DOT Invites Residents for Public Meeting on the Exit 4A Project

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) is inching closer to beginning construction on the Exit 4A project that was conceived over 30 years

ago.

On Thursday, Aug. 4, NHDOT staff will be holding an Open House from 6 to 7 p.m., at the West Running Brook Middle School Gymnasium located at 1 West Running Brook Lane. Following the Open House,

a presentation of the latest advancements in the project will take place starting at 7 p.m.

The NHDOT recently announced the advancing of the final design for the Derry-Londonderry 13065 I-93 Exit 4A project. **continued on page 2**

Public Hearing For School Retention Bonuses, Aug. 2

During the July 19 School Board meeting it was announced by School Board Chair, Amy Finamore, the board would be having a public hearing on Aug. 2 regarding a matter that was discussed during a non-public session on July 5.

She explained that last spring the School Board spent time in each of the schools checking in with staff and listened to their concerns and goals for the future.

“This is a practice the School Board plans

to continue next year and in years to come to support all of our employees in successful and fulfilling careers in our district,” said Finamore.

Finamore explained one of the specific struggles they heard in each of the schools was the struggle to be fully staffed for support staff, which causes difficulty in daily operations throughout the district. She said the last few months they have had open dialogues about it and how to address it.

Finamore stated going into the school year, they are proposing

to have a one-time support staff benefit, specifically a retention bonus, “That hopefully encourages all staff covered by the support staff union to return for the 2022-23 school year.”

“As a school board, based on what we heard and observed this school year we know we need to address the amount of support staff vacancies immediately as these shortages put too much strain and stress on our entire school system,” said Finamore.

Finamore said that the bonus would be \$500 **continued on page 7**

Young Road Development Plan Gets Some Positive Feedback

After being denied earlier in the year by the Zoning Board of Adjustments (ZBA), Aaron Orso, a developer looking to build homes at 20 and 22 Young road was in front of the Planning Board during their Wednesday, July 13 meeting, this time, for a conceptual and non-binding discussion on a proposed site plan for 21 single family homes.

Orso was looking to build about 50 homes on the property originally, but was met with resistance by abutters at the ZBA.

Orso appeared at planning with a different plan, saying that they are sticking with the same style homes.

“I’ve never wavered from that,” said Orso.

Some of the things that they are looking to do as part of the development is to have a private road, and have 17.6 acres of open space which was pointed out is more than is required.

While there will be a type of homeownership association it was also pointed out that the owners would own each individual lot meaning that they can put things up like sheds if they are within the zoning regula-

tions.

Orso said they wanted to have single family homes with services provided, which is what a lot of people are looking for instead of having an acre of land that they have to take care of.

“They are more interested in having a quality home in a nice neighborhood,” said Orso.

Financial Assistance Available for Residents with Water Issues

The town of Londonderry recently announced some funding sources that residents with dry wells or PFAS issues can take advantage of.

Residents with private wells may be able to take advantage of two upcoming financial assistance opportunities available through the state.

For Dry Wells:

Emergency financial

assistance is available for "low-income NH homeowners served by residential wells that are experiencing irreversible water supply quantity or quality problems" due to extreme weather conditions (drought, hurricane etc.) or natural hazards (flooding, earthquake etc.).

The program is structured/classified for reimbursements to vendors to alleviate the burden of initial payment for services. The online

application portal - for private well owners and vendors, will open in early August and will be posted under NH DES Water Well Rebate on the NH Department of Environmental Services' website.

According to Commissioner, Robert Scott, "We are watching the drought status and have reached out to well drillers so that they know of the potential for the program to be available should they wit-

ness a situation or are asked about financial support".

Residents who feel they qualify for the program or have questions should contact Erin Holmes at NH DES - Erin.L.Holmes@des.nh.gov.

PFAS Removal Rebate Program

On Monday, July 25, the state began taking applications to those who live outside the St. Gobain Consent Decree Area in town and are thus not receiving bot-

tled water and a long-term solution from St. Gobain. Funding from this program will potentially assist these residents, private well owners who have been using a private vendor for testing, or other private wells not tested to date by either NH DES or a private vendor.

The program will provide up to \$5,000 for the purchase and installation of a treatment system (point of use or point of entry) designed to

remove PFAS or up to \$10,000 to connect to an existing water system. More details can be found on the DES website: www4.des.state.nh.us/nh-pfas-investigation/?page_id=1419 or by contacting Erin Holmes at NH DES - Erin.L.Holmes@des.nh.gov.

Orso stated they have various schemes that go with the model of the homes.

"We never do anything that is cookie cutter," said Orso.

It was explained by Orso the homes would be 2,400 to 2,500 square feet with a larger master bedroom and an open concept downstairs.

Orso said that they built similar type homes in a couple of developments in Salem and that people have been going for them instead of bigger homes that they are building.

Orso explained they would be putting the homes on the market for

whatever the going rate is.

"Whatever a three bedroom goes for we will be marketing it at," said Orso.

Town Council Liaison, Deb Paul, said she thinks they did a good job with making changes to the proposal.

"You did a great job working with neighbors and everyone in the community," said Paul.

Paul stated she thought it would be a good thing if they used brick or stone to differentiate the colors and said that she thought 1,800 to 1,900 square feet would be more affordable for couples that aren't planning on hav-

ing kids and want to live in a nice development.

Paul also asked if they are considering having solar powered houses in the development.

Orso explained they will allow people to have options for what they want for their homes including things like having solar panels.

It was pointed out by Orso that they would be on Town water.

Planning Board member, Roger Fillio, asked whether or not they would be going with propane or natural gas.

Orso said they would be going with whatever is easier.

Fillio said he wasn't opposed to them going with propane.

Orso added, "I am not opposed to propane."

Planning Board member, Jake Butler, said he thought the size of the proposed lots were good.

One of the things pointed out by Orso was that he wants to get the abutters involved with the proposed development early, so they are on board with the project earlier.

Orso stated he thinks right now the homes will be priced in the \$750,000 price range. He said the cost of building in Londonderry and in NH in general is very high.

"It's becoming unaffordable to live here," said Orso.

Summer Heat Can Be Dangerous

Boy, it's getting hot out there now. We're in our first extreme heat stretch of the summer. With temperatures being well into the 90s, add the humidity, it feels like it is 100 degrees. Sending the air conditioners into over drive and those without them looking for shade.

Time to remind everyone to take proper precautions to protect themselves, family, the elderly, and pets from this hot weather. These extreme heat conditions could lead to heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Here are some tips from the American Red Cross that may help:

- Never leave children or pets in your vehicle.
- Stay hydrated, drink plenty of fluids, and avoid drinks with caffeine or alcohol.
- Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothing.
- Slow down, stay indoors, avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day.
- Take frequent breaks if working outdoors.
- Check on family, friends and neighbors who do not have air conditioning, who spend much of their time alone or who are more likely to be affected by the heat.

Excessive heat can lead to: Heat Cramps; signs are cramps in legs or abdomen.

Heat Exhaustion; signs are cool, moist, pale or flushed skin, heavy sweating, headache, nausea, dizziness, weakness exhaustion.

Heat Stroke; signs are hot red skin

that may be dry or moist; changes in consciousness, vomiting and high body temperature.

If signs get worst, call 9-1-1.

Some signs of heat stroke in your pet according to www.akcchf.org:

- Heavy panting and unable to calm down, even when lying down.
- Brick red gum color
- Fast pulse rate
- Unable to get up.

If you suspect your pet has heat stroke, take their temperature. If the temperature is above 105 degrees, cool the animal down with water. Stop cooling the animal when the temperature reaches 103 degrees. Bring your pet to a veterinarian.

One last warning for those who want to cool off in the water, you should use places designated for that purpose. We realize it's challenging to find water recreation this year with fewer pools in operation and crowd limits on the places that are open. Avoid places off the beaten path; they can be dangerous for swimmers. If something goes wrong, there might not be anyone nearby to help. Be cautious.

Remember, in a few months we'll be talking about how much we miss these days.

Summer is normally a time of fun in the great outdoors and there should be plenty of opportunities for that once these dangerous temperatures subside.

Until then, we believe you should take the proper precautions to avoid the summer danger of extreme heat conditions.

School Board Gets Update on Possible Dress Code Changes

At the July 19 School Board meeting one of the agenda items was in regards to an update for their dress code committee.

Londonderry High School Principal, Jason Parent, said that the committee which was recently formed has begun.

"Our committee work is well underway," said Parent.

Parent told the School Board that assistant principal, Crystal Rich, will be the staff representative from the high school. Parent said that she has experience from teaching civics classes and students looking at the dress code.

It was explained by Parent that one of the policies that students are concerned about is around inequality, specifically language like distracting or disruptive which they feel seems to be more directed towards female students.

Parent said that he thinks that it will be a springboard for their future discussions.

In addition, Parent said that they had a student reach out after reading a newspaper article about the dress code committee and asked to be added.

Parent told the School Board that they are hopeful that they will find more representation from their students and if they don't, they will use student leaders from their class officers.

For the middle school, Parent said that they already received interest from a seventh grade student's parent, who wants to be on the Committee.

"I think we have the formation of a committee," said Parent.

The Committee was formed at a previous School Board meeting when School Board Vice Chair, Sara Loughlin, said she thought it was an important thing to explore and other schools have changed

their dress codes recently, including Pinkerton Academy.

Parent said that they are able to learn from the process that Pinkerton Academy went through this past spring and they are allowed to share their information with them.

One of the things that Pinkerton Academy did as part of their process was developing

a visual for what they deem to be appropriate under the dress code and it is showcased throughout the building. Parent said that is something they hope to do after a new policy is approved.

Additionally, Parent said Pinkerton Academy students also made a public service announcement to promote the new dress

code and to explain what the policies are.

Parent said he hopes they are able to do something similar in Londonderry.

"With Board support we envision something similar to this that

meets our needs," said Parent.

Parent stated they hope to have meetings as a committee in September and have draft policies in October for the school board's consideration in November.

I hope everyone is having an excellent summer. I would like to briefly introduce myself and explain why I am running as a NH House representative from Londonderry. I have lived in Londonderry for 30 years and have been active in Federal, State and local activities behind the scenes for many years. We may have even met during door to door canvassing, at Town Council, recent school board meetings or town PFAS committee meetings! After my daughter graduated from Londonderry High School and I retired from the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), I began thinking about how to use my work and educational background here in Londonderry.

After college in Minnesota, I attended George Washington University in Washington, DC at night for my Master's degree in Science, Technology and Public

Policy. I had worked for national environmental non-profit organizations for a few years and was working for the US Congressional Office of Technology Assessment (OTA) during the day at the time. After my job as the environmental and Union liaison at OTA, I began working for the US EPA TSCA & Superfund programs in DC, the State of Massachusetts and then later to the EPA Region 1 Office in Boston.

During my 42 years of government service, I've always been professionally tasked with helping to ensure and actively facilitate citizen involvement into the governmental decision making process. This

has led me to reaching out to a wide diversity of citizens groups, federal and state officials, federally recognized Tribes, industry associations, and environmental and Union leaders.

Over the years there has always been natural differences of opinions and viewpoints, but lately the public/private political discourse has been way beyond acrimonious. There are obviously many theories and reasons as to why this has occurred, however it is clearly not healthy for our form of democracy, does not promote workable compromises and solutions and is destructive to our relationships and communities. Utilizing my

career experiences with a variety of constituencies as well as mediation work, I want to help improve our political climate. Only then, can we actually focus attention on realistic compromises on crucial issues such as clean drinking water, women's health, decreasing gun violence and education for Londonderry citizens and our State. for all staff covered under the support staff union that returns this fall. She said that other issues would be addressed during collec-

tive bargaining.

During his most recent letter to families, Londonderry Superintendent, Dan Black, explained they are looking for more people to apply for positions in order to help with

staffing issues.

"We know we will need a lot of support in some areas with staffing to start this school year," said Black. "Over the last couple of years, it has become clear that we are not able to compete in the rapidly-changing labor market when it comes to our hourly staff positions. In time, we will use the collective bargaining process with our Support Staff Union to adjust to the labor market around us, but that will not happen by the first day of school. If you are able to work in our schools, even a couple hours a week, that would be hugely beneficial to our students and our schools."

Black stated those who like working with kids and want to get more involved with the schools are encouraged to reach out to Melissa Thomson by emailing her at mthomson@lon-

donderry.org to discuss the openings the district has.

"We intend to bring this 'call for help' to the community at large as well so please share this need with family mem-

bers and others in our community who might be interested," said Black. "Working together with our families and community, we hope to bridge this gap for our schools."

Republican leadership. Our workforce grew by 2,430 workers with 3,650 more people employed across the state which resulted in 2% unemployment, a new record low! I was proud to be a part of this team effort to get the critical bills passed, such as lowering the business and meals and room taxes.

Our budget was the most conservative and far-reaching budget in NH history. We cut spending by about 3%, increased our rainy-day

fund, and set a path to eliminate the Dividends Tax. Many states have told us how amazed they are on what we were able to accomplish in the budget! I will continue to work with others to get the necessary legislation done because we are not finished yet.

Inflation, fueled by failed Fed policies and led by crushing gas, oil, propane, electricity and food prices to say the least, threaten to make Londonderry residents choose between food or heating, and retreat to a lower lifestyle. A concept we are actively

investigating as a solution is to supplement the LIHEAP (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program) with a state program that picks up where LIHEAP leaves off. LIHEAP is a federally funded program that provides assistance to households who earn 60% or less of the state median income (SMI) <www.energy.nh.gov/consumers/help-energy-and-utility-bills/assistance-programs-eligibility>. With energy prices where they are now if that persists, many households who earn

more than 60% will also experience hardship. Those who already qualify could exhaust their benefits sooner. Because LIHEAP uses federal money, the state cannot adjust eligibility, benefits, or mix state and federal dollars together. Therefore, it may require the state to create a standalone program on its own.

My number one priority on education is parental rights and school choice. Parents have a right to know what is being taught to their child and have a right to know what is

going on inside the school. We also need to expand the Education Savings Account, so more parents have choices in educating their child. I will sponsor or co-sponsor bills that address these agendas.

The safety and reliability of our electric grid is paramount, especially for peak periods. We are more vulnerable during the winter, so I plan to sponsor a bill that would ensure baseload plants are available in emergency situations.

Part of my responsibilities is to oversee the budget of the Rocking-

ham County Attorney Office as the Chair of that subcommittee. As a result of fiscal efficiency county wide by the Commissioners and State Representatives who review and establish the county budget, there was no increase in county taxes this past term!

With Sept. 13 fast approaching, I ask for your support in the primary and your consideration on the exceptional job done by your current Londonderry representatives and senator.

The school district must assess every student when there is a suspected educational disability. The SAU #12, which serves the town of Londonderry, offers screenings of children before they enter public school to look for possible delays in language, learning and/or development.

Students who have been identified as having an educational disability but are not presently receiving services because they have refused services or have dropped out of school may still be eligible to receive special education services. Programs in special education continue to be an available option to a student until one of the following is met: they receive a high school diploma that represents completion of the local school district's graduation requirements, reach their 22nd birthday, or are found to no longer be educationally disabled.

SAU #12 provides special education and related services to students with educational disabilities in compliance with all relevant Federal and State laws and regulations.
