In Colonial times, settlement was limited. There were only three families and a tannery. After the Revolutionary War there was a big change. Trade goods were brought from Boston, via the Middlesex canal and the Merrimack River to Thornton's Ferry then eastwards along this road to East Derry. The rum trade was a large part of it. An inn was opened at 209 Pillsbury Road, a "House of Entertainment" at 109 High Range Road and liquor licenses were issued to 93 and 84 High Range Road. A school was built at 20 Wiley Hill Road. During the 1820s the inn on Pillsbury converted to a is again a major thorhouse of entertainment and the house of enter-

After Derry and Londonderry separated the activity at Dismore Corner became far more subdued. 


