Housing Authority Gets Extended Reach for Economic Development

The Town Council has expanded the geographic reach of the Londonderry Housing and Redevelopment Authority (LHRA) to pursue more economic development Initiatives for the town.

The council voted unanimously at its Mar. 15 meeting for Resolution 2021-05 to enable LHRA to go beyond what is currently allowed in the Redevelopment Plan. Its activities will now extend throughout all industrial or commercially zoned districts within the town's municipal boundaries.

LHRA may acquire

interests in real property as available within a project area, including easements and rights-of-way for construction of utilities, streets, and access roads.

The authority which is organized by statute was first established in 1968 to generate economic development in and around what is now the Manchester-Boston Regional Airport, though its scope has been limited to that area.

It owns land around the airport and, as Town Manager Kevin Smith told the council, one of those parcels is leased to Enterprise Car Rental. This generates \$1 million annually

from car registrations required for Enterprise as part of its lease.

The purpose of this step would be to redevelop these areas for industrial and commercial use to enhance land values, create jobs, and encourage infrastructure to facilitate those efforts, Smith said.

LHRA can do loans though it hasn't in some time, he added. It develops undeveloped or blighted property in Londonderry.

The proposed redevelopment area includes the airport for industrial and commercial uses.

Saucier Retains Londonderry School Board Chairman Spot

The Londonderry School Board held its annual re-organizational meeting on Tuesday, March 16, after the recent local elections where Michael Saucier was re-elected, but longtime board member Steve Young was unable to retain his seat, losing to newcomer Sara Loughlin.

The meeting serves as a way for the School Board to vote on the school board chair for the year along with the

vice chair.

Being re-elected as the Londonderry School Board Chair was Michael Saucier, after winning his re-election bid for the school board.

Londonderry Superintendent Scott Laliberte, who served as the chair during the beginning of the meeting said that he was happy to be able to hand over the gavel back to Saucier.

"I very joyfully yield the gavel," Laliberte said after the vote was taken.

Also being re-elected to their position was

Jenn Ganem who will once again serve as the Londonderry Vice Chair.

One of the highlights of the night during the meeting was in regards to the 2021-2022 school year calendar.

It was explained by

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T-Mobile Gets OK by Zoning to Have Additional Sign

The Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustment heard a case that was continued from the last meeting, during its March 17 meeting.

The case was in regards to T-Mobile requesting to have two different signs instead of one that is allowed, and to have more square feet of signage than is normally allowed.

T-Mobile in its original application was asking for a variance to allow the business to have two wall signs instead of the one and also to allow 65.6 square feet of signage instead of the 40 square feet that is currently allowed.

At the previous meeting one of the issues that the board had in regards to the

proposal revolved around the actual design of the second sign.

During that meeting one concern about the design came from board member David Armstrong, who said all the other signs in the plaza looked more conforming because they don't have a background, and instead just have a logo. The proposal made to the board was a design with a colored background.

The owner of KC Signs, Robyn Casey, who is working with T-Mobile on the signage explained that she had originally suggested to T-Mobile not to have a colored background and instead to just go with the channeled lettering.

Because Casey wasn't sure if T-Mobile would go forward with the proposal if they couldn't have a back-

ground for their sign it was decided by Casey to ask for a continuation which led to the meeting last week.

During the March 17 meeting Jim Steiner, who was representing KC Signs explained to the board that they had a new proposal for the signs.

The first difference that he explained was that instead of seeking to have 65.6 square feet of signage where 40 feet is allowed like they were originally proposing, they instead would be seeking 56 total square feet total for the signs and each sign would only be 28 square feet.

Like Casey did during the original meeting, Steiner explained that the extra sign would also help with public safety, because it would be easier for people to find the T-Mobile

location, and would also mean that they would be able to pay more attention to traffic than trying to find the building.

The other major difference between the original proposal and the one presented last week was in regards to the design of the sign.

Steiner explained that they addressed the major issue that the board had of having a colored background so they took it out and instead would just be channeled lettering.

He also noted that the color of it would be magenta.

Ultimately, Steiner told the ZBA that they thought the proposal was reasonable.

"The proposal is a reasonable one," Steiner said.

Another question that was brought up by the board was in

regards to having the sign being lit up. It was asked if they were planning on having it illuminated 24-7 or if they would turn it off during certain hours.

It was explained by Londonderry Associate Planner Laura Gandia that businesses are required to turn off the lighting on their signs when their business is closed already, meaning

that it is already a part of the regulations.

The Board on a 5-0 vote approved both variances, one for allowing T-Mobile to have two signs instead of one and a variance to allow them to have 56 square feet of signage instead of 40 square feet.

The next Londonderry ZBA meeting is slated for Wednesday, April 21 at 7 p.m.

ect area will be in accordance with the town's Zoning Ordinance and related regulations, such as Subdivision and Site Plan Regulations of Londonderry and airport zoning.

Dan Root, LHRA chair, said the entity has owned land in the town over the past 30 years. Part of its land has been sold off but it

still retains some deeded rights to the pass over of certain plots of land, he told the council.

Private investors involved in LHRA originally had purchased some of the land. The authority doesn't take money from the town to acquire land as far as he knows, Root said.

During questioning from Councilor Deb Paul on how the land was financed, he estimated the town would

up purchasing the land from the investors or acquiring the land with town funds. Now LHRA has its own finances and bank account.

It is a quasi-municipal agency but operates at the will of the town. LHRA has an estimated \$2.5 million in assets.

Root emphasized the authority is but one component of potential deals. Historically there hasn't been competition for its services,

and it is limited in terms of the projects that come its way.

LHRA thinks in terms of the economic benefit to Londonderry and the restrictions, he said. Paul told him in supporting this request for a greater organizational role she wants those with prospective projects to have equal opportunity for consideration.

With its approval Council Chair John Farrell also asked for more future oversight of LHRA's role.

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Senior Resources Committee Holds March Meeting

The Londonderry Senior Resources Committee (SRC) met for their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, March 16, and discussed a variety of topics that involve Londonderry's aging population.

Acting Vice-Chairman, Rob Palmer, chaired this particular meeting.

The SRC charter was briefly discussed as to the fact that it only authorizes the committee to make recommendations to the Town Council for programs and issues which might benefit the town's senior citizens.

It was noted that other types of town committees appear to be chartered to take a more action-oriented approach to achieve their mandate.

The committee decided to continue to explore requesting possible changes to its charter to get more aligned with the operations of other town committees.

There were discussions about identifying and interacting with other state organizations that also exist to promote better services for seniors.

There was some deliberation on having

the committee prioritize their ideas, set goals and focus on achieving one or more of these goals during 2021.

The committee in general likes the idea of recognizing a business or an individual with an award for extraordinary service provided to seniors but needs to define that program more before submitting it to the Town Council.

It was then recommended that the SRC establish a process for implementing such a program and then submit it to the Town Council who can possibly incorporate it into the citizens' awards announced at the Town Deliberative Session.

There was also a mention of creating a five- to 10-year plan for a multi-purpose Londonderry Senior Center, especially since the Town's senior population has recently increased tremendously.

That discussion will be ongoing and needs to

be coordinated with Cathy Blash, Director of the Senior Center who is also a liaison member of the SRC.

The committee members present talked about updating a list of local businesses who provide discounts to seniors and a list of services important to seniors. It was agreed that this would be discussed further at next month's meeting. It was decided that the SRC would check into getting a general email address before next month's meeting in order to be able to interact with the public to gather the necessary information to prepare comprehensive lists of senior discounts and senior services. Such an email account would also be beneficial to learn of issues, problems and suggestions

from seniors.

There was a discussion about services required by seniors which were unattainable. Most notable was snowplowing and snow shoveling.

Everyone agreed that it is difficult to determine who needs that help and how to identify who can help them. The committee explored setting up a volunteer group of some type but the legal issues might be insurmountable.

Someone mentioned that at one time there was a "seniors helping seniors group" which might be an option. One of the SRC members agreed to find out more about the current status of that organization from a local resident who was involved with them some time ago.

E. Kent Allen, Jr., 81, of Londonderry died Saturday, March 13, 2021 in his home surrounded by his loving family following a lengthy illness. Response to Pitre Letter

To the editor,

I am responding to Mr. Pitre's letter about the current crisis at the southern border. First, let me be clear, there is a humanitarian crisis at the border. The Administration cancelled some of President Trump's policies and the result has been an increase in the number of unaccompanied minors seeking asylum. These children are currently living in crowded, unacceptable conditions. We criti-

cized the last President for keeping children in these conditions, so as Democrats, we must own it and fix it.

That said, let's take a look specifically at Mr. Pitre's claims. First, he says that there were more illegals entering now than in any year in the previous administration. This isn't correct. Using Customs and Border Patrol figures, there were 100,441 encounters in February. This is an increase from December 74,000 and January 78,000, but in May 2019 the number was 144,116. The numbers for the two months prior and after May were all over 100 thousand each.

Next, he said that 108 illegals tested positive for COVID 19, were released in Arizona which had "no authority" to quarantine them. Again incorrect, the State was Texas and as we know, it is Governors who set state policy on quarantining. The Biden administration has offered funding to Texas to pay for testing and quarantining, which the Governor of Texas refused.

Rather than refute the allegations about migrant impact on society, I will simply draw your attention to an Associated Press fact check of February 8th 2019 entitled "Trump plays on immigration myths". I found this to be very helpful in understanding the complexities of this issue. We, Democrats don't want illegal immigration. Rather, we want fair, legal immigration. We want secure borders. Naar tragically lost his life in an automobile accident one week earlier, on Friday night, March 12, on Hardy Road.

Naar was a captain on the Lancer football and Lacrosse teams.

The procession of grieving students and community members lasted for nearly two and a half hours and ended with Jacob's dad, Reggie Naar, thanking all of those who attended the service. "What a gorgeous day, I think it's a sign that Jake is smiling down on us."

Naar's spirit will certainly live on, as hundreds have donated to the newly established scholarship fund, which as of Sunday, reached nearly \$62,000. That scholarship will help to enable many Lancer graduates to pursue higher education in his memory.

The Sunday service was broken up into a number of groups to try and keep social distancing guidelines enforced. Londonderry's Educational Staff, Community Members, Extended

Friends/Families were invited to attend first, Londonderry Students underclassmen and their Family members were allowed second, Lancer Seniors in the Class of 2021, LHS Alumni, and those family members were third, and the Football, Lacrosse and Cheer teams, with their coaches, and families of those teams were the last to pay their respects.

Londonderry Police Captain, Patrick Cheetaham played bagpipes to welcome the final group onto the field.

Following the over two-hour procession, teammates and many other students and their family members were allowed to remain on the field to hear a number of those close to Jacob speak of his life.

First to speak was

High School Assistant Principal, Katie Sullivan, who reminded everyone attending of Naar's infectious personality and how much he had matured over the last two-years.

The first students to speak were the varsity Cheerleader captains. They spoke about how he was an amazing human being and a kind soul. "Jake has left an everlasting impact on this community," Lilly Tharrington said.

"His constant positivity will always live on through all of us," Alyssa Pitarys added.

"He changed this community for the better, more than he'll ever know. He will always be remembered, and Jake lives on," said Nikki Longua.

Following the Spirit captains, Naar's Lacrosse teammates Zach Faw-

cett and Aiden O'Loughlin spoke, "Jake had the ability to transform anyone's day into a good one," Fawcett said. He added that he felt Jake is still doing what he always did, and that was watching out for all of his friends.

O'Loughlin reminisced of the time spent with Naar throughout their school years, playing football and video games. He told the family that he knew nothing could take the pain away from losing him but hoped that knowing how many lives he had touched would help bring them some peace and comfort. He ended with, "Jake will forever hold a place in our hearts."

Budget Committee Retains Current Officers, Ponders Covid Funds

The Londonderry Budget Committee again selected Chair Chad Franz, Vice Chair Jonathan Kipp, and Secretary Jennifer Kenney to remain in their positions.

In addition, Franz welcomed newly elected members Tim Siekmann, who has served on the committee before, and Joseph Gagnon to the March 18 meeting.

He stressed the importance of regular attendance given the panel's fiduciary responsibility and communication with him in advance if any member could not make a meeting. Three unexcused absences can lead to the Town Council determining whether that

member should stay on the committee.

Also at its meeting the committee made the following liaison assignments. The job here requires observation or attending of each organization's meetings, touching base with officials on budgets and on what's upcoming, and reporting back to the budget committee.

Department of Public Works – Joseph Gagnon

Police Department – Steve Breault

Fire Department – Jonathan Kipp

Capital Improvement Plan – Steve Breault

Town Council – Chad Franz and (as secondary liaison) Tim Siekmann

School Board – Tim Siekmann and (backup

liaison) Joseph Gagnon
School Finance Director – Jennifer Kenney

School Superintendent – Tim Siekmann

Franz agreed to secondary liaisons for the School Board and Town Council with the number of meetings but did not want to create too many multiple liaisons to avoid confusion for department heads. "They already have enough on their plate," he said.

At the last town council meeting, which returned John Farrell as chair and Joseph Green as vice chair, Captain Patrick Cheetham, Police Department division commander for support services, discussed body worn cameras with the members.

The council voted unanimously to approve the police department's expenditure of \$496,000 over five years – with 30 percent up front, and the balance amortized over the final four years – to outfit 50 officers with body cams with a vendor, Body Worn, being chosen.

The police have excess funds as a result of retirements and positions that have not been filled. The department anticipates that

occurring again next year.

With passage of the federal covid stimulus, receipt of funds for Londonderry is anticipated, Franz noted. Town Manager Kevin Smith will go before the council to present his recommendation as to how funds will be dispersed and the purposes.

The council will then vote. No dollar amount has been finalized, Franz said. But one use not permitted for the funds is to directly or indirectly offset the tax rate. They may be used for infrastructure, overtime costs, and first responder personnel.

Siekmann wondered about reimbursement for covid-specific expenses already incurred and much of that covered by grants if money can't go to offset the tax rate with voters having just approved the 2022 budget.

Franz is assuming the schools will receive some funds as well. He requested that school finance liaison Jennifer Kenney talk to Business Administrator Peter Curro about whether the town will also be receiving any funds from the state.

Kipp asked that the town council and school board liaisons alert the

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A Brief Look at the Very Early Londonderry Settlement

Our town is getting busier. More traffic and more news about it. A look back in history can be interesting. Sometimes we get surprised.

Some roads we complain about were originally the main thoroughfares in town.

I shall recount the early development at a busy intersection called Dismore Corner, named for a family that lived there. It is the intersection of High Range and

Pillsbury Roads.

The first east-west route across Londonderry was laid out in 1739. It started at Coteville Road, a little southwards from Cote Lane. The route followed Cote Lane over the hills to Hovey Road near the Old Hill Cemetery, along Spring Road and through the Kings to the northeast corner of Nelson Field. It crossed Moose Hill, then through the trees beside the Police Station and through the school to become Pillsbury Road beside the

Kent Allen Forest. It followed Pillsbury, High Range and Parmenter Roads to Old Nashua Road. Other parts of Pillsbury Road were added piecemeal. One bit connected Hardy Road to Anderson Lane but through the Valley Cemetery and then behind Southview Condominiums! It was not connected to the western part of Pillsbury Road until 1769. The entire route formed part of a major road referred to as the road from Portsmouth to Thorn-

ton's Ferry. It followed Pinecrest Road through Litchfield. Then Wiley Hill, High Range and Pillsbury Roads to Hardy Road. Over the hills to Hovey, Madden and Folsom Roads. Then via Pinkerton Street, East Derry Road and Old Chester Road. In the 1820s and early 1830s it was the only Stage route through Londonderry, continuing through Derry, Chester and Raymond where it merged with the route to Exeter. The Stage route on Mammoth Road came later. High Range Road was the main north-south road in our town and was known as the road between Manchester and Hudson. It had existed as a trail since the earliest times. Where these two roads met was a natural focus for settle-

ment.

In Colonial times, settlement was limited. There were only three families and a tannery. After the Revolutionary War there was a big change. Trade goods were brought from Boston, via the Middlesex canal and the Merrimack River to Thornton's Ferry then eastwards along this road to East Derry. The rum trade was a large part of it. An inn was opened at 209 Pillsbury Road, a "House of Entertainment" at 109 High Range Road and liquor licenses were issued to 93 and 84 High Range Road. A school was built at 20 Wiley Hill Road. During the 1820s the inn on Pillsbury converted to a house of entertainment and the house of entertainment on High Range

became a tavern. Later, part of the Portsmouth to Thornton's Ferry road became known as the "Old Rum Trail" on account of the rum trade.

After Derry and Londonderry separated the activity at Dismore Corner became far more subdued. The settlement still supported two stores at 82 and 84 High Range Road and a school, but the taverns and houses of entertainment closed and no more liquor licenses were issued. Today, even the stores and school are gone. When I came to town almost forty years ago, Pillsbury Road was a quiet country road with a few cars. Today, it is again a major thoroughfare. Change is always with us.
