Town Council held a Public Hearing on an ordinance that would create a Commercial and Industrial Property Tax Incentive Program, and after nearly an hour of discussing the pros and cons, decided to have the Town plan slightly to better benefit the taxpayers.

The program was brought to the Town Council a number of months ago by the former Town Manager, designed specifically to benefit outweighs the

Planning Board Gives Conditional Use Permit For Eversource

uring the May 4 Londonderry Planning Board meeting one of the agenda items was in regards to a conditional use permit to allow Eversource to replace and remove some of the transmission lines in Londonderry.

Conor Madison from GZA, the consultant for the project said that they are replacing a total of 13 transmission lines

"Our scope includes a total of 13 utility structures to be replaced and the removal of one. This ture replacement," said

Madison Madison said as part of the replacement project they won't be clearing any trees.

"Were not clearing any trees or widing any of the right of way," said Madison.

Madison said that it's going to be off of nine roads.

It was explained that the proposed replacement is based on the utility structures being subject to environmental damage. It was also explained that the proposed structures to be replaced are based on site visit evaluations.

Madison said that

Londonderry Town Planner Colleen Mailloux said that the project was reviewed by the Conservation Commission and they recommended approval for the project.

"I think this is a fairly straightforward project," said Mailloux.

Nelson said that they have about a 70 year lifespan. He said that the wood ones usually last 30 to 40 years depending on the site.

Another question that was asked was how abbutters are notified about the projects. It was explained that Eversource notifies abutters about upcoming work by mail and in some

Continued from page 1 business. Those that have a new construction estimate of over \$30 million would be considered a "Tier One" project. Tier Two projects would be an anticipated increase of over \$15 million, and Tier Three proiects would need to be \$2.5 million or more.

Each tier would be granted up to a 50 percent tax exemption in the first year the project is completed.

In tier one that amount would be stepped down by 10 percent each year for a five year plan or four percent each year for a ten year

plan. For Tier Two projects, the maximum discount would be between 30 and 40 percent and would step down by 7.5 percent for four years. Tier Three projects

would be allowed a 20 to 30 percent reduction in taxes the first year and that amount would step down in five percent increments for the four years following.

The Town Council would determine how much of a percentage projects in each tier would get.

Malaguti gave an example of how the plan would benefit the town comparing two properties in town, one residential and one com-

mercial, \$100.000.

In the example he showed that the two properties would appreciate at different rates. The commercial would show a much slower appreciation.

After the presenta-Councilor tion, Joe Green asked Malaguti if he could put together a variety of examples of how giving businesses a discount on their taxes would benefit the community.

Malaguti responded that in his first month as Town Manager he as received calls from developers about what kind of incentive programs are available. He noted that Derry has

both worth incentives for businesses, but we do not.

Malaguti and Town Assessor Steve Hamilton both said that it would be difficult to project without a real project.

Editorial Invaders in Our Midst

Are your neighbors' plants making on clothes, shoes or tires during the a home in your shrubbery? Is greenery that you never bought strangling your trees? Are leaves from unknown aquatic greens traveling on your boat to find a home in your favorite lake?

Conservation officials remind us that invasive plants are a local problem, and they're a problem in our waterways as well.

According to the state's invasive species coordinator, invasive plants impact endangered or threatened species, reduce diversity and wildlife habitat, affect water quality, damage property, and lead to starvation of birds.

Japanese knotweed, bittersweet, purple loosestrife, multiflora rose, and burning bush thrive locally all literally have a stranglehold on portions of our woodlands and roadsides.

But we don't have to leave our yards to encounter invasive. All it takes is ignoring an invasive's presence in one location, and soon it has taken over the neighborhood.

What an invasive does is simple they take over, crowding out native plants. It's a battle we may be losing, and we can't wait for someone else to take care of it - if the plants have arrived, they'll be in your yard soon.

Homeowners can help control these invaders by learning to identify them, joining in volunteer efforts to control them, and following professionals' instructions about disposing of any soil and plant matter that gets

eradication.

Meanwhile, if you think the water is safe from unwelcome visitors, think again.

State officials regularly issue warnings to boaters to pay attention to what they might be putting in the water. Summers in New Hampshire now demand a new way to look at hitchhiking and littering - boats, trailers, motors, fishing equipment, bait buckets, and diving gear can carry aquatic weeds, leaving an infested lake in their wake.

With no natural predators, the plants quickly dominate native plants, fish, and aquatic life. That translates into impaired water quality and reduced shorefront property values.

If you enjoy a kayak or canoe ride, pay attention to the plants in the water as well as the scenery and birdlife you are paddling out to enjoy. If you've had your boat in another body of water, examine it carefully before returning to your home lake. Encourage fellow boaters to do the same.

Prevention is the name of the game, and it's the job of each one of us to preserve the quality of the lakes we love. And back on land? Contact your local conservation commission, Extension Service or the state for advice on getting rid of invasive plants. This battle won't be won unless each of us does our share.



Since there was some question if the NHDOT would accept the word "Trail" as a recognized designation for a road, Ms. Chiampa suggested the Old Rum Road be approved by the Town Council as an alternative.




