos.nh.gov/votingemergency.aspx>.

In the event you want to vote by absentee ballot using this exception or any of the other exceptions it is highly recommended that you request your absentee ballot as early as possible. Late ballots will not be counted. Check with your Town Clerk to find out the deadline for requesting an absentee ballot and when your absentee ballot must be returned and received by your Town Clerk's office in order to be properly counted. At the discretion of the Election officials in your town drop boxes may be made available, but you must check with the Town Clerk to find out if drop boxes will be made available for absentee ballots in your town.

You may also contact the Town Clerk's office if you need to register to vote. The town websites all contain a lot of important information. See contact information at the end of this article.

In the event you decide to vote in person at the polls it is most important that you check with your Town Clerk's office to find out the location for voting in your town this year. Some towns have changed there voting locations due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Each town is doing there best to take every precaution necessary to provide a safe place for the voters. According to Secretary of

State, Bill Gardner, in a July 17, 2020 interview, some voters who decline to wear masks may be barred from entering the polling place. Under certain circumstances voters who refuse to wear a mask may be allowed to fill out and cast a ballot outside of the formal polling place under the supervision of a designated election worker. The State government was provided \$3.2 million in federal funds to be used to improve safety in the 2020 elections, including the purchase of personal protective equipment for poll workers.

You may be interested to learn some historical information about New Hampshire voting. In the 2016 General Election about 75,000 (10%) of votes were cast by absentee ballot. Voter turnout in New Hampshire for the 2016 presidential election reflected that more than 78% of registered voters in the State cast a ballot. In April of 2020, there were 1,002,904 names on the voter checklist registered at the NH Secretary of State's office: Undeclared (Independent) voters numbered 377,754, Democrats numbered 323,430 and Republicans numbered 301,720.

A survey taken by University of New Hampshire Survey Center in June of 2020 reflected that one-third of the likely voters in the 2020 General Elec-

tion indicated that they would prefer to use an absentee ballot this year. The survey also revealed that about 85% of New Hampshire voters are confident that the 2020 General Election will be counted accurately.

In summary whether you are an undeclared voter, democrat or republican it is most important that you vote in this year's elections. This year you have the option of voting by absentee ballot or in person at your polling place. The safety of all New Hampshire voters is a prime concern of all of the election officials involved in our elections. Everyone who is entitled to register to vote should register. You can learn how to register by contacting your Town Clerk. The State of New Hampshire also allows same day registration at the polls on the day of the election. This year 2020 is a big election year and it is most important that everyone who is eligible to vote cast a ballot. Every vote counts in our Country and this is an honor and a duty of all of our citizens.
