## **Plans for New Water Tank Near Gordon Drive Reviewed**

## **Londonderry Teen Raises Funds for Suicide Prevention**

It's been nearly a year now that Myleigh ■Brennan's best friend, Morgynne Seigny, took her own life, and over the past year Brennan, who is now a Londonderry High School junior, has been trying to raise funds and awareness for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

Morgynne committed suicide on Oct. 19, 2021 and her unexpected death came without warning to her friends and family. It was said to be due mostly because bullying through social media.

Myleigh Brennan was devastated by the sudden loss and in November of last year raised over \$3.500 in her fund raising efforts to help prevent teen suicide.

When Morgynne passed, Brennan knew she wanted to do something special to honor

Brennan established "Mariposas for Morgynne" last year and designed sweatshirts that were sold online displaying Morgynne's name and butterflies, symbolizing the effect of suicide on teens.

Brennan was surprised by the response to the fundraiser. "When I first thought of it, I figured I would sell a couple of hoodies to Morgynne's close friends, but it grew like crazy. I sold way more than I thought I ever could," she said.

This year, as the anniversary of her friends passing approaches, Brennan has designed a new hoodie, which has "STAY" on the front and the slogan "Stay: Tomorrow Needs You" written on the back.

The pullover hoodies her in the community are a 50/50 blend, that

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## **Editorial**

### Fire Safety All Year

October 9th-15th is the official Fire Prevention Week this year. Many fire departments are using the whole month of October to emphasize fire safety through public education events. Many Fire Departments maybe holding open houses, those are always good times to stop in. You can stop in at your local fire station almost anytime, you get to meet the crew and pick up some pointers on staying safe.

This year's Fire Prevention theme is "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape!" This is so important. It reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan and emphasizes the importance of having a smoke detector in every bedroom. Fire officials note that half of home fire deaths result from fires reported between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., when most people are asleep. They also say that having a working smoke alarm cuts the chances of dying in a reported fire in half.

Other tips: Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit. Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways to get out. Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them. Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find. Close doors behind you as you leave, this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.

Once you get outside, stay outside; you should never go back inside a burning building. Having a fire extinguisher is only the first step, knowing how to use it is the vital second step; smoke detector placement, use and testing, making a family escape plan, or the overriding importance of getting out and staying out of a burning building, your local firefighters are ready to talk fire safety. With a fire doubling in size every 30 seconds, the importance of taking fire prevention seriously is a no-brainer.

Calling 911 is another focus of fire safety this month. With the prevalence of cell phones and the frequent absence of landlines, children and everyone else need to know where to they can get quick access to the phone in the middle of the night.

So whether your Fire Department is or is not having an open house go and talk with them. Firefighters love to explain their gear and air packs to children, so that the youngsters will have nothing to be afraid of if they encounter a firefighter during a fire.

As the saying goes, they're the ones running into a burning building as everyone else is running out.

Help them out and keep them as well as yourself safe by learning fire safety and fire prevention tips, and putting them into practice, this month and every month.

**Traffic Safety** 

This letter was sent to the Londonderry Town Council & Chairman, Londonderry Traffic Safety Committee on Sept. 9.

I was not able to attend the Londonderry Town Council meeting on Sept. 12. I did not realize that the NH DOT would be making a presentation regarding the Stonehenge Rd., & Rockingham Rd., intersection. Regarding that intersection, I would like to offer these comments:

- I drive through this intersection frequently and do not see a need for a roundabout, but I believe turn lanes would be helpful and maybe all that's needed.
- I am no fan of roundabouts or any other so-called "traffic calming" devices.
- They needlessly cause traffic delays, confusion, and can lead to accidents.
- Pedestrian and cyclists are actually less safe when negotiating a roundabout.
- Roundabouts can actually create anxiety, nervousness and even lead to road rage.
- There are usually better alternatives to roundabouts
- I am aware of many instances of expensive tire/wheel damage which some have incurred due to narrow-laned, sharpcurbed roundabouts.
- NH DOT may like roundabouts because they can be cheaper to install and especially to maintain.
- Rockingham Rd., (NH Rt. 28) is a major thoroughfare, truck route improve traffic flow.

- In Concord, I saw pretty little flower gardens in the middle of roundabouts that were run over by heavy truck
- At one time, NH DOT wanted to redesign I-93's exit 12 (in Concord) to include a roundabout at each side of the South Main St. (NH Rt. 3A) overpass.
- Concord City Council interceded and successfully convinced the DOT to drop the plan, because like NH Rt., 28, it is a major thoroughfare.
- Coming from North Londonderry and heading south on Rockingham Rd., there is a traffic light at Symmes Dr., I-93 South on-ramp, I-93 North on-ramp, Liberty Drive, and shortly after crossing into Derry, more traffic lights begin just after Scobie Pond Rd.
- As that stretch of road is already heavily signalized, a traffic signal at the intersection of Stonehenge Rd., makes far more sense than a roundabout and should keep traffic flowing better.
- Adding a left turn lane on Stonehenge Rd., and both right (southbound) and left (northbound) turn lanes would also be beneficial and make it safer.




