School District Has 35 Adult Ed Graduates

The Londonderry School District held its 2021 Spring Adult Education Graduation last week and marked the highest number of young adults to graduate through the system.

Investigation of "Conflict of Interest" Charges Ended

During the Monday night, June 7, Town Council members Deb Paul and Jim Butler continued to debate the accusations leveled by Butler during their last meeting of ethical violations being committed by Paul at a Planning Board meeting last month.

During the council's May 17 meeting, Butler came forward just before the meeting adjourned with a statement which accused Paul of conflict of interest in regards to her Planning Board liaison position and advertisements printed in the

newspaper she owns: the Londonderry Times.

In the Town Council's most recent meeting on Tuesday night, Chairman John Farrell opened up the meeting to any public comment. Paul presented a formal statement regarding the incident that she felt was unwarranted.

Paul felt that because she was blind-sided by the allegation by Butler at the end of the last meeting, she felt clarification was needed.

"I feel I need to make this statement to set the record straight," Paul began with.

Paul told the board that Butler's claims were "untrue" and were an

attempt to "tarnish" her reputation.

"I chose to run for town council for the taxpayers of this community, not to draw more advertising dollar for my job," Paul said. "If anything, taking on the responsibilities of the town council have affected my business in an adverse way."

Paul also said in her statement that it was "curious" why Butler did not make similar accusations regarding a landscaper who might get landscaping work or a real estate agent that may receive the listing contract for the new building.

Heritage Commission Reviews Woodmont Commons Design

The Heritage Commission reviewed a site plan design amendment during their most recent meeting on May 27.

The site plan amendment detailed the businesses in the new development area of the Woodmont commons.

The commission first went over the formal application review for the plan of the construction of a two-story medical office building on Pillsbury

Road and Michaels way.

Jeff Kevan of TFMoran and Chris Nickerson of E. Nickerson Associates presented the design proposal to the commission.

The applicants' proposal had previously faced the commission and had issues regarding the placement of the building on the lot as well as the adjoining parking lot.

The issues were resolved in compliance with the commission's request and followed a

site plan memo from Town Planner Collen Mailloux after her consultation with the town of Londonderry's attorney.

According to Mailloux, the structure is categorized as a "flex building" on a "flex

Town Council Tables Residential to Commercial Rezoning

The Town Council discussed a proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance on Nashua Road during latest meeting on Monday, May 17.

The Zoning Ordinance amendment was presented to the council by Town Planner Colleen Mailloux.

The proposal was to rezone the area in discussion from an AR-1 (Agricultural-Residential-1) to a C-II (Commercial II) district.

During the meeting's public comment, Lon-

donderry Resident and neighbor Mark Gleason said that he has some concerns with the amendment.

"I have no problem with Mr. Tate, and he's been a great neighbor and there has been no problem with his business," Gleason said. "However, the zoning change follows the property and not the owner."

Gleason said he is concerned about what would happen to the property if it were to be sold after it is granted the C-II redistricting. He also said that the wetlands neighbor his

property and that he would like to see a variance granted for the area.

Julie Christensen-Collins, another resident and neighboring resident of the property, also said that she is concerned about what would happen if the property ever sold.

Attorney for the property owners Pat Pancionocco spoke about some of her concerns of residents being voiced regarding the ordinance.

"I understand where it is coming from, but we haven't touched upon how the surround-

ing properties are zoned," Panciocco said.

Panciocco said that the lots across the street from the area are mostly zoned of a mix of C-I and C-II.

According to Panciocco, C-II was chosen for this area because there is more control over the storm water, and it is a longer process to permit these areas.

Panciocco said that the property is currently mainly used for residential purposes but that the owner does currently use the area to store antique vehicles.

Presenter Colleen Mailloux explained to the Council what uses the property would be allowed under a C-II zoning district which include several different commercial options.

Mailloux also said that applying for a variance for the use or criteria of the property is a possibility. She said that there is a "draw-back" to this, though.

According to Mailloux, there is no additional review for the Planning Board to make sure site criteria is met. This would all fall under the Zoning Board.

After discussing the

several options, the Council unanimously came to the conclusion that the property owner should get a variance from the Zoning Board and that changing the property to a C-II is not needed.

The Ordinance was temporarily tabled by the Council until the applicant goes to the Zoning Board of adjustments (ZBA). If the motion fails at the ZBA, it will come back to the Town Council.

The applicant's proposal next went to the Planning Board at their Meeting held on May 2.

In Honor of Flag Day last Sunday. On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed a resolution to establish an official flag of the 13 United States. The flag would be 13 stripes, alternating red and white, with 13 stars, white, in a field of blue. The national flag of America was born. That flag would forever become the symbol of the United States, a symbol of a country forged in the fires of a revolution and tempered with the blood of its patriots.

The American flag stood firm and resolute above Fort McHenry through that perilous fight. Was raised on Mt. So, please do not just toss them out bring you old flags to your local post, legion, etcetera, and let them retire them in an honor they deserve. Thank you.

Dangerous Afghanistan Withdrawal

To the editor,
The planned withdrawal of all U.S. and European troops from Afghanistan by Sept. 11, 2021 will probably allow the Taliban to reconquer Afghanistan and impose a strict Islamist regime within the country, and establish terrorist organizations devoted to attacking the US.

The Taliban followers are terrorists who are aligned with al-Qaida, and they are the same groups who have launched terrorist attacks in the world over the past 30 years, including the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks in the United States.

We need to keep adequate military forces in the region outside of Afghanistan to counter Taliban and al-Qaida moves in Afghanistan and to keep them off balance to prevent attacks against us. A US Navy carrier battle group and an amphibious assault force must be deployed in the region to provide the capabilities for air bombardment and missile attacks as necessary.

The Taliban are the enemy and must be treated as such.

Conservation Matters: Baby Animal Encounters

We are blessed in the great state of New Hampshire to live side by side with so much wildlife. Even in our most heavily populated areas we catch glimpses of creatures of all kinds. Educating ourselves about these animals is an important part of living here, especially in spring when we are most likely to find an adorable baby in our neighborhood.

It is easy to assume that any wild baby you find by itself has been abandoned, but this is not always the case. A mother must often leave her young to find food, and you (or your dog) may happen upon the baby at just that time.

Hands Off

Our human nature calls on us to help a baby animal on our travels, and seeing a beautiful spotted fawn lying on its own in a field is probably one of the best examples of this. The mother must leave its fawn to forage, and typi-

cally leaves it in high grasses where the fawn can lay down and remain unseen. The mother will come back, barring unforeseen circumstances.

If you come across a fawn, note the time and its location and leave it be. A doe will leave a fawn unattended for up to 12 hours in some cases, so if you come back the following day and the fawn is still there, it's a good idea to call for some advice. If the fawn is moving around and calling out, there may be trouble.

Another common encounter is a nest of baby rabbits, called kittens. A simple way to tell if a nest has been abandoned is to crisscross some thin string across the top of the nest. If the string is found to be disturbed the following day, you know the mother has returned to the nest. If the strings are still in place, it may be time to call for help.

How to Help

Important to note is that in any situation, jumping in to physically

help the animal without first consulting a trained wildlife specialist is not advised. After all, animals have survived without human interference forever. If you are concerned that an animal has, in fact, been abandoned, the best thing you can do for it is to contact the professionals.

NH Fish & Game is, of course, a great resource. There are also many licensed wildlife rehabilitators in our state that have different areas of focus. You can find a comprehensive list on NH Fish & Game's website at wildlife.state.nh.us/wildlife/rehabilitators. They are listed by county and by which animals they are licensed to care for.

Not every animal encounter will require a rehabber; however, they are your best resource to help you help the animal. Here in Rockingham County we are fortunate to have Millstone Wildlife Center in Windham, run by Frannie Greenberg. Frannie has been a great resource

when questions come up, but she is also always willing to help any way she can, no matter how small the animal is, and no matter how insignificant one may think the situation. I have even witnessed Frannie feeding a baby mouse with a dropper! Once those babies are

nursed back to health and are ready to return to the wild, the rehabbers will release them in an appropriate place.

The excitement of coming across baby animals in the wild often makes people act without thinking through the repercussions of moving or handling the baby.

This is probably the only time I suggest whipping out your phone to get an insta-worthy shot before acting on what you're seeing! So get out there, enjoy our beautiful trails (or even just your yard) and keep your eyes peeled. You never know what you may find!

She also said that she has taken on legal advice from her own attorney.

"He focused solely on me," Paul said. "Once again trying to harass, intimidate, and tarnish my name and my business."

Paul said that she was coming to the board with the statement to "seek clarification" on where her investigation stands and said she is demanding a public apology from Butler and the board.

"I'm done with you

trying to shut me up and intimidate me," Paul said. "If the board wants to waste its time and the taxpayers' dollars yet again to appease Mr. Butler then please go ahead — but I've done nothing wrong."

Chairman Farrell said that after not being prepared for the surprise statement made last meeting, he has since spoken with the town attorney, reread the ethics ordinance, and reread the charter.

"There is a process in place to be followed if someone has an accusation of improprieties of a

town councilor," Farrell said. "Going forward what I want to see is that we follow the rules and the laws that are put in place."

Farrell also said that there is currently no investigation on Paul and that if one is to be brought forward it needs to be done through the town charter as required by law.

"We will follow the ethics ordinance and we will follow the law," Farrell said. "Rules are the same or everybody. Nobody gets their own rules, we have one set of rules — the rules of the

town council."

Butler made a comment on the issue and said that this accusation was not the beginning of disagreements between him and Paul.

Referring to an earlier controversy right after Paul's first joining of the board, Butler talked about an incident where Butler's family came to a town meeting to "defend" themselves as a result of accusations made by Paul.

"Quite frankly Deb Paul attacked my credibility and I will not tolerate that," Butler said. "So Deb Paul wants to

know where it started? It started with Deb Paul."

Farrell closed the discussion with a final statement, which looked to move past the situation and focus on other town matters.

"As long as I'm sitting here as the chairman, I'm not goanna tolerate

an outburst about what happened at the last meeting again," Farrell said. "I will do my darnest to make every person's goal on here to be accomplished. Figure out what that is, focus on what's important to you, and let's move forward."

Planning Board Recommends to Rezone Young Road

The Planning Board discussed and voted on recommending the rezoning and potential developments of 22 Young Road to the Town Council during their May 2 meeting.

The area currently acts as an age-restricted area and the applicant hopes to create Multi-Family housing.

By changing the zone to R-III, the developers hope to preserve the area from somebody developing a commercial center.

"The idea of commercial development here would be a major

change to this are," One member said. "It's a property that isn't necessarily intensively looked at for change or development."

Board members expressed their concerns regarding the already existing heavy traffic in the area. Some of them said that implementing this development could worsen the existing issues on route 102 which nears the proposed rezoning district.

Member Ann Chiampa said she is not in favor of the proposal.

"Traffic is going too fast, and I don't think it's appropriate to change zoning requirements to

increase zoning there."

Although he said he is happy the plan is for housing and not apartment buildings, Member Lynn Wiles also said he does not want to rezone the area.

"I don't support the rezoning because the intersection with 102," Wiles said. "I would first like to see some plan for how we would mitigate the impact of this development at this intersection."

Member Giovanni Verani also made a comment about the traffic concerns voiced by other board members.

"I think traffic concerns would be the

same if not worse with a C-I zone," Verani said. "I do understand traffic concerns, but I think everybody should keep in mind that there would be traffic concerns with any type of development put there."

Board Member Jake Butler said that he agreed to make the zone residential but that he thinks a R-III would create harsher traffic conditions. Instead, he suggested that the district be changed to an AR-I.

If the zone were changed to AR-I as opposed to R-III, Butler said it would mandate larger acre lots in the development minimizing

the cars and traffic coming from the new neighborhood.

Some members of the public agreed with board members about the traffic concerns. Resident Daniel Clark said he liked Butler's idea to rezone under an AR-I.

Clark also said that he does not like the current construction plan but that he also doesn't want to see larger developments.

"I do fear that we potentially could have them turn around and make apartment buildings instead so I'd like that if we could put legal restrictions in there so if

this is approved no apartments could go in," Clark said.

The board voted on the rezoning proposal with a motion by Vice Chairperson Chris Davies.

Board member Deb Paul decided to recuse herself from the vote as she knew the issue would be brought to the town council where she has a role and felt it wouldn't be appropriate to vote.

The board carried the motion to rezone the district with a 5-3-1 vote. The plan next faced the Town Council during one of their meetings in the coming weeks.

block." This allows the applicants to have a parking lot partially located on Michael's way in accordance with the Woodmont Commons master plan.

Kevan spoke on the placement of the building which is centered on Michael's way as well as the six-inch wall surrounding the parking lot.

The wall will be located on Michael's way and wrap around the corner down Governor Bell drive and toward Settler's way. It will also detail indentations of about two inches in order to create a "sitting area" for surrounding pedestrians.

Nickerson reviewed the changes that were made at the request of the commission and said that it meets the commission's goal of

creating a "traditional building" while also adding a "modern flair."

In addition to the commission prioritizing more of a traditional model, Nickerson said that the modern twist of the building is also important as it is a medical facility, and the applicants need to "demonstrate advanced technology."

The Commission had also discussed sev-

eral color changes they would like to see in the further development of the proposal.

Town Council Liaison Jim Butler suggested that the brick used in the project should have a more traditional color as opposed to the darkened brick that was initially pitched in the plan. Most of the commission agreed with Butler's suggestion.

The commission also hoped to see the

red color of the mullions in the corner windows of the design to match the color of the brick which would be used in the wall that will wrap around the parking lot.

The applicant is being asked to select the light-colored brick discussed by the commission and coordinate the mullions colors in the coming steps of the plans' finalization.

Council Liaison But-

ler made a motion to move forward with the recommendation of the project which was seconded by Member David Colglazier. The motion passed with a 7-0 vote.

The applicants faced the Planning Board during their most recent meeting which took place on June 2. Those who wish to go back and review the meeting can do so by visiting the Board's website.

The first United Airlines flight since May 2020 returned to the Manchester-Boston Regional Airport on Thursday, June 3.

With the return of United Airlines, MHT is now served by three airlines. Southwest and American Airlines continue to offer flights in the Granite state to a handful of destinations.

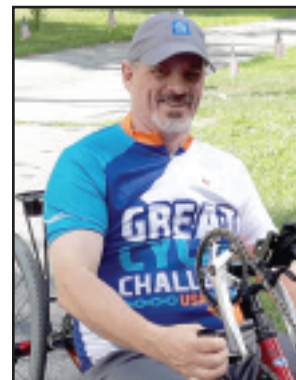
Delta Air Lines stopped flights during the pandemic.

Cole Duarte and Fawcett led the team with shots on net with six each.

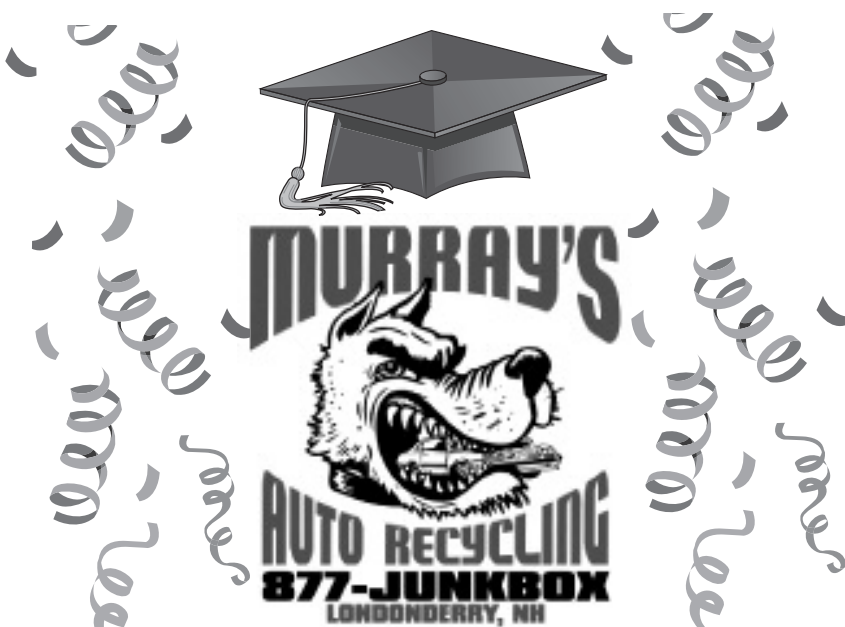

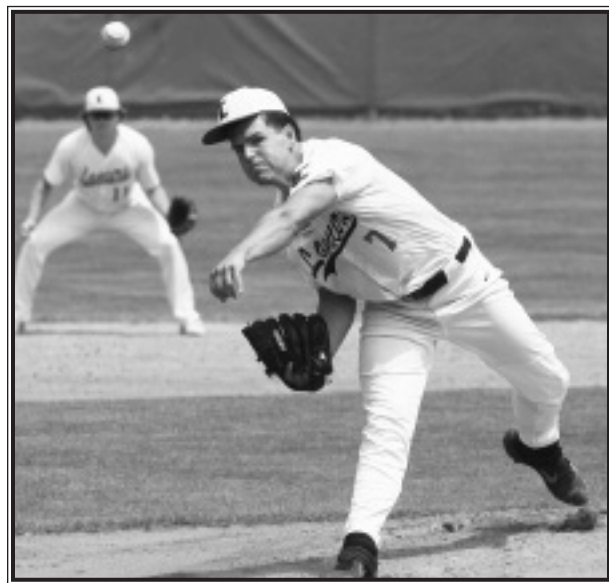
