

Orange Is The Color For This Season

When you think about fall, the color orange comes to mind. Pumpkins and turning leaves is the main thought, but the special hunter orange that becomes part of our attire in the outdoors this time of year is particularly important.

It's hunting season in the Granite State again, and that means those pristine woods in the back of your home or along your favorite path are likely to resound with more than the birds chirping.

The sounds of gunshots will soon be heard along that chirping. This means you should start exercising extra caution when you're in or near the woods, no matter if you're aiming the gun or taking a stroll in the woods. Don't take chances.

For hunters, always be sure of your target and make sure that what you see is really what you're hunting. In other words, identify your target before you fire. Always. Make sure you take seriously what you learned in hunter education. Know your weapon. The life you save may be your own or your neighbor's. Be certain you're not trespassing in pursuit of your hobby. Be respectful of the land where you hunt, and the neighbors around you.

Know the rules. If the land is posted "No Hunting" and you don't have personal permission to hunt there, go somewhere else. It is just

as important to leave the land as you found it or maybe better.

Each year, both private and town-owned land is trashed and vandalized. Whether it's someone's idea of a private shooting range, complete with spent cartridges and beer cans, trees cut down without permission, or ATV damage to trails, the "rotten apple" spoils it for everyone else. Hunter or non hunter, clean up after yourself.

For the rest of us, this is the season when we don't want to be crashing around in the brush. Make it easy for the hunters and for yourself by wearing hunter orange when you're in an area where hunting is likely, and make sure your faithful canine companion is sporting an orange scarf as well. It's advised to steer clear of camouflage clothing.

Fall is a beautiful time to be in the woods as long as we take literally the old adage that it's better to be safe than sorry.

We know the vast majority of hunters use common sense in the pursuit of their game, but in southern New Hampshire, woods and homes are close neighbors. On a clear fall morning, the sound of gunshots is a good clue that you're not alone.

Take care, and enjoy a beautiful fall.

Elizabeth's coronation in 1953 was widely celebrated. Every school child was given a die cast money box (a piggy bank) in the shape of a crown to encourage savings. It was painted in red and gold. I do not recall what happened to mine, like many childhood toys it was left behind when I left home. In those days, my allowance, subject to chores, was one penny a week. Not a lot until you consider England was still recovering from World War II. Meat was still rationed and sugar and candy had just come off a few months before. The small store across the street from my school now sold "sour dip" for one quarter of

one penny (a farthing). You licked your finger to make it wet and were allowed to dip it, once only, deep into the jar of sherbet on the counter in order to cover it in sherbet. (Sherbet is a fizzy, sweetish sour powder, usually eaten by dipping something in it or licking it from a finger. A mixture of sodium bicarbonate, powdered sugar also be used to make fizzy lemonade.) Inflation has been significant since then. A few years ago I obtained a transcript of my father's job. In 1953, he was paid 9 pounds and 3 shillings per week as a police officer with 15 years of experience. (There were 20 shillings in 1 pound and 12 pence in one shilling. 1 pound was worth about 3 dollars. That was about 27 dollars per
